DEATH STRIKES TWICE IN PORTER FAMILY IN TWO DAYS

Death struck twice within 48 hours at a Moscow home late yesterday afternoon (Jan. 10) as Edward R. Porter, 51, lumber company manager, died at the Gritman hospital. He followed in death by less than two days the younger of two sons, Corwin, 21.

Both deaths were induced by influenza. Mr. Porter died about 3:30 p. m. of a kidney disease resulting from influenza, while his son, ill five years of a rare blood disease, succumbed near midnight Saturday.

Mr. Porter had lived here six years, being manager of the Standard Lumber Co. He was a Mason and chairman of the Latah county Boy Scout council.

He was born at Waterville, Wash., August 30, 1892. He is survived by his wife, Mabel, and a son, Emmet, a lieutenant with the U. S. army in Italy. Surviving sisters are Mrs. Clara Jones, Los Angeles, and Mrs. Maude Nelson, Waterville. Brothers are Glenn, Lewiston; Hale, Aberdeen, Wash., and Capt. Harold Porter in California.

Funeral services for the father and son will be held at 2:00 p. m. Thursday at Short's Chapel. — Idahonian, Jan. 11.

The Porter family are well-known former residents of Kendrick, leaving here a number of years ago. Mrs. Porter is a daughter of the late James M. Emmett.

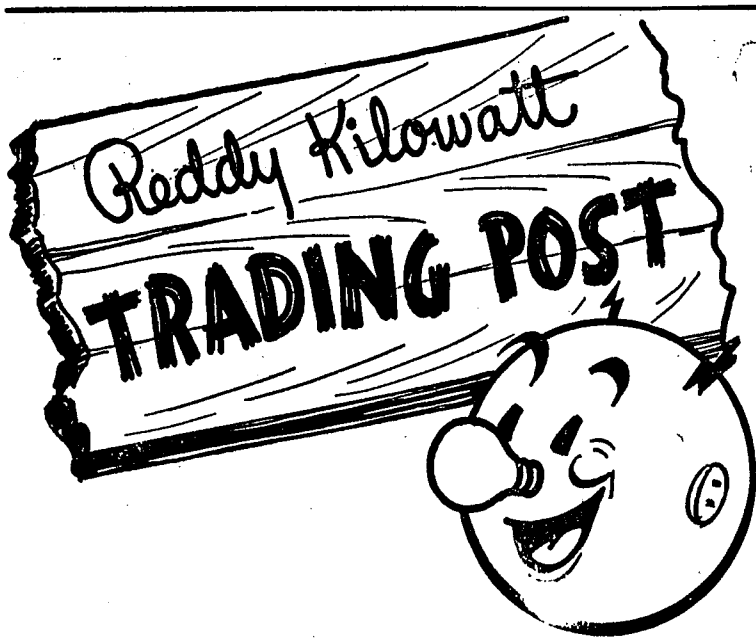
