He will report for duty at the Naval Air Station, Miami, Florida, April 4.

Cpl. Laurence Bartlett, who is stationed at Roswell, New Mexico, arrived home Thursday of last week to spend a 10-day furlough with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Bartlett and other relatives here.

Laurence says that Roswell is not at all bad in the spring and early summer, but that late fall and winter are "corkers," wind, sand, rain, etc., make life miserable there during the "off seasons." Army life, however, never was designed on the "picnic theory," he says.

S-Sgt. Homer Jones arrived last Friday from the South Pacific, to spend a 21-day furlough at his home here (Mr. and Mrs. Alex Larson) and with other relatives and friends. We have not yet seen Homer, but know he has had many experiences. We also know that he wears the Silver Star medal for bravery in action — and that in itself is something not many acquire.

T-Sgt. Oscar Knutson arrived home Sunday of last week from the Italian theatre of war to spend a 45-day day furlough with his parents and other relatives and friends at his home on Bear ridge.

Sgt. Knutson is a veteran of Africa, Sicily and Italy, and wears a silver battle star (five major battles) — and certainly is entitled to the furlough he is now enjoying. Oscar was one of the first to leave from this section, and other than his first stage of training furlough, this is his first one at home for almost three years. He says that the country looks as natural as can be, but that kids have grown up, and adult faces have changed — and he is busy getting acquainted all over again.

Mrs. Jim Farrington is in receipt of a very interesting letter from her brother, Louis Hunt SOM 2-c, and has kindly allowed us excerpts from it as follows:

In The Pacific  
Monday, March 12

Dear Sis:  
I guess I owe you a letter, but haven't had much time to write anyone lately.

That son of yours isn't very good about answering letters. I guess I write about four to his one. Just a hunch, but I think he'll be back in the states soon. They might be using the ..... division in the southern Philippines, but even that shouldn't hold him up too long.

Under the new censorship rules we can tell you where we were and what we did on our last operation

30 days after it is disclosed for the press. We stayed at Pearl Harbor for a while (that's where those pictures were taken) then on out here, via Eniwetok (in the Marshals) and Guam. Our first operation was with the 3rd Fleet. We made carrier strikes on Formosa and Luzon. Then in through the straits to the South China Sea. We then made strikes on Hong Kong and Saigon (in French Indo-China) and helped cover the landings on the Philippines. Then we went back up and hit Formosa and Okinawa (an island off the south coast of Japan). The sea was rougher than hell (on a destroyer that's really rough). You will have to wait a while for the dope on our last operation. I suppose you know all about it by now. You just keep up on Pacific news with an eye peeled for naval action and you can just about tell where I am from time to time. I don't think there is any chance of getting back to the states for quite some time yet. Don't worry about me though, only the good get killed. Besides, one is enough for you to worry about.

I got to see Lawrence and Doyle Biddison before we left on our last operation.

Say, Sis, would you give McCreary my address and tell him to send me the paper?

Well, I'll have to close for now, and write to Mom. Answer soon and tell your son to do likewise.

From Mrs. John Reid comes a note to say that all three of her men-folks are in the Pacific: Herbert LaHatt, James Dyer and Dick Reid, and all were O. K. a week ago.

Glen Newman Heard From  
Mrs. Glen Newman, Tacoma, has received a card from her husband, Sgt. Glen F. Newman, saying that he is in good health, and is a prisoner of war in a German camp.

Mrs. Newman promptly passed on the good news to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Newman, Cameron. All are mighty glad to get this information direct from Glen.

Receives Real "Cash"

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Deobald received a letter from their son, Pfc. Charles Deobald, now in Germany, and inclosed was a "wad of folding money" with instructions to his father to use it to "go on a toot."

The money consisted of one 1 Mark German bill; one 5 Mark German bill; 1 10 Mark German bill; one 20 Mark (Danzig) German bill; one 20 Franc Belgian bill and one 3 Ruble Russian bill.

The German 1 Mark and 10 Mark bills had raised lettering on them, such as we in this country impart with a Notary seal, and as the "value" of the bills increased, so did their size.

The Belgian bill was dated 1919, so probably was somewhere near the par or face value.

The 3 Ruble Russian note had evidently been through a fire, as it plainly showed signs of scorching. It was undated. Charles, of course, acquired the "folding money" from German prisoners, and it is more than probable that one of these prisoners had seen service on the Russian front and "acquired" the Russian money in that way.

Anyhow, the money is a mighty fine set of souvenirs.

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Zimmerman are in receipt of the following "newsy" letter from their son, Cpl. Walter Zimmerman, "Somewhere in Europe" as follows:

Dear Folks:  
Can't write a thing, the censors to blame; just say I'm fine and just sign my name. Can't say where we came from; can't mention the date, don't even remember the meals that we ate. Can't tell where we're going; can't say where we'll land; can't even inform you if met by a band. Can't report on the weather; can't say if there's rain, all military secrets must secrets remain. Can't keep a diary, for such is a sin; can't keep the envelope your letter came in! Can't have a flashlight to guide me at night; can't take a smoke (except out of sight). Don't know for sure just what to write, so will call this a letter and close with "Goodnight!"
