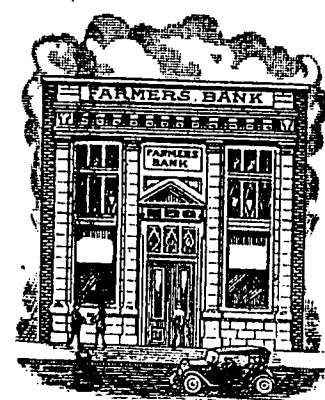

San Pedro, Calif.
Nov. 14, 1945

Dear Folks:
Last night as I was reading the Kendrick Gazette I saw where Bob Lind was on the Cassin Young, so I looked on the "ships present" list and the ship was on it, and the phone number, so I called the ship and asked for Bob, and they got him on the phone and we talked for a while.

At 4:00 o'clock I put on my dress blues and went out the gate which is along the highway on the road to Long Beach, and went on board the ship. In a little while Bob came and

showed me all over the ship. It was being repaired and the yard men were working on it — civilians doing most of the work. They were repairing the damage that a suicide plane had done. This ship has been here for some time, but this was the first time I had known Bob was aboard.

Bob is coming to visit me here at the station tomorrow, so I'll close for now, put my dress blues away and go to bed.
