Meat Point Changes Few
The point value of practically all meats, fats and oils will remain unchanged for the June rationing period which ends Saturday, June 30, Chester Bowles, OPA administrator announces.

Fatbacks, clear and regular plates were increased 3 points, making the new value 8 points per pound. Bacon plate was upped 3 points to 8 points a pound, and pork sides, aged and dry-cured were increased 1 point to make the value 9 points a pound. All other pork cuts, beef, lamb and mutton, and all koshered meat point values are unchanged.
The weekly supplies of meats available for civilians during June will be about 7 per cent less than in May, Mr. Bowles added.

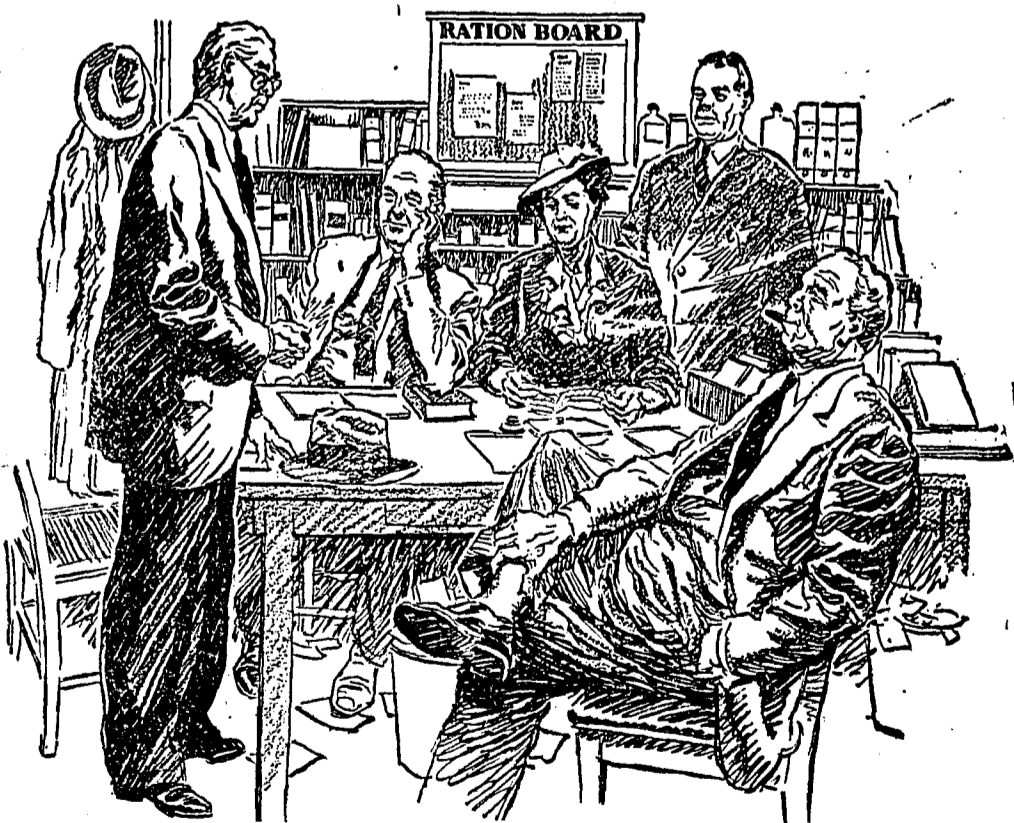
Both fall and spring wheats are doing nicely — but bean planting and summer fallow plowing is being held up by the rains.

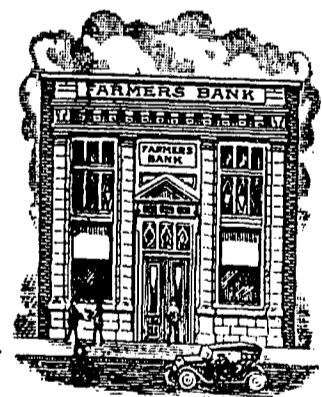

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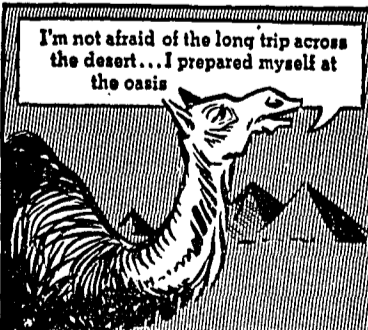

Canning Sugar Ration Cut

An order reducing allotments of home canning sugar from 15 pounds to 10 pounds per person was received by local rationing board Saturday.

Of the 10 pounds of sugar per person, a maximum of 5 pounds per person may be used for jams and jellies, up to a maximum of 25 pounds for a family of eight or more.

"The order is effective immediately and will continue indefinitely during the present emergency sugar supply situation," A. A. Hayden, district food rationing representative of Spokane said. The order applies to California, Arizona, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and northern Idaho.

"The order was necessary to assure every customer an equal share of the curtailed sugar supply and to prevent possible complete suspension of home canning rations," Hayden said. He also praised inland Empire housewives for their "patriotism and fair play" in applying for canning sugar, explaining that during 1944 this region applied for less than 50 per cent of the national per capita average, despite the fact that it is a major fruit and berry producing area.

Comment: Apparently the "patriotism and fair play" of the inland Empire housewives during the past year was their undoing, for apparently the rest of the nation, including southern Idaho, is to be allowed the former 15 pound limit! And the fact that we are a major fruit and berry producing area seems to have nothing to do with the matter, as the fruit and berries can rot on the trees or be picked and shipped to a more "sugar favored area."

Perhaps the drastic order is necessary, but at least the whole nation should be treated alike. Fair play and individual initiative were two of the things that made our nation great - but they do not seem to be in the "dictionary of the swivel chair warmers!"

Eagles Trounce Kendrick, 12-8
Their lineup revamped and their hearts beating with hopes for revenge, the Lewiston Eagles baseball team turned the tables on the Kendrick town team at Bengal field, Lewiston, last Sunday afternoon, and emerged at the long end of a 12-8 count.

The victory was doubly sweet to them after the 15-5 shellacking the Kendrick team handed them when they met at Juliaetta a week ago, and thus the two teams are even with a grudge battle necessary to determine the "champion."

When the Kendrick sluggers unlimbered their bats for a three-run barrage in the first inning on a pair of hits assisted by bobbles by Eagle players, the picture was not too bright, and it was not until the fourth frame that the Eagles snapped to life to take a lead and hold it.

The Eagles garnered four tallies in the third and fourth, driving Brammer, Kendrick starting pitcher, to the showers. The victors added one in the sixth and two in the eighth to finish their scoring.

Kendrick's scoring after the first frame included two in the third and three in the sixth. Kendrick had the better of the argument in errors, being chalked up with five, while the Eagles amassed eight.
