Dear Mac and Bill:
Have a new address again, so can you send the paper to me here? This is the field where I'll receive my basic flying instruction. In a way it's quite a jump from Primary — especially in the matter of weather. As now, for almost the first time this winter, we are wearing overcoats and are glad to have them.

It's much colder here than in Arizona. Our ships are also larger and heavier, with almost twice the engine horsepower. The transition from biplane to low-wing monoplane is going to be quite a problem for a while, as we feel lost without a wing overhead. These basic trainers are, of course, more complicated in operation and instruments.

Again I wish to express my appreciation for the paper to you and to all the others who make it possible for us to receive it.
