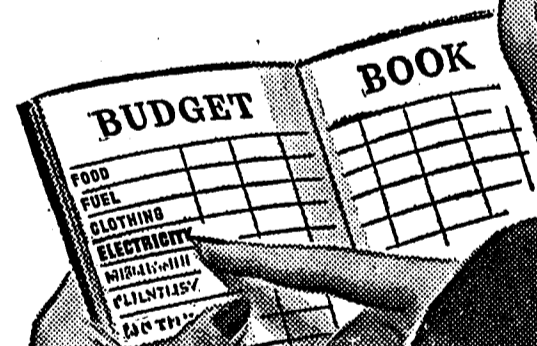

**Eight-Course Paratroopers Meal**

 The meal, packed in a 12-ounce flat metal ration container about the size of a pocket tobacco tin, contains four 1-ounce chocolate bars, 1 1/2-ounces of hard candy, a 1-ounce bar of dehydrated cheese and crackers, two bouillon cubes, two sugar tablets, 2 packages of soluble coffee, four pieces of candy-coated gum, three cigarettes, a can opener and water purification tablets.

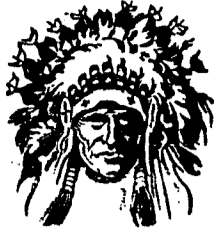

## REMINDING YOU —

Subsidy payments for January, February and March will be paid in April. The rate for these three months will be 10c per pound of butterfat.

Our deliveries of sweet cream have increased substantially. This increase has certainly been appreciated, and we hope to see it continue through the warmer season.
