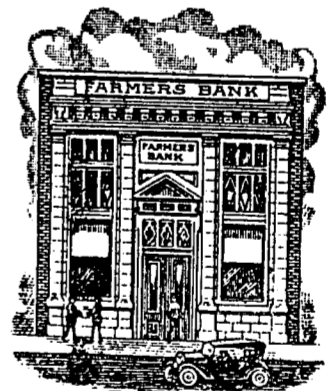

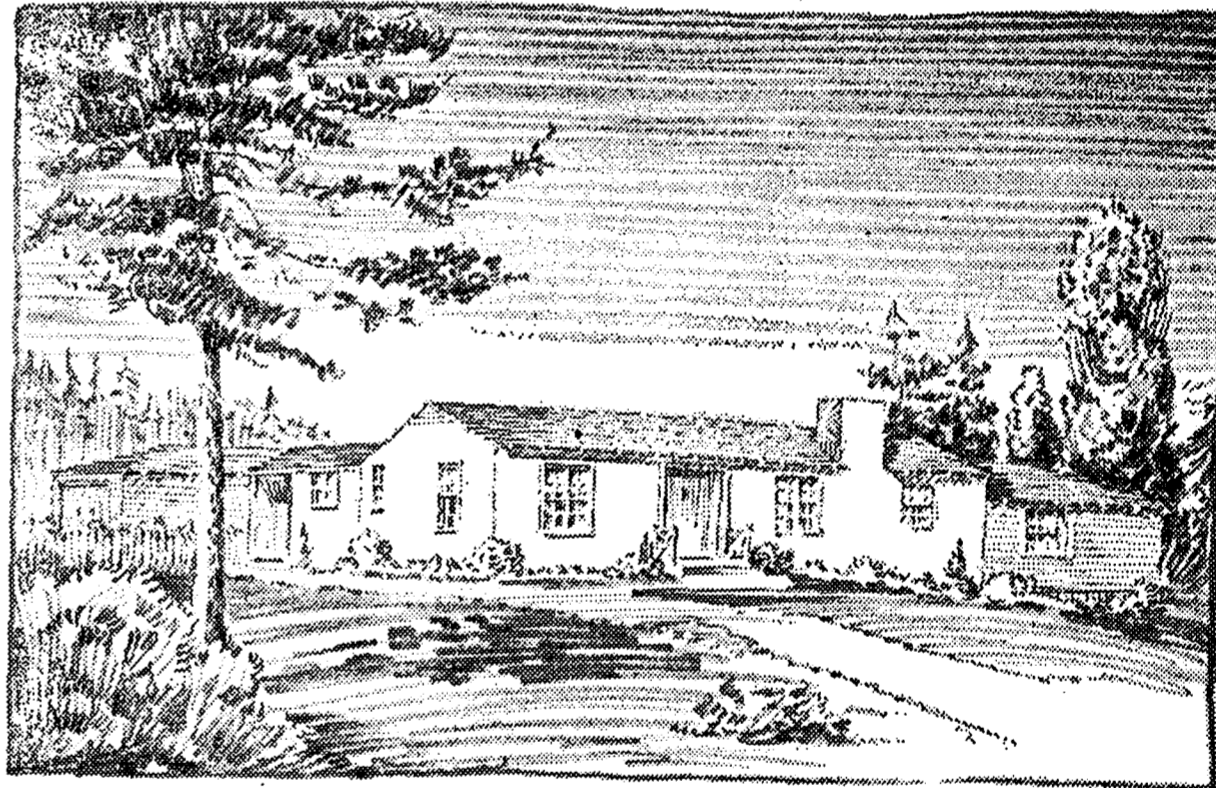

of real use to him on his return to civilian life.

Lt. Roy E. Long, who arrived home early last week, was a Gazette caller Tuesday morning, and told us something of his travel experiences in the 44 months he was overseas. Roy, who held a reserve commission in the R. O. T. C., was called to the colors early in 1942. He was assigned to active duty shortly after that, and on March 3rd, 1942, left Brooklyn, N. Y. in a south-bound convoy, which went by the way of the Panama Canal. Forty-two days later they landed in New Zealand. After a short stay there they went on to Melbourne, Australia, where his unit was stationed for five months. Roy says that the country around Melbourne is beautiful and the climate fits the scenery. He found the Australian people most friendly, and says that he greatly enjoyed his stay there (if army life could be called enjoyable).

From Melbourne they were transferred to Townsville, Australia, going from there to New Guinea, where they landed at Port Morsby. Here he flew the Owen Stanley mountains to Buna, New Guinea. Shortly after landing there he found Jim Kuykendall, Fred Clemenhagen, Roy Fairfield, Ervin Halseth and Dale Hughes. It was here that the local boys held get-togethers as regularly as possible — and during this time saw plenty of natives. The native women wore grass skirts and/or a "gee" string. The children wore nothing.

From Buna he was transferred to Port Morsby, Australia, then to Cairns, Australia, where he spent three months. From this point he was sent to Finchaven, New Guinea. Here again he met the Kendrick boys. Later he was transferred to Biak Schouten Island (off the coast of New Guinea), and while stationed here also met Felix Holt, and later Tommy Brown. On this island Roy spent 13 months, and here the weekly Kendrick get-togethers became a regular institution. Irvin Halseth, who had been hospitalized, being the only one missing from the group. They compared home letters, and home news, and shared the Gazette they received, often one getting a copy none of the others ever received.

From Biak Lt. Long was transferred to the Philippines, being stationed near Manila for the four months preceding his trip home. Here he met Frank Abrams, and says that he is "just fine."

From Manila he took ship for home, his boat being partially loaded with Canadian, Australian and British soldiers, former prisoners of the Japs, touched first at Vancouver, Canada, where these men were

discharged. He says that if ever men got a welcome, these did. The whistles on every boat in the harbor, as well as on all the factories, apparently being tied down. Bands were there — in short, it was the finest welcome anyone could wish.

After leaving Vancouver the boat went on to Seattle, where the American troops were unloaded, some for Fort Lewis, some for Fort Douglas. Roy went to Fort Lewis, and is now at home on terminal leave — and has not yet been discharged.

Besides his "hash marks" for 44 months of overseas service, Roy has three Battle Stars — Papuan, New Guinea and Luzon, and of course, his campaign ribbons.

Roy says that home is sure well, and that as soon as he can "thaw out" he intends to take a fishing trip and get acquainted with the Idaho woods again — which will be a real change from the jungles of the South Pacific islands.

Roy also extends his thanks to all for the Gazette. He says that sometimes he got from three to five — sometimes they never arrived — but the ones he did get, together with those received by the other boys — enabled them to get a pretty good picture of the doings of Kendrick.

Pfc. Ward Helton, who has been stationed for the past year, at Houston, Texas, arrived home Tuesday night, bringing with him his honorable discharge papers. Ward has been in the service for about two years — and received his discharge on the "over-age" basis.

Ward wishes to "thank all concerned for the paper. He says it helped a lot to relieve the monotony of Texas — besides keeping him well posted on the home-town doings.

Cpl. Herbert McDowell, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. McDowell, arrived home Tuesday evening from the E. T. O. We have not seen him as yet, so do not know whether he brought his discharge papers home with him, or whether he is on furlough. However, if it is on furlough his service is sure to be terminated soon, since he has seen nearly five years of service, having been a member of the original National Guard unit.

Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Deobald received a letter from their son, Sgt. Charles Deobald, stating that he was sailing from France on October 15, on a tanker, and that he had high hopes of reaching home in time for Thanksgiving!

According to a dispatch appearing in the Lewiston Tribune Tuesday, Cpl. Kenneth Sleed, Cameron, a member of the 775th Bomb Squadron, has received his honorable discharge.

S/Sgt. and Mrs. Glenn Newman arrived from Spokane Wednesday. Glen is now a civilian, having been honorably discharged from the A. A. F. at Fort George Wright, Spokane, after 35 months of service.

Word has been received that Miss Helen Newman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred W. Newman, has received her assignment for training. Her address now is: Helen Newman U. S. C. N. C. French Hospital School of Nursing, Fifth Ave. and Geary Blvd., San Francisco 18, Calif.

Pfc. Floyd S. Tout, a brother of Doy Tout, arrived in Kendrick last week after three years service in the U. S. army, bringing with him his honorable discharge papers. His wife remained in North Ireland, but plans to come to America as soon as transportation is available. Floyd is visiting friends and relatives here at this time.
