Meats, Fats — Red Stamps T5, U5, V5, W5 and X5 expire April 28; Y5, Z5, A2, B2, C2, D2, expire June 2; E2, F2, G2, H2, J2, expire June 30; New stamps validated April 1 are K2, L2, M2, N2 and P2. They expire July 31.  
Processed Foods — Blue Stamps C2, D2, E2, F2, G2, expire April 28; H2, J2, K2, L2, M2, expire June 2; N2, P2, Q2, R2, S2, expire June 30; new stamps validated April 1 are T2, U2, V2, W2 and X2, they expire July 31.  
Sugar Stamp No. 35 expires June 2. No new stamp will be validated until May 1.  
Fuel Oil — Period 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 coupons good for 10 gallons per unit, continue valid throughout the country for the rest of the heating year.  
Shoes — Airplane Stamps 1, 2 and 3 in Book 3 continue valid indefinitely.

Cost Of Paper Has Skyrocketed  
So universal are the uses of paper it seems incredible that mankind once existed without it. In our modern complex society paper has become an indispensable item. Shoppers discovered this when they went to the store to find no paper bags. Hotels and restaurants, unable to get their table linen laundered, have resorted to paper napkins and towels.  
Vast quantities of paper also have gone into the manufacture of cartons since wooden boxes became scarce. In fact, the demand for paper products has been so stimulated by the military that paper mills have been unable to supply the growing requirements. Likewise, the shortage of labor has made it difficult for mills to obtain the necessary pulpwood.  
It is not surprising, therefore, that newsprint has become scarce and that it has steadily increased in cost. Three times since March 1, 1943, the OPA has lifted the ceiling price of newsprint until now it is \$61.00 a ton. This is a total increase of 22 per cent.

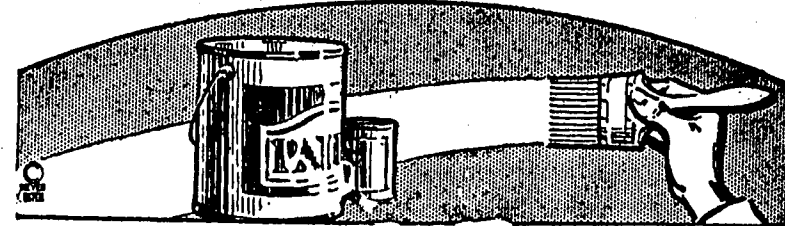

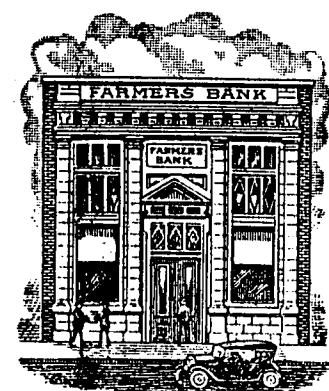

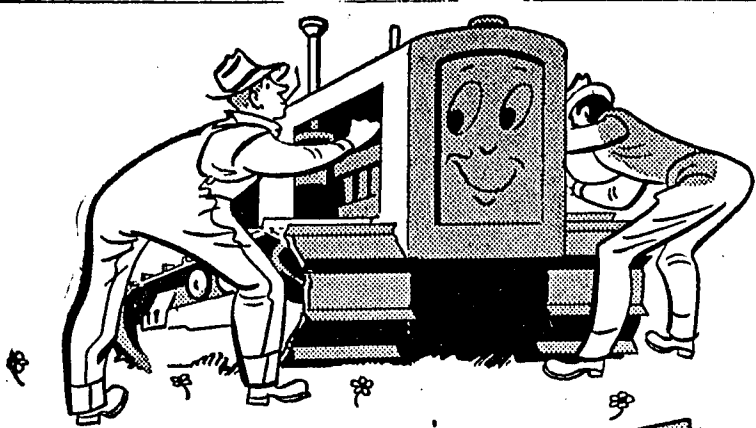

Mrs. Leon Lind is in receipt of a very interesting letter from her husband, Cpl. Leon P. Lind, who is stationed in England, and has very kindly permitted excerpts from it, as follows:

"I will write of England now that spring is here, and of her many lovely spring smells and of rich green grass and trees so dense the wind will not go through them.

(How can I sing of England in a billion words? I must do it in ten!)

The squalor and filth of English cities is amazing. The town that has the least of it here is Stratford-Upon-Avon, because its population is of an average higher intelligence, having mostly consisted of scholars, actors, teachers, etc. Worcester is full of magnificent architecture, and a view of it from the railway bridge (which is elevated) just as you get half-way across the Severn, is breath taking. At first you wonder what so many roofs could be doing so closely packed together, at so many different elevations, of so many different pitches and shapes. There are square buildings and round ones, half-round ones, hexagonal ones, flat-irons, triangles, and some of indistinguishably bizarre shapes — all packed tight together like pieces in a jig-saw puzzle. Streets and alleys among and between these buildings in maddening confusion. Everything is paved; no single patch of ground shows. Where there is not a roof there is a paved walk or street. This is the factory district. In an American city this district would be 10 miles square, in an English city it is about that many blocks square. It has equally as many factories in it. Next to the factories is the slum section, which looks just like the factories — all gray slate roofs and red brick walls and buildings — only the smell is different, and the kids are filthy, bedraggled, sad-faced, and go around without shoes, or even combing their hair. Farther away is the wider piece of pavement which is High street. Business houses and shops line it, and it is a little brighter in aspect. Around this section of town are the residences of the more self-sufficient people.

This is all to the left of the river, for the Severn runs beside Worcester and not through the town. Downstream sitting majestically and beautifully, is the famous cathedral, a masterpiece of architecture. It is enormous as far as size goes, but it is so cleverly designed and so artistically planned that it appears to be small enough to put in your pocket. It is the most lovely and imposing building in town. Across the town, a couple of miles away, is the only other structure of equal height. It is a half-round brick building with two windows in it and "Sprekley's" painted across it in great white letters. ("Sprekley's is the same as Lucky Lager at home — beer!)

That is not all there is to Worcester, nor to England. The railroad goes across town on a brick "el" and crosses High street at right angles, the train stopping there at the station. And as it does so my ten words are up — and my time.
