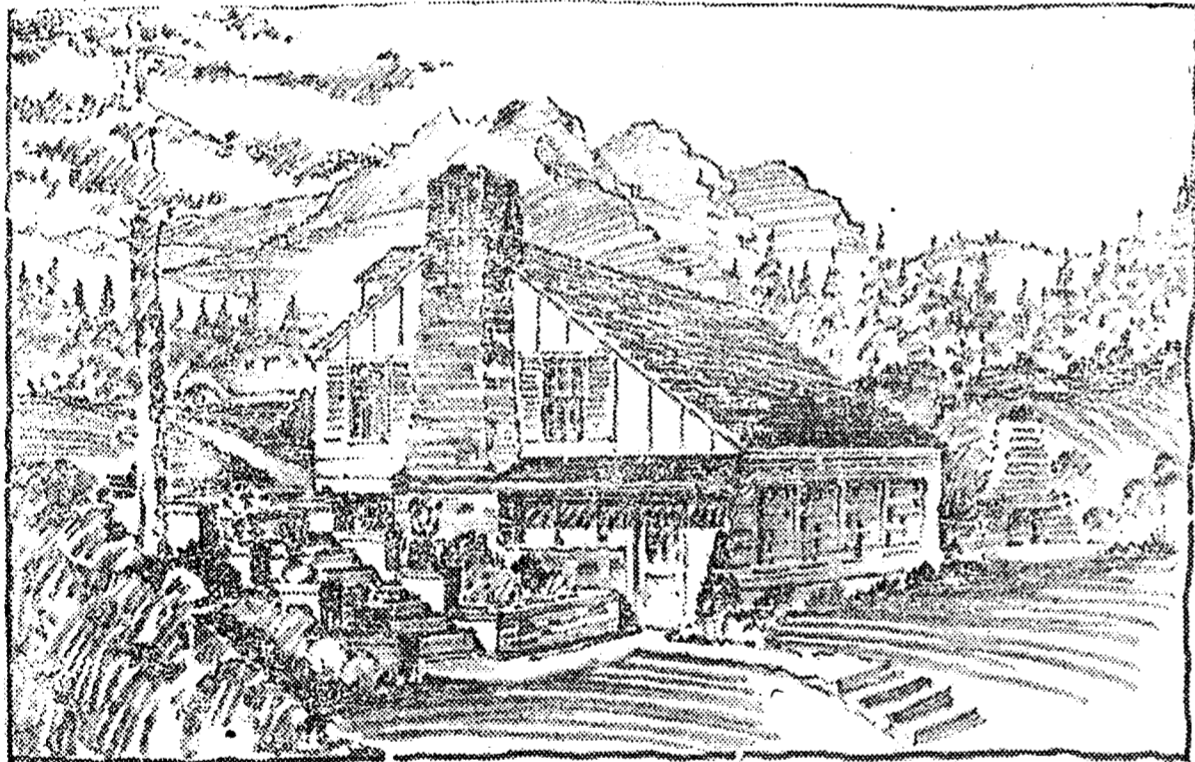

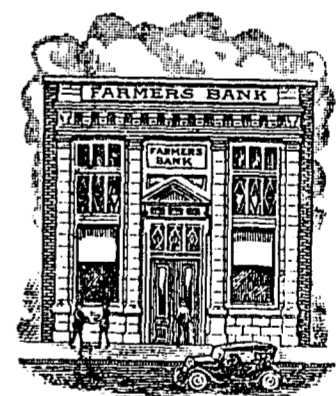

Needham entered the service in 1938 with the Washington state national guard, and on Dec. 14, 1941, left the states for Hawaii. He participated in the battle of Makin island in 1942, in Saipan in 1944 and in Okinawa in 1945. He received two wounds within 18 days while on Okinawa and Tsugen Jima.

He was serving with the 27th infantry division when wounded. He also had served with the 41st, 25th and 24th divisions. He was hospitalized in Okinawa and Saipan prior to being sent home. He arrived in San Francisco in August, 1945, and received his discharge Aug. 9 at the Fort Lewis separation center. He is entitled to wear the Asiatic-Pacific ribbon with the three battle stars, the pre-Pearl Harbor, American theater, good conduct (with clasp) and victory ribbons, and the combat infantry badge.

Needham has some definite ideas on the chances of making a democracy out of Japan. "The Japs are the kind of people that have to have a strong leader, someone to tell them what to do and when. When they lost their leaders on the islands, the Japs fell apart and were unable to hold their outfits together. They didn't know what to do without someone to tell them."

"They never surrender, especially so was this true on Saipan, when we had to go and get each Jap practically individually. It was strictly a case of wiping out every Jap on the island," Needham added. He is living at the home of his father, B. W. Needham, Clarkston, and is now employed as clerk at the Bollinger hotel.

MoMM 3/c Bennie E. Rush, Cameron, son of Mrs. Geo. McKinnon,

has been honorably discharged from the navy, according to a dispatch received from the separation center at Shoemaker, Calif.

Pfc. Richard (Dick) Benscoter, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Benscoter of American ridge, arrived home last week-end to spend a short furlough with his parents, and other relatives. Dick, who is with the A. A. F. and has been stationed at Mather Field, near Sacramento, Calif., with a B-29 group, expects to go overseas soon after his return, probably to Japan, although some of the Pacific islands may well be their destination.

Dick says he finds the army life "not too bad" and some of their work very interesting.

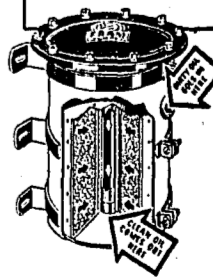
