Dry Beans Down — Peas Up
Stocks of dry beans in commercial warehouses and on farms, totaled 630,000 bags on March 1 of this year. Dry pea stocks in the same positions totaled 1,390,000 bags.
The movement of dry beans and peas has been heavy the past three months, the March 1 stocks of beans being 987,000 bags less than on last December 1, and the stock of peas 1,093,000 bags less than on the same date. Farm stocks of both beans and peas were low, as is usual for this season of the year.
Commercial warehouse stocks of Great Northern beans, this state's most important variety, were 400,000 bags, or about 45 per cent less than a year ago. Similar stocks of Small Reds and Pintos, the next two important varieties, were about one half of what they were last year. Stocks of garden seed and other miscellaneous commercial varieties were considerably larger.

Building Elevator Addition
The Lewiston Grain Growers are engaged in the construction of a 20,000-bushel capacity addition to their Juliaetta warehouse.
Wade Keene, local manager, says they plan on having enough storage capacity to care for the bumper crop expected in that vicinity this fall.

While we went in port a lot of the fellows went out looking for Cowery shells to make necklaces out of. I just couldn't get very enthusiastic about that, however. I always did a lot of swimming until I got a coral fungus in my ears. I got it cured up, though, and then went back in again.

Say, Mac, is there anyone else here that I could look up? I don't go ashore very often now, but would like to look up some of the boys. Myra can tell you where I am. I think I could too, but then, I don't want to take the chance. I'll be looking forward to getting the Gazette at my new address. 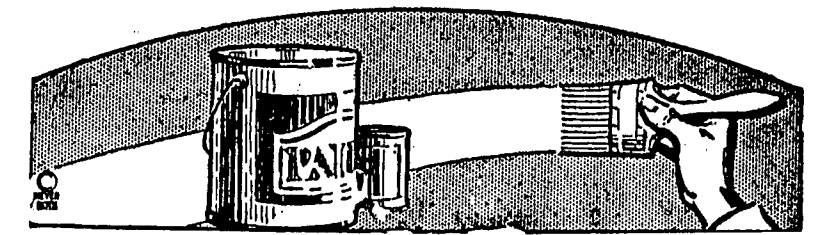

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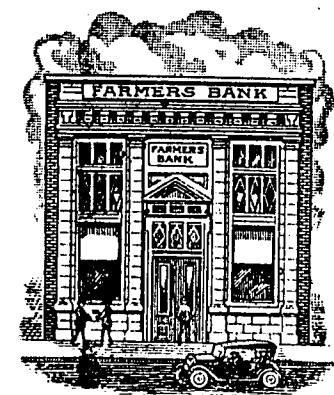

YARD-STICK FOR A FARMER COOPERATIVE

The rules laid down by the United States Government for a farmer cooperative are specific. Generally speaking, a non-profit farmers' cooperative . . .

1. Is democratically controlled by its members — usually "one farmer, one vote."
2. Returns its net savings to users.
3. Treats all users alike, whether members or non-members.
4. Does most of its business with farmer members.
5. Does, in the case of a purchasing association, at least 85 per cent of its dollar volume of business with agricultural producers.
6. Has most of its stock and voting rights in the hands of active patrons.
7. Limits rate of dividends on capital stock to a nominal rate of interest.
8. Maintains records showing its operations and its members' equities.

9. Has only reasonable reserves for necessary purposes.

"don't worry. The train won't leave for a while. It can't go without me and I'm having too much fun to leave yet. You see, I'm the engineer."

Arrived in good shape and am rapidly getting settled. On the whole living conditions are more comfortable than expected. We live in basha huts with bamboo walls and rice stalk roofs. Floors are cement. We have electricity and a good station near so radio reception is excellent — when we have time to listen. There is no provision for heat except a fireplace in "the club" so mornings and evenings are quite chilly.

We are very lucky, so far, to enjoy such comfortable living conditions, even though we are figured farther away from home than men in any other theatre.

Sends Home "Money"

Thursday afternoon of last week Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Deobald received a small cigar box full of coins from their son, Pfc. Charles Deobald, now in Germany. The coins consisted of English, French, Belgian and German — some of silver, some of copper.

There also was a considerable number of German bills, ranging in face value from 1 Mark to 10,000,000 marks! Their valuation apparently is that of scrap paper — but as keepsakes and souvenirs they are the best.

The dates on the coins ranges from 1878 to 1944!

April 3, 1945

Somewhere In Germany

Dear Mac and Bill: Greetings from the . . . Division of the . . . Army. Received my first copy of the paper in a long time today and have spent most of the afternoon reading and re-reading the home-town news.

We have been in combat for several days now and our tank crew is credited with several active engagements with the enemy.

Enclosed is a picture of a German tank — one of Germany's most dangerous types. When you have run into one of these your over-optimistic mind reminds you that the war in the E. T. O. (European theatre of Operations) is not over as yet.

Tonight we are feasting on German sardines and drinking up their schnapps.

My mind is relieved somewhat as rumors say we are due for a rest sometime in the near future.

In the turmoil of this catastrophic war, there are times when one's mind is permitted to wander back to more pleasant days, and I imagine along with several million others, that's what I'm looking for to — the day I shall again set foot on good old U. S. soil!

Now, after giving you my new A. P. O. number . . . , I shall have to sign off and go on guard duty.
