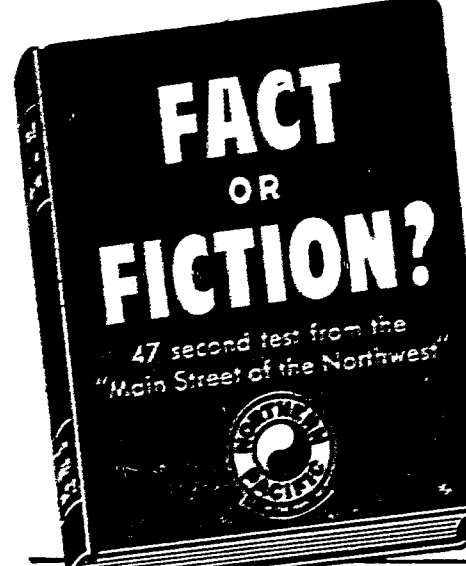

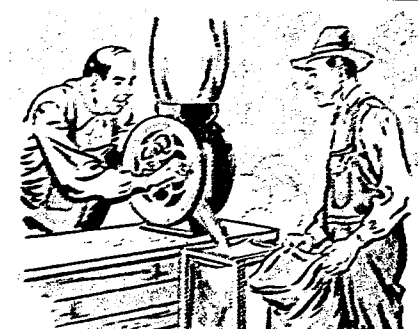

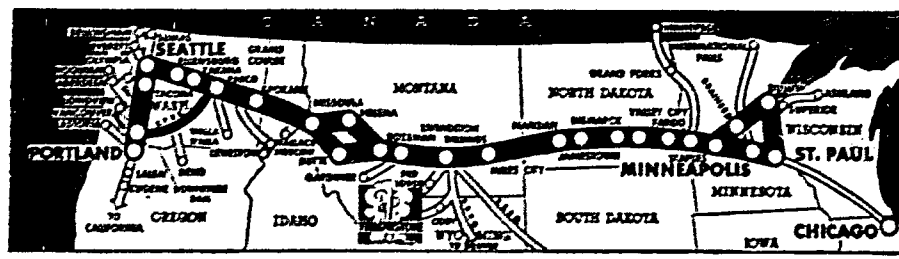
Q. Northwest wheat growers grind their own flour for home use. Fact or fiction?

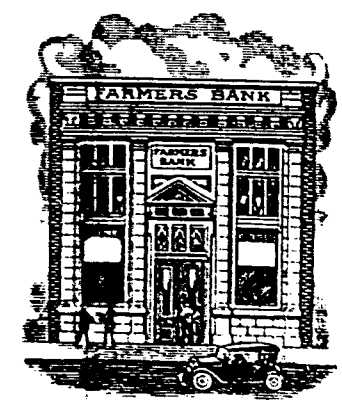
