IDAHO BIG GAME BE FED IF NECESSITY ARISES

With snow piled high in the Idaho mountains and temperatures dropping to the shivering end of the thermometer, the Fish & Game department is ready to take care of wildlife that may be hard pressed to live through a tough winter...

Hay, both loose and baled, has been hauled to convenient points. Stock cubes are also stored at these stations in barns in bins. When it appears to conservation officers in close contact with the situation that game requires supplemental feed...

Experience in Idaho and other states has demonstrated that supplemental feed can keep deer and elk only for a short time. Probably six weeks at the maximum. Natural browse even in limited quantities is much better for the animals...

Three areas where feeding is likely to be necessary and where preparations have been made are: South Fork of Boise river; South Fork of Payette river; and Warm Springs creek in the Ketchum area.

An effort to reduce the herds that are likely to be short of natural feed in tough winters was made last fall by the game department. A number of special hunts were authorized.

G. S. C. S. Christmas Party

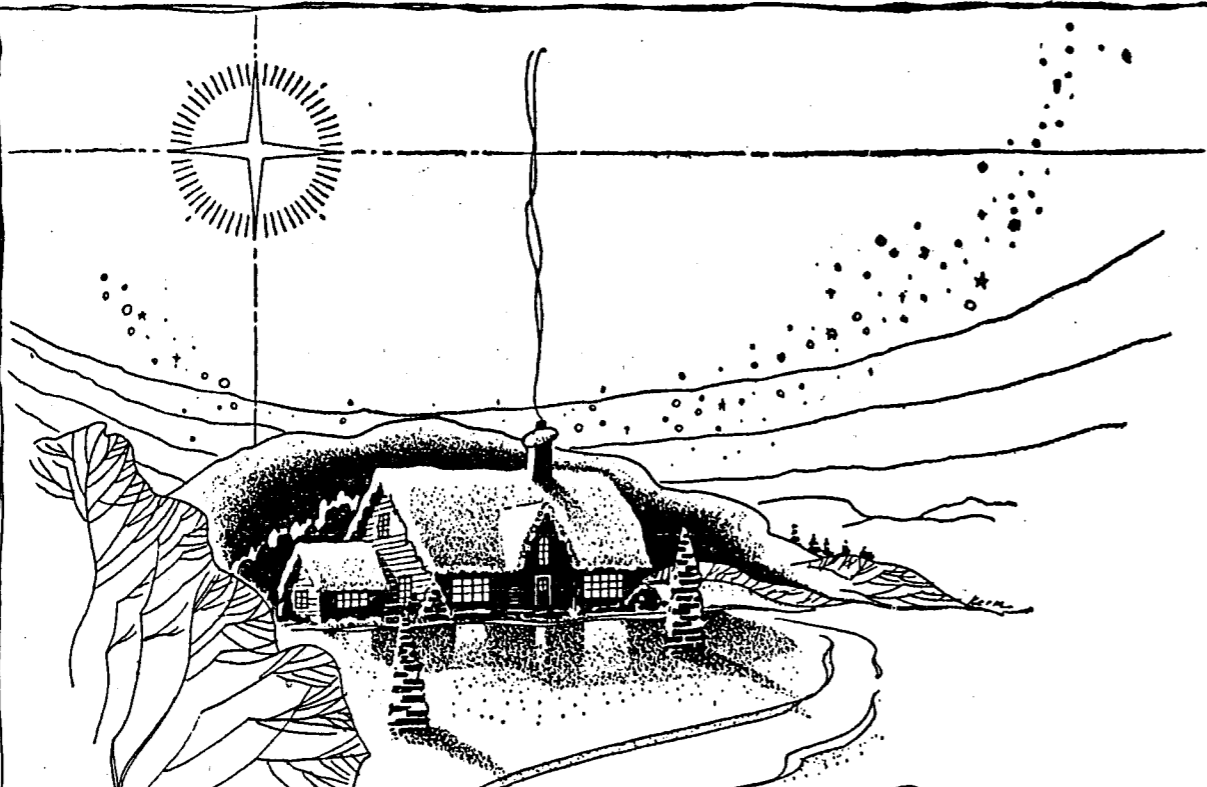

**JUST SNOW FOR CHRISTMAS**

Santa Claus may have sacked his reindeer this year for one of the later model rocket ships to make his first peace-time deliveries to America in four years. And no matter how he comes, he will still be met with anticipation by wide-eyed children.

But though Santa may ride in style this year, will he have enough of those nice toys to give to all deserving children? The price of toys as well as the prices on many other things have gone up these last few wartime Christmases. Last year Santa didn't mind paying high prices for toys because he was working for victory in an airplane factory at high wages, taking only time off for Yuletide to slip down a few chimneys with his precious cargo and fill empty stockings.

This year, however, Santa is back at his old job of repairing toys and planning packages because he is no longer needed to build airplanes. His wages are also back to normal, but the price he must pay for children's gifts is still at the war-time level. Last year Santa couldn't get bicycles, scooters or little wagons. He's glad he may include at least some of those things this year, but he can't equal his previous peace-time quotas because he doesn't feel he has the money to pay the increased price demand.

The O. P. A. has done a wonderful job of keeping charges down during inflationary threats. Santa realizes this, but he hoped that the government may soon remedy the high prices and poor quality of toys and other items which are so necessary to fill those stocks on Christmas morning. — Jewell May, Moscow.

**Newsprint Up \$6.00 Per Ton**  
Washington, D. C. — An increase of \$6.00 a ton in the manufacturer's ceiling price for newsprint was announced here December 6 by the Office of Price Administration.

Although it became effective December 11, the increase generally will not be applied by the industry until January 1, 1946, the OPA said, as most newsprint is sold on a yearly contract basis with quarterly adjustments.

The increase, according to the OPA, was recommended by the Newspaper Industry Advisory committee and was allowed after a study of production costs for nine months of 1945 and estimated costs during the first quarter of 1946.

The OPA said that while the purpose of the increase was to assure prices that were "generally fair and equitable," it also "should operate to check further decreases in U. S. newsprint production, which has been gradually declining for some years.

The higher prices apply to all newsprint sold in this country, including imports which represent three-fourths of the total consumption. Canada is the principal source of imports.

**Prospects For Minister**  
Rev. Fred K. Pederson, district superintendent of the M. E. church, accompanied by Mrs. Bishop, Walla Walla, met Tuesday afternoon with a group in the home of Mrs. W. L. McCreary, in the interests of placing a minister in the Community church pulpit. Rev. Pederson brought the news that Senior Chaplain Bishop from the Walla Walla Army Air Base will come to fill the pulpit here on Sunday morning, Dec. 30, and will continue to serve until after Conference in June.

Chaplain Bishop comes highly recommended, having served 26 years in the ministry. He has been stationed at Walla Walla for the past two years, but he and his family are from Tennessee, having worked there 24 years with the mountain people in the rural areas.

The reason Chaplain Bishop is available for this period is that he has been discharged from the army but wishes to stay until a daughter graduates from the Walla Walla high school in June, they then plan to return to Tennessee and resume their work there.

On this basis he will be available here three days per week.

**State Chairmen Appointed**  
Idaho's 1946 "Fight Infantile Paralysis Campaign" of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is getting underway with the appointment of two state chairmen.

Mrs. R. L. Brainard, Wardner, has been appointed state advisor for the women's activities, and Mrs. Victor Goertzen, Twin Falls, state director of publicity.

With the mailing of the publicity kits to county chairmen and the county directors, the campaign from January 14 to 31 is officially launched. The March of Dimes has become synonymous with the nationally organized fight against poliomyelitis, directed and unified by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

**Parsonage Now Completed**  
The house remodeling program begun on the local Full Gospel Church parsonage some weeks ago by Rev. Damron and his parishioners, has finally been completed, and he, with his family, moved in this week.

The house was almost completely rebuilt, including a modern bathroom. The interior is finished in Celotex, which gives warmth as well as good looks.

**Radio Noise Filter**  
Radio listening pleasure is being increased by a radio noise filter. This device eliminates static or buzzing in electrical equipment so that when your neighbor is performing with a vacuum cleaner or electric razor, you will still be able to tune in your favorite program. The little gadget was developed during the war to make better radio reception possible aboard the giant B-29s.

**42 Years Of Flight**  
 The gigantic "ships" that sail the skies today are a far cry from the contraption that Wilbur and Orville Wright coaxed into the air forty-two years ago from the dismal dunes at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. There, on December 17, 1903, the first heavier-than-air machine flew under its own power. That first flight lasted about 12 seconds and covered 120 feet — a distance less than the wing span of some of the modern sky goliaths.  
 But in spite of the brevity of the flight, the Wrights had realized the dream of the ages. They had opened a new world. But they little dreamed how vast a world it was or how profoundly their achievement was to affect the lives and destiny of the peoples of the earth.  
 Like so many other great inventions the airplane has been used for evil purposes as well as good.
