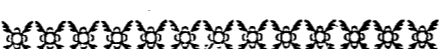

I am writing to let you know that I have a new address, so that the paper can come direct to me. I have been receiving it pretty regularly and I sure appreciate every copy of it — it's just like getting a big long letter from home. It's sure swell, too, to know where all the fellows are and what they are doing — and I hope they keep on writing.

I am not on the Jason Lee anymore. A bunch of we fellows having been transferred to another ship. It is a Liberty ship and I like it fine — and it's a new one.

I want to thank you and all those others that help make it possible for us to get the paper. I also want to thank everyone in Leland for the lovely Christmas card.

The Gazette is in receipt of the following letter from J. E. Fleshman, former Leland resident, who is now residing at Portland, who writes regarding his son, James Jay, as follows:

James Jay was inducted at Wallace, Ida., March 26, 1943. Just one year ago today (Feb. 25) he was seriously wounded while in patrol duty at Bouganville. He was operated on March 26, 1944, and was unconscious for two weeks. The doctors said he couldn't live — but somehow he did. He was hit by splinters from a 60-

mm. shell which exploded about 10 feet ahead of him, the fragments lodging in his chest just between his heart and lungs.

He lingered along until May 1, 1944, at which time he was shipped to San Francisco, arriving there on May 15. His wound would not heal over there. On arrival at the Letterman hospital at San Francisco, my wife and I found him indeed seriously ill, the wound having filled with pus on the way across.

However, he began to improve and was released from the hospital the latter part of July. He surely has suffered terribly the past year. However, he is still with the army and is now stationed at Los Angeles. They are trying to build him up, and I presume he will be discharged in due time.

Word was received here last week telling of the death in line of duty of Wm. (Bill) Patrick Fitzpatrick, Spokane, former instructor in the Kendrick school — and very well known here.

Bill, who was in the navy, gave his life in the invasion of Leyte, Philippine Islands.

No further details are available at this time.
