A DAIRY FARMER MESSAGE; CONSUMER DESERVES BREAK

I have received requests that 1 acquaint farmers with some of the bad practices which the Federal Food and Drug Administration knows to be going on in many places in the dairy industry — about seizures of interstate shipments of cheese, butter and other items made from dirty cream and milk — about the prosecutions of dairy products manufacturers who are operating insanifacturers who are operating insani-tary plants or are using filthy raw materials. In connection with these requests frequent statements have been made that "about the only improvement made in 40 years in the dairy industry has been made in factories." These are odd requests and statements.

The delivery of dirty, filthy or otherwise suitable milk and cream to dairy processing plants should long ago have been stopped, as well as the utilization by manufacturing plants of unfit material for the citizens of their own states. Quoting from the 1944 Annual Report prepared by Dr. Paul B. Dun-Commissioner of Foods & Drugs - "There has been no perceptible improvement since last year in the quality of cream used in but-termaking." He also remarked: "Cheese factory sanitation has improved but far too many cheese plants are accepting dirty milk." Stated also is the following: "The Dairy Project involves a very long-range change in the fundamentally bad industry practices originating on the forms where creaming the farms where cream is permitted to become filthy or decomposed and continuing to the processor who will accept unfit cream and in some in-stances churn it under insanitary factory conditions." That report also mentions that straining devices remove but the visible evidences of filth. The need is stressed for the prevention of filth contamination.





ceiling price for newsprint was announced here December 6 by the
Office of Price Administration.

Although it became effective December 11, the increase generally will not be applied by the industry until January 1, 1946, the OPA said, as most newsprint is sold on a yearly contract basis with quarterly adjustments.

The increase, according to the OPA, was recommended by the Newspaper Industry Advisory committee and was allowed after a study of production costs for nine months of 1945 and estimated costs during the first quarter of 1946.

The OPA said that while the pur-

pose of the increase was to assure prices that were "generally fair and equitable," it also "should operate to check further decreases in U. S. newsprint production, which has been gradually declining for some years.

The higher prices apply to all newsprint sold in this country, including imports which represent three-fourths of the total consumption. Canada is the principal source of imports.
