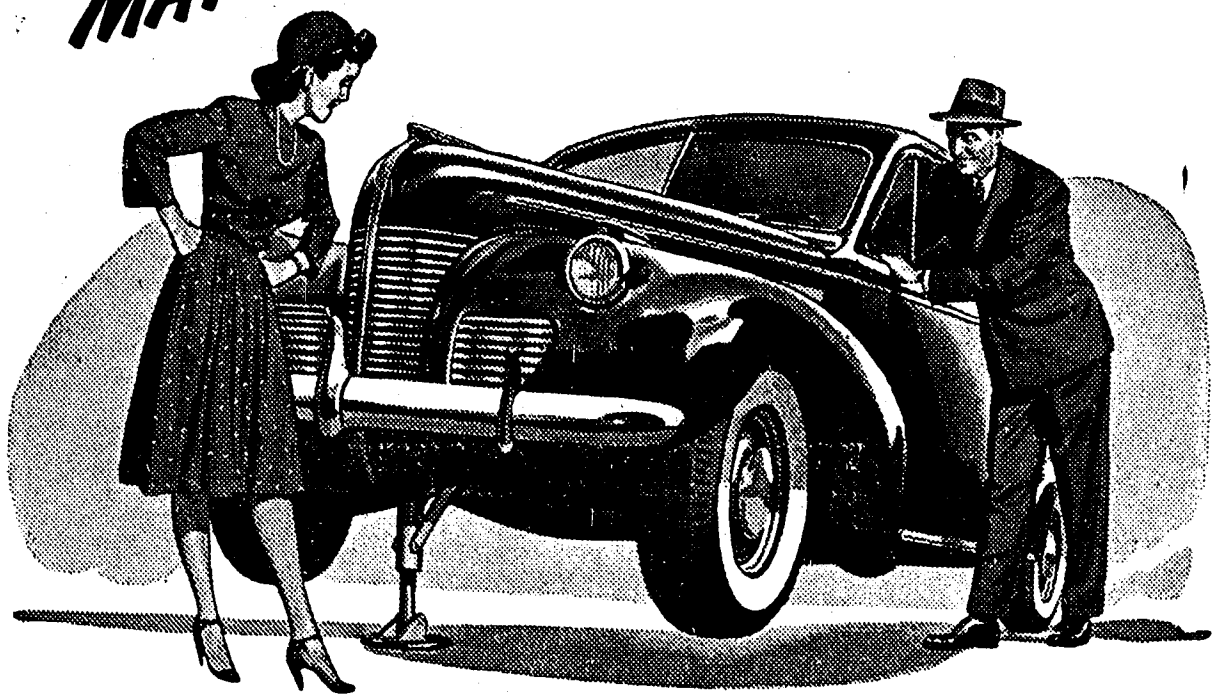

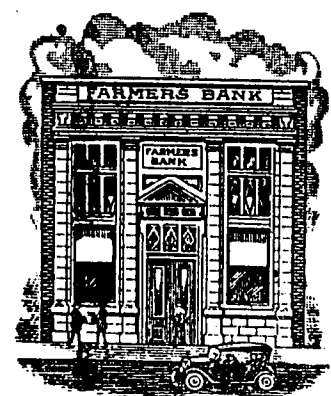

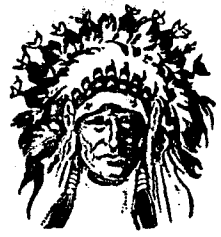

There's quite a few natives on this island. Some of them can speak English, but won't talk unless you have some cigarettes, candy or some kind of a trinket to flash at them.

In speaking of strikes, I wish those fellows (who go on strike) were here for a couple of days. I'm sure then that higher wages would be one of their minor worries.

There are several north Idaho boys in my outfit, so we have quite a time talking over old times.

In closing I want to thank all concerned who make this paper possible. Keep 'em coming!

Dear Bill:
Well, here is my new address, and I hope the paper keeps coming, for I sure enjoy it.

I would like to know if any of the other boys from home are here. I am still driving a truck. Arrived here the 9th, so am still new at this post and the weather is plenty hot.

What I have seen of El Paso seems to indicate a pretty town.

The fort is right out in the middle of a desert and when the wind blows you can't see because of the sand in the air.

So long until next time, and many thanks for sending the paper.

Camp Roberts, Calif.
April 14, 1944

Dear Mac and Bill:
I thought I would write you and let you know that I am still in the United States, but at a new camp. I am writing also to give you my new address so I won't miss a copy of the home town paper.

I am at Camp Maxey, Texas, just eight miles out of a town by the name of "Paris." It's about the size of Clarkston, Wash. The population is about 95 per cent negro — the rest are white people. I never saw so many negroes in my life, and to cap it all there is a negro regiment right next to where our field artillery training area is located.

Tell all the folks "hello" at Kendrick, and that I would like to be there with them.

LeGrande, Ore. April 15, 1944

Dear Mac and Bill:

Well, I have a different address so will write and give it to you so I can receive the paper sooner. I am now stationed at LaGrande, Oregon, not too far from home, but I doubt if I get a chance to get there.

We got here April 13, and had a rousing reception, which is still lasting.

We are taking our college training here. We live in the Sacajawea Hotel, right in town, and the school is only about five blocks away.

Thank you and all who make it possible for us to get the paper. I really appreciate it, and know the other boys do too.

GM 2-c Louis Hunt arrived home Saturday night on leave of absence from the navy — his first leave since enlisting in that branch of service almost three years ago.

Louis has been on Atlantic and Mediterranean convoy and patrol duty during all that time, and has seen and taken part in many battles between ships and subs, ships, and ships and planes, and like most of the boys does not care to talk about it. He says that he wants to spend his leave resting and visiting — and not re-living action.

Lieut. William A. Deobald, A. A. C., arrived home Tuesday at noon on a ten-day furlough, accompanied by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Deobald, and by Miss Beulah Draper. Billy has been stationed at Stockton Field, Stockton, California, and where he received the coveted Silver Wings at graduation ceremonies held at that field last Friday.

His parents and Miss Draper witnessed the ceremonies and all then came to Kendrick.

Billy will have about ten days at home and then will report to his new assignment in New Mexico, where he will undergo further intensive training in medium bomber technique.

Billy looks the very picture of health. He is deeply tanned, has gained weight and height. It is his first furlough in more than 14 months and he says he is enjoying every minute of it.

An official news dispatch from the Amarillo Army Air Field, Amarillo, Texas, reads as follows: "John C. Keeler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles C. Keeler, Kendrick, Idaho, has completed his course of studies as an aviation mechanic in this Army Air Forces technical training school.

"His graduation from this technical school now fits him for airplane maintenance and he will be sent to some air base where he will assist in keeping America's Flying Fortresses in the air for allied victory.

"In addition to completion of the schedule of academic and practical studies as an aviation mechanic, he has been thoroughly drilled in military tactics and defense and a stiff course of physical training that has conditioned him to meet all requirements of an American soldier."

Louis, like most of the boys, has put on considerable weight, and in addition he has added several inches in height, and looks the picture of health. He is now suffering with a severe cold (his first in many, many months) due to riding in over-crowded and over-heated trains.

Pvt. Wayne Lind left Saturday for Camp Bowie, Texas, to report to his company for duty after a 14-day furlough, six days of which was spent in Kendrick with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lind.

Wayne is a gunner in an armored regiment, and says that he likes the "gunnery end" of soldiering.

Frank Abrams, who was accepted for military service some three weeks ago and notified to report for duty April 23, received word Tuesday that the April quota was already full and it was not necessary for him to report this month.

Frank had resigned his job, arranged his affairs and sold his home — and now must rent and accept other employment until he is called.
