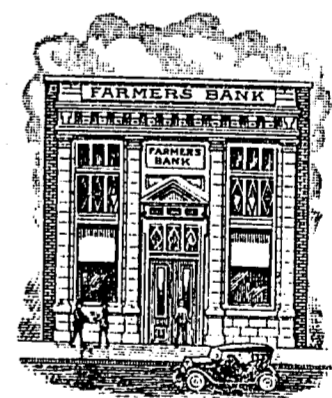

Physics Class Visits Creamery

Tuesday afternoon 30 students of the Physics class, who are now studying centrifugal force, and its applied uses, visited the local creamery. The students gained a great deal of statistical and mechanical information concerning milk products. They found that 1400 pounds of butter a week is made in the enormous local creamery church. This means two batches of churning, because about 700 pounds of butter are made at one time. They watched the 110-pound tubs of butter mechanically cut. It was then wrapped by hand at the rate of 300 pounds per hour. Then the students inspected and assembled the separator. They observed the process of milk and cream pasteurization, which is done by keeping the milk and cream in huge separate pasteurization units, at a temperature of 170 degrees for 30 minutes. The ice cream, bottle and can sterilization units were also inspected. The Babcock tester was clearly and expertly explained to the students, and at the same time demonstrated to them by Mr. Harris. The students and their teacher, Mrs. Larsen, wish to thank Mr. Harris and Mr. Powell for their information and courtesy.

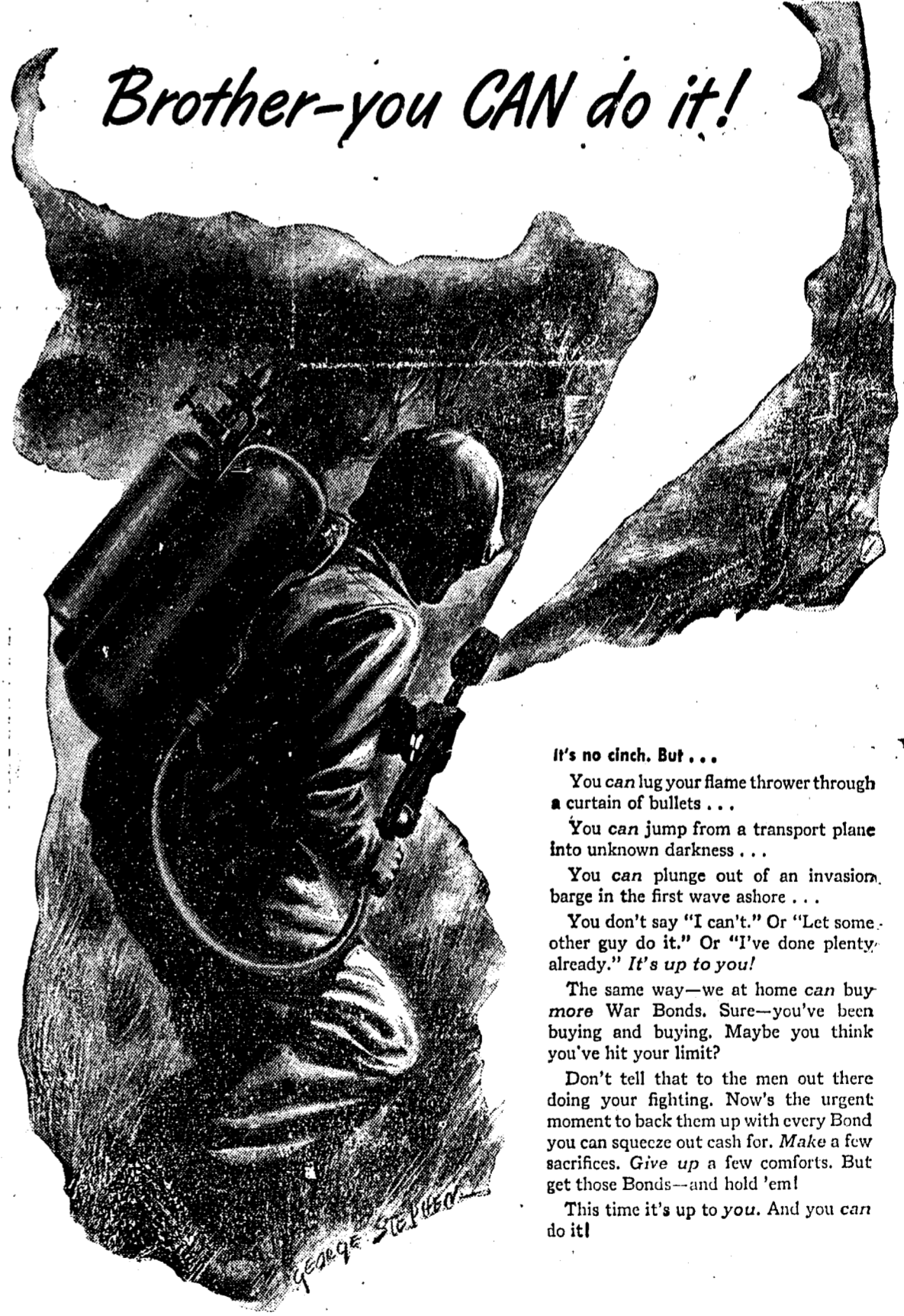

2nd section of the 1980th engineer platoon fire fighting soldiers of Lieut. Gen. Mark W. Clark's Fifth army in Italy.

Without benefit of a bright red truck or a pole to slide down from the second story of the fire house — when they had a house — these blaze battling GIs have the reputation of getting to the scenes of a fire as fast as poor Italian roads permit and of getting the flames out in short order.

Equipped with two pumper units, the section once fought a gasoline dump blaze of 650,000 gallons, and on another occasion made a 45-mile run to combat a fire. Equipped to handle any type blaze, the platoon has battled more than 80 fires in 17 months overseas service in Africa and Italy.

Only two of the section's men were firemen in civilian life, while the other seven have made it their army occupation. The section's activities haven't always been confined to fires; one job assigned to them was filling the swimming pool at the Fifth army rest center, an 875,000 gallon pumping task. The unit has also pumped out flooded areas around bridges or bridge sites, so that new bridges could be built or the old ones repaired.

Types of fires usually fought by the 2nd section are small gasoline and ammunition blazes, with occasional tent fires in the winter months. The section regularly inspects gasoline and ammunition dumps and other installations for fire safety. New units moving into the section's area are immediately informed of the fire unit's location and telephone number. The section chief has praised the cooperation of fifth army units in adherence to fire safety regulations and in aid to his men in fighting fires.

The 1980th engineer platoon was activated at Bradley Field, Conn., in April, 1943. The unit arrived in Africa in June, 1943, and joined General Clark's Fifth army in March of this year.

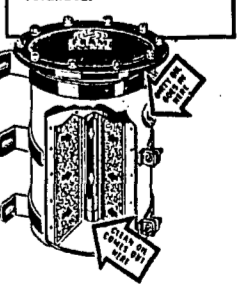
