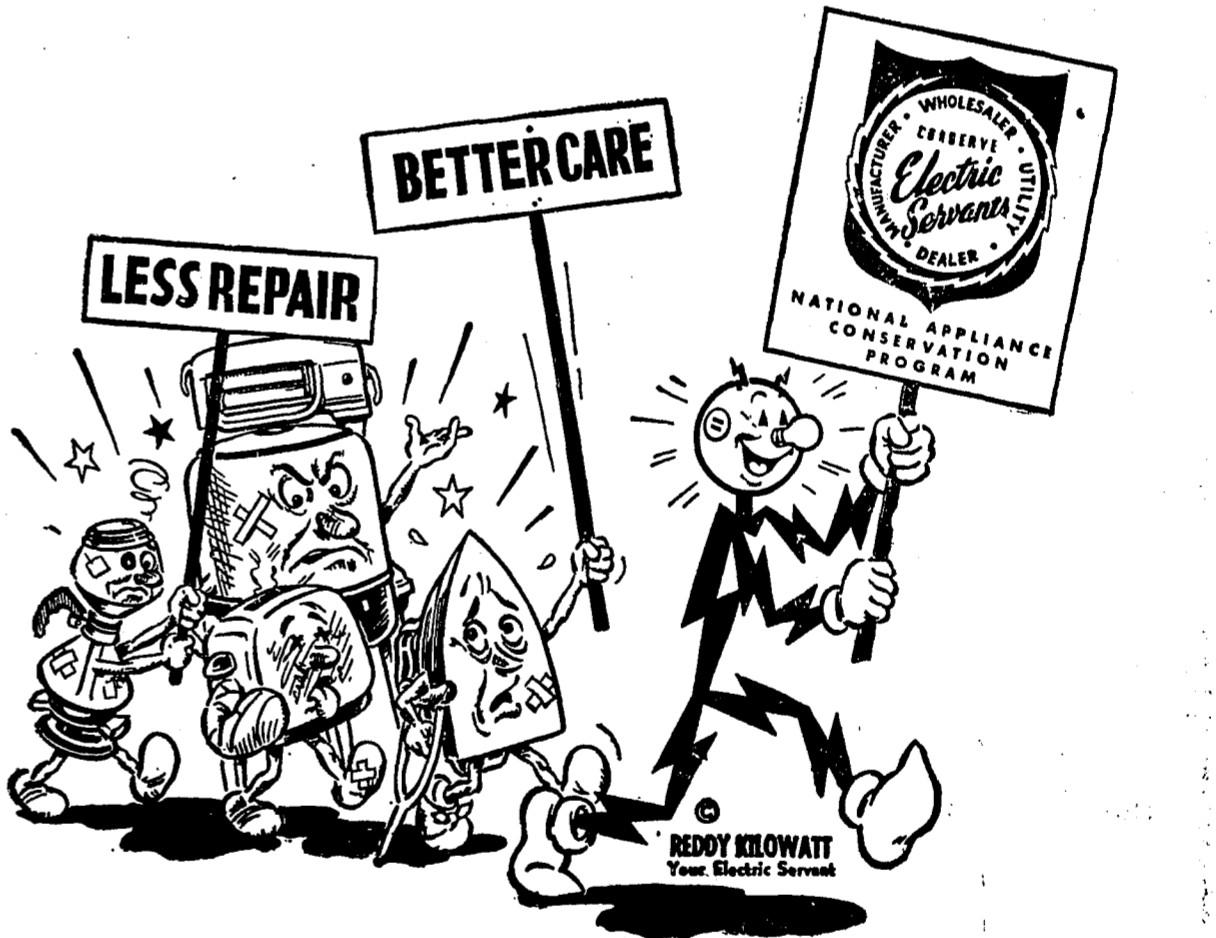

Stockton Field
April 15, 1944

Dear Sis:
Just a few lines to let you know I received your letter the other day. Was sure glad to hear from you again.

We are having another graduation today. The first one I haven't marched in since I have been here. The band is playing and the sun is shining—a beautiful day for graduation ceremonies. Billy Deobald was one of the graduates.

I am expecting to get a furlough starting the 2nd of May. It will soon be two and a half years since I have been home. If my furlough comes through O. K. I will be in Kellogg the 4th of May and in Kendrick the 13th. I plan on staying home a week or so and then spending three or four days in Kendrick — and 15 days will about be covered. I have hopes of getting a transfer. I certainly hope so, as I have been here too long. I have taken overseas exams and am in pretty good shape.

Sorry to hear Frank was injured in an air raid. His skull was fractured and he has had several operations on his forehead. He will probably get to come back to the states when he gets out of the hospital. The Engineering officer told me
