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

Immediate and continuous cooling of cream while on the farm will go far toward preserving its wholesomeness, but nothing can protect it indefinitely against the ravages of time. Therefore, there is nothing to gain, and every-thing to lose, by undue holding of cream on the farm.

of cream on the farm.

Cream deteriorates with age.
One day in the life of cream is equivalent to a decade in the life of a human. The longer it is held the greater the probability that it will be of a poorer quality and bring a lower price.

Any slight flavor defect that may have developed in the cream is made more pronounced by age

is made more pronounced by age. Old cream has a characteristic flavor of its own — even though it may be sweet. This is known as "old cream flavor" to cream graders and butter experts. Producers are frequently tempted to hold cream longer in win-

ter than in summer. It is true that deterioration takes place more slowly in low temperatures. Age, however, affects cream in any temperature. The only way to market top-quality cream is to eliminate this age factor

This can be done by setting up regular deliverly schedule. Someone on the farm usually goes to town every day or two, so it should not be difficult to send cream to market frequently. However, if for any reason frequent deliverly is not possible, even more attention must be given to cleanliness in production and cream cooling and care.
