Of Idaho's quota of \$24.000,000.00, two-thirds, or \$16. 000,000.00 is to come from individual purchases.

'Sacrifice will be required," said Theo. H. Wegener of Boise, execu-tive manager of the War Finance Committee for Idaho. "The goal is high, but it must be high as the need is great. Idaho has responded vigorously and successfully to the first three War loans. It has gone over the top. It must not fail in this greater effort.

The job will not be easy, either for the committees of loyal volunteers leading the campaign, or for the hundreds of thousands who will be called upon to dig deep for their country. Meeting the goal will mean real sacrifice. It will bring the war closer than ever in terms of dollars that must come from every pocket. The drive not at hand will more vitally concern each man and woman in Idaho than any that have gone before. Adequate purchases of bonds will pinch, but we must remember that war cannot be casually fought, either from a bomber on the front or from a checkbook at
