Camp Mackall, N. C.  
January 17, 1944

Greetings Bill:  
I again find myself writing you with the idea of changing my address. I can't remember writing a letter since I got into the army "without a twinge of conscience," as the more literate are wont to put it, concerning of course the length of time involved between my current letter and its predecessor.

Making all allowance for the fact that I'm not the boastful type, ahem (excuse the blushing), I'm now doing journalistic work for "Baker Battery" and have a space each week in the Post Paper. I don't know yet how it's going to work out, because I'm new in the business, but I'm sticking my chest out as long as I can — I might add, what chest I can! Not very complimentary at best, but the truth will out.

In case someone should be interested in my opinion, I think the government got a white elephant on the Louisiana Purchase. However, if they were looking for mud, they couldn't have made a better buy.

In closing Bill, I'd like to say that I really appreciate the paper, especially the "Armed Forces" section. It's the only way I have of keeping in touch with the guys from home.

Camp Abbot, Ore.  
Jan. 18, 1944

Dear Mr. McCreary:  
Just thought I'd write and ask if you'd send me the Gazette too, since so many of the service men get it. It's a nice way to keep track of the different fellows and to know what the folks at home are doing.

I'm in the Engineer's Corps. It's a tough course but I've made out pretty good so far. Am going to start to school soon. There are about 1500 men here in camp now, but through the summer months while they're on maneuvers there will be thousands more. This camp is an ideal place for maneuvers — that's why so many are sent here.

It has been cold here, zero and 10 below some of the time. How is it around Kendrick?

Pacific Beach, Calif.  
Jan. 20, 1944

Dear Friends:  
Well, I guess it won't do any harm to let you know I am still very busy — at the same place and at the same job. I tell you I really enjoy the Gazette and thanks to all for keeping it coming.

There has been quite a transformation in both station and personnel since I have been here, and correspondingly the noise from the guns increases day by day, but we are all sure it will help bring the end of the war that much quicker. So, when the concussion of a 5-inch gun breaks the window next to our bunk we just say "O. K.", roll over and go back to sleep.

I certainly have learned a lot about the construction business since I have been here. In some instances I think I've learned it from A to Z. Tonight I will probably see saws in my sleep, as I have been sharpening them for the past two days. We have around 50 circular and hand saws of various sizes in my group, so you can see what a lot of points we have to contend with — and some of the boys just don't seem to believe the signs which read: "These saws are for wood only."

If you could see some of the gadgets we make here for various purposes you would probably wonder how we manage to keep out of the "nut house" — but it's a lot of fun at times. Some of them work like we think they should, and most of them require a lot of research, but

we all try to make this station as near a Training and Test center as possible, and I believe the Japs are aware of the fact by this time.

We now have a weekly "Scandal Sheet," which we all think is "something." Four whole sheets, including the cover — which is just a picture. Anyway, we get quite a kick out of gathering news items for it from about the station.

One of the new features added to our post here is that we can now see movies which haven't been released to the public. We couldn't get them before because we lacked adequate facilities to handle them.

New York City  
Jan. 19, 1944

Dear Sis:  
Well, we are back in the good old U. S. A., and I will answer your letter I received upon arrival in port.

Well, Christmas has passed and I hardly realized it until now, so I celebrated my Christmas in New York yesterday. We had Christmas dinner at sea in the Mediterranean and were lucky in that we didn't have a single raid that day. I am very proud and happy to tell you that during our covering of a landing of LCI boats at Taranto, Italy, I knocked down a German fighter plane. I was mentioned as Captain's Quarters (but no medals, darn it!). I am on a 20 MM anti-aircraft gun in general quarters and I sure do get to do a lot of shooting, but that is the first thing I have done of real importance.

Our Task Unit is giving a big dinner dance for us at a large night club in New York in honor of our being the first Task Unit to go 100% for War Bond allotments, so you see we are doing our bit, too. We are all invited to bring our guests — and it's free. There will be newspaper men and photographers there for interviews and pictures — since this is the first of its kind. I will cut you out a picture of the group and send it. I got quite a few letters from Mom when I got here. Bless her heart, I don't know what I would do if she didn't write often.

Please write often and overlook the long pause between answers.

I haven't been doing anything in particular for the past three months — the whole division having been taking tests. I think we will be on maneuvers here too long.
