#### Fish And Game Meeting

The Idaho Fish and Game Commission will conduct a quarterly meeting at Boise, beginning July 8, to set season for hunting big game and game birds during 1944 and to set trapping dates for fur-bearing animals for the winter of 1944-45.

Recommendations will be received from sportsmen and conservation officers in each of the five fish and game districts. The July meeting for determination of game seasons is a new departure. In previous years the open seasons on all types of wildlife of which a harvest is permitted, have been established in January and February. This year game and bird dates were deferred until information was available on spring conditions that have an important bearing on wildlife increase.

Trapping seasons are being considered earlier than usual to give trappers more time to prepare their lines and select territories. In other
