England
January 18, 1945

Dear Mom and Dad:
We got back from the rest home last night. I had four letters from you when we got here. I was glad to hear that Ray has such a good deal where he is.

Those rest homes are really the "cat's meow." I sure hated to come back to camp. My old bed didn't feel very good after sleeping in that nice soft bed with sheets, that we had at the rest home.

I never did tell you about the place we were. It was a big estate of about 500 acres that the army took over. The house is a beautiful thing. Most of the interior woodwork was of oak and beautifully carved. There were nice big soft chairs, and sofas, and fire places. You could do anything you wanted to and there was plenty to do — skeet shooting, softball, badminton, ping pong, pool, tennis, golf, horseback riding and fishing. The lakes were frozen over while we were there, though, so that let fishing out. We ate five times a day — breakfast from 9 to 10; dinner at 1:00; tea at 4:30; supper at 7:30, and a late snack at 10:30. The food was the very best, too. I had my first ice cream there since leaving the states.

They issued us civilian clothes and bicycles, and we had passes so we could go to town any time. It was a nice little town, but it was more fun to be at the house.

One day we went on a little excursion to the Isle of Wight. We went through an old castle there that was built in the eleventh century; very interesting but as far as I'm concerned the people who lived there were born about nine centuries too soon. The caretaker showed us how they used to draw water from the old well, which is 160 feet deep. They used a big tread-mill and used a burro to run it. In the old days they had prisoners do it — so they say.

But now I'm back to the old

grind. They treated us like kings at the home. I had a heck of a cold when I went, but it got alright while I was lying around.
I hope you are both O. K. Don't work too hard.

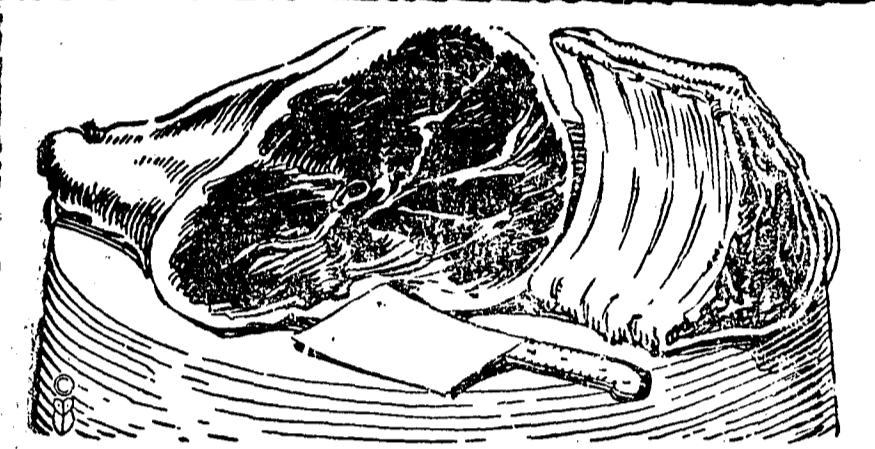
