Let's Build That Swimming Pool In 1944!

For many years you have heard the remark: "I wish there was a safe place to go swimming around here." — Well, let's make "that safe place to go swimming" now — this year.

Materials for construction of this type are available. Why not use them? For a swimming pool can and will serve two distinct and yet related objectives (1) Give the youngsters a clean, supervised place in which to gather and at the same time learn to swim, and (2) provide you with that cooling dip you so much enjoy in the summer.

Very probably you were in the habit of driving to Spalding or Myrtle to get that dip — but this year, that will not be possible.

Therefore, we, the business men of Kendrick, working in conjunction with the Kendrick Consolidated school and the Village Trustees, are starting a campaign to raise the necessary financial requirements, which, according to M. C. Halliday, will approximate \$8,000.00 — and to raise this sum we will need the help of everyone in the Kendrick trade area.

The intention is not to build a "Kendrick Pool" but a "Community Pool," for the relaxation and comfort of all in this area, as well as a place in which children may learn to swim in safety and disease-free water.

There are those who say "It can't be done." Those who say it will cost "twice the estimate and is therefore impracticable." Those who say they "learned to swim in this creek, or that creek, or 'in the pond at home' and what was good enough for them is good enough for their kids." But we believe there are enough interested and willing residents of this section who will contribute, to make this pool a reality rather than a dream.

This reality will mean that when you come to town to do your trading during the summer season, you can bring your family with you for a cool and healthful swim. Can you think of any better summer recreation?

Present plans call for pre-heated water being used, this being supplied by the Kendrick Creamery.

The finance committee of the community pool workers is headed by A. O. Kanikkeberg, and money given will be placed in escrow at the local bank until the necessary funds are raised. Plans call for some three or four locations about town where donations may be left and escrow receipts issued, but for the present, The Farmers Bank will receive them.

We want everyone in on the building of this pool! If you're willing to help, and want to "start the ball rolling" contact Mr. Kanikkeberg.

Plans call for a pool large enough in size to accommodate a large crowd. In addition there will be a wading pool for the children.

The future of America rests in the hands of this growing generation. Let's give them every chance to make healthy, intelligent citizens, and this swimming pool will be the center of recreation for this area and do much to accomplish the above purpose. Come on, Folks, let's put this over!

The loss of one life in the "old swimming hole" through disease or drowning would mean more to the community than this pool would cost!

Bear in mind, always, that this pool is a community enterprise — not just for the benefit of Kendrick. It will mean many hours of pleasure for residents of this area — as well as the building of sound bodies in our growing children. Come on, let's build it — now!

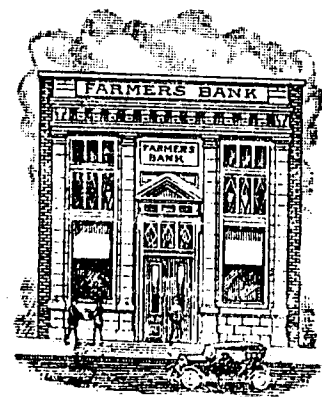
