Official Dispatch (An Eighth Air Force Bomber Station, England) — Technical Sergeant Donald D. Benscoter, 23, of Kendrick, Idaho, has been awarded a second Oak Leaf Cluster to the Air Medal for "meritorious achievement" in aerial combat. Sgt. Benscoter is engineer and top turret gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress participating in Eighth Air Force bombing attacks on Nazi war-making installations.

He is a member of the 34th Bomb Group, a unit of the Third Bombardment division cited by the President for its now historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of the Messerschmitt aircraft plants at Regensburg, Germany.

Sgt. Benscoter is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Benscoter, Kendrick. Before entering the army air forces he was a farmer. He attended Kendrick High school and the University of Idaho.

Official Dispatch (An Eighth Air Force Fighter Station, England) — The promotion of Edward J. Kramer, whose wife, Mrs. Thelma E. Kramer, (nee Thelma Perryman) lives at Kendrick, Idaho, from sergeant to staff sergeant, has been announced at this Eighth Air Force fighter station in England.

S-Sgt. Kramer is a ground crew administrative specialist attached to headquarters of Lt. Col. Kyle L. Riddle's 479th Fighter Group.

Before entering the army air force in January, 1942, S-Sgt. Kramer was employed by the Thalmay Pulp and Paper Co.
