## SUBSIDY PAYMENT DUE

Don't forget to apply for your Subsidy Payments on your cream and milk. They are now payable through your county AAA office. Latah County will have a representative at the Soil Conservation office in Kendrick from 1:00 to 4:00 p. m. Saturday, July 15, to accept applications for payments. Nez Perce county residents must send or take their applications to Lewiston.

We have a few blanks at our office if you wish to use them. The rates to be paid are 6c per lb. of butterfat on cream and 45c per 100 on whole milk. This payment is in addition to your regular price on cream and milk.

After September 1 this rate will be 10c per lb. on butterfat and 70c per 100 on whole milk. Keep these things in mind when you are tempted to sell those milk cows.

gets so thick in the cars that you can cut it with a knife. When the train emerges you have just time enough to catch a breath of fresh air before the train dives into another long tunnel. This process goes on all night. By morning you know "you have been somewhere." As the train stops small boys swarm out to sell nuts, boiled eggs, cucumbers, tomatoes and fruit. I never knew cucumbers to be eaten in such volumes as they are here. Of course, at home everyone eats them as pickles, but here they eat them in much the same manner as you eat apples.

In the dry regions it is hard to start new trees, so of late they have been grafting nuts on shrubs and trees that were of no commercial value. Thus a worthless tree can be made an economic resource.

It has been several hours since this letter was started. Most of the time has been devoted to examining malaria slides, and other laboratory work that is coming in from time to time. During the morning I do the chemistry — it seems to be my job most of the time.

Ensign John Wallace, of the Air Corps, who has been stationed in the south Atlantic area, landed at Rhode Island on June 27. His wife met him there and they went on to Maine to spend a furlough, he reporting back for duty July 10.

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Deobald have received word from their son, Charles, that he is now in France. They have permitted us to use excerpts from his letter as follows:

France

June 21, 1944

Dear Folks: Well, I guess your about ready for another letter by now. I don't have much time for letter writing over here. I've received several letters up to now, but none from home. I wish you would try to write a little more. I could stand a letter a day while I'm here in France.

I've been here since June 6th, and it was sure a big thing. That's one time I was soaked and thought nothing of it. I've already seen all of this war I want. It's a rough game that's played for keeps. You can probably tell more about what is going on by reading the paper than I can say in a letter.

I wish you could see my latest home. It's nothing more than a fox hole with a roof or dirt and brush, but one feels a lot better in there when there are artillery shells flying over. When I get home again I might have a lot to say but I don't think I'll mention much about the war. I thought the Medics weren't much good in garrison and neither did a lot of the others but they think quite a bit of 'em now and I

feel a little better about being a medico myself now.

Well, I suppose things are going pretty good at home now — I mean swimming and farm work and everything. Well, I believe it's about as hard to find something to write as usual. I wish now that I had been more places in England, but when it's time to go home I don't care if I don't ever get a glimpse of the place. Oh, yes, received my knife, watch band and film, thanks a lot. I don't think I'll ever be able to use the film but the band got here just in time and the knife is handy.

About the only thing I could use now is something out of your garden and I don't think you could send that. Remember how I didn't like fresh onions? One would sure be good now. I've learned to like a lot of things—even my rations aren't bad when you're hungry.

Well, this is about all I have for now. I haven't a stamp but guess you'll get this letter pretty quick anyway. I hope this finds you all well and I would like to hear from you more often.

P. S.: I just thought I'd write a couple more lines and tell you I just received two letters and feel much better. Must close again and take this to the Lt. to censor.

Mr. and Mrs. Paul Lind have finally received word from their son, Eugene, and have kindly permitted us to use portions of the letter as follows:

France

June 25, 1944

Dear Mom and Dad: Here is your son again trying to write a letter, but hanged if he knows what to write. There are so many things that would be of interest to you that seem of everyday occurrence to me.

I guess I'm what is called a combat soldier now, but can't say that I feel any different than before except for having to sleep in a fox hole and eat my meals out of a paper box. As of the other day we have been getting hot meals, but they are nothing like garrison rations.

From what I've seen of this country so far its chief crop is apples, which are made into cider. One can find a large hoghead of cider (hard or soft) in most any barn or garage. There is hardly any distinction between the house and barn. They think as much of their cows and chickens as one of the family. I've noticed three grades of shoes, the first being all leather; next, leather tops with wooden soles and last, all wood, like the Dutch, the latter being the most prominent.

They have hedges here instead of fences, same as in England, but these haven't been trimmed, it seems, since "Jerry" took over. All the better to hide in, he thinks.

I haven't heard from Leon or Wayne for so long I was beginning to wonder what had happened to them. Now that I have their addresses I'll see what I can do. Sure hope Bob does O. K. in the navy. I envy him. I got his graduation announcement and one from Villa Lou, too. Sorry I couldn't write as soon as I received them but Uncle Sam was planning an excursion and wanted me to go along. I think they're very attractive, but there is something about the '43 that can't be beat.

So the "wishing well" finally came through. I figured they would fall and try someplace else, and above all I didn't expect an arctic. There are so many changes
