PORTLAND SHOWS FIRMNESS

CASH WHEAT SITUATION AT

advance of 31% c per bushel in the ceiling price of wheat, less favorable Oklahoma and Texas, from the last official forecast, which was based on May 1 conditions. Flour demand both for civilian and army needs was heavy. Strength in wheat, along with a broad demand for cash grain of all kinds strengthened the entire grain list.

The cash wheat market situation at Portland appeared somewhat unsettled with bid prices on the Ex-change at the close of the period ranging from unchanged to 2c per bushel higher compared with a week ago. The strength in midwestern wheat futures tended to give an undertone of firmness although this maarket did not follow the full advances registered at those points. Trade reports continued to indicate generally dull cash wheat market here with very light trading. De-mand was not urgent from terminal mills or dealers and offerings from the country remained small. Wheat receipts of about 725 cars of which Portland had 305 cars for the week principally represented movement of C. C. C. supplies. Mills in this area report continued difficulty in obtaining sufficient supplies of Montana wheat for their milling operations. Mills were mostly working on government flour contracts and appeared well covered on their wheat requirements from earlier purchases. Winter wheat in the Pacific North-west has been benefited by recent rains and heading is becoming gen-eral. Spring grain shows improve-ment generally and rains have been helpful to pastures and ranges.
