SERVICES HELD FOR TOM STURDEVANT, AREA PIONEER

Funeral services for Tom Sturdevant, pioneer of this section, were held Saturday, March 23, at Short's Chapel, Moscow, with the Rev. L. W. Damron of the Kendrick Full Gospel Church in charge. Mrs. Aas sang "No Burdens Yonder" and "Going Home," with Mrs. C. L. Woodward accompanying. Burial was in the Moscow cemetery.

Mr. Sturdevant met death Wednesday morning of last week as the result of a fall from the upper floor of the planing mill at the Kendrick Bean Growers.

Thomas Horner Sturdevant was born October 12, 1874, at Neosho, Missouri, the eldest of a family of eight children. He died March 20, 1946, while engaged in his work at Kendrick. His age at the time of death was 71 years, five months and eight days.

Mr. Sturdevant came west from his birthplace to Colfax, Wash., in August of 1903, and moved from there to the Gold Hill section, near Southwick, in 1905. In 1913 he located in Kendrick, where he made his home until the time of his death. He was a member of the Christian Church.

Surviving relatives include one brother, Leonard Sturdevant of Lewiston, Idaho; three sisters, Mrs. Emma Jergensen of Boise; Mrs. Anna Lynn of Seattle, and Mrs. Ida Lyons of Southwick, as well as a number of nieces and nephews.

Mr. Sturdevant numbered his friends almost as he numbered his acquaintances, and his passing leaves a niche in the community not soon to be filled.

During his years of residence in this section Mr. Sturdevant operated a sawmill, a lumber yard and cabinet shop and was local manager for some time of the Continental Oil plant here. He was probably better known for his fine violin making artistry.

Full bearers at the services were five nephews and a young friend. They are as follows: Clarence Sturdevant, Moscow; Charley Sturdevant, Lewiston; Dan Lyons, Spokane; Clem Lyons and George Lyons, Southwick and Milton E. Lind, Kendrick.

AMERICAN FALLS CHAMPS VIA TWO-WIN ROUTE

The following accounts of the championship games between American Falls and Kendrick at Pocatello last Friday and Saturday evenings are taken from the Lewiston Tribune who received them via Associated Press from Pocatello.

Tigers Lose 56-34
Pocatello, March 22.—The American Falls Beavers, playing close defensively and hot on the backboards, defeated Kendrick 56 to 34 tonight in the opening game of the state class B high school basketball tournament.

Outclassed as to size, Kendrick put up a battle all the way and kept the Beavers especially busy in the first quarter, until their superior marksmanship took them out of reach of the Tigers.

The game opened with a barrage of shots at the basket by both sides. Charles Easterbrook, flashy Tiger forward, made the first score, but Ken Fackrell quickly knotted the count at 2-all, with a counter for the Beavers.

American Falls sank four more baskets in four tries, but Kendrick pressed them closely, emphasizing attempts at scoring rather than organizing a defense against the dead-eye southern regional winners.

The quarter ended with American Falls leading 15-14. In the second quarter American Falls pulled ahead with steady success under the basket, missing very few of its tries. Kendrick in this period began attempting long shots—many of which did not connect—which it continued throughout the game when the Tigers found themselves unable to penetrate the Beaver defense.

By midway in the quarter American Falls had pulled ahead to 25-16, and from then on the northern entry was out of the picture. American Falls led at the half 29-21. Abe Aguirre the Beavers small but mighty little guard, led out in the third period, running up basket after basket in the style which gave him scoring honors for the contest with a total of 19. The entire Beaver machine functioned smoothly, in contrast to the Kendrick five, in which only Charles Easterbrook seemed sure of himself. As the period ended the score was 44 to 29 for American Falls.

In the last period, the southern team pulled further ahead, with all members clicking on shots. Robert Wheeler, Beaver substitute guard, sank a spectacular 40-foot basket for the outstanding performance of the quarter.

E. Millard, Tiger forward, led the losers with 12 points; Easterbrook scored 11. The box score follows: American Falls (56) FG FT PF Tl. Saturday Night's Game
Pocatello, March 23 (AP) — The American Falls Beavers won the Idaho class B high school basketball tournament tonight, defeating Kendrick 44 to 34 in the first state playoffs since before the war.

A record crowd of 4,000 spectators cheered the south Idaho regional champs as they claimed their title with a more confident and somewhat slower style of play than they displayed in the opening encounter. The Beavers' win removed the necessity for a third game Monday. Kendrick's play was marked by poor shooting as they missed at least 25 close-in shots in the first half. American Falls led 16-9 at the quarter, 24-20 at the half and 32-27 at the start of the fourth quarter. The victory was not altogether a walkaway for the south Idaho team as the Tigers rallied strongly in both the second and fourth quarters. Forward Charles Easterbrook sparked the last period rally that brought Kendrick to the small end of a 33-32 score. In the second period Easterbrook, Brocke and Millard brought the score to 15-16 before American Falls could get started, but Morris led another Beaver advance to bring the count to 22-15 midway in the stanza. The two teams battled along in a fairly even cadence throughout the third quarter which ended 32-27 in favor of American Falls. Easterbrook made another field goal starting the last quarter, but Fackrell promptly made it 33-29 with a free throw. Another free throw by Millard and a field goal by Easterbrook placed Kendrick close behind at 33-32. Aguirre, Fackrell and Clark ran the count up to 40 for the Beavers, who attempted to stall the rest of the game. DALE MILLER MEETS DEATH IN ACCIDENT SUNDAY A. M.

Donald Dale Miller, 22, son of Mr. and Mrs. Donald A. Miller, Kendrick, met death by drowning following an automobile accident early Sunday morning, in which the pickup truck in which he was riding catapulted into Potlatch creek about a half mile beyond the city limits on the Deary highway.

Dale, with a group of friends had been to the show and were visiting and talking over old times until about 12:30 a. m., when Teddy Deobald started to drive Dale home in his father's pickup.

As we understand it, the two young men decided to go on out as far as the road junction, and then back to town. However, as the pickup rounded the last corner before the road junction, heading east, a large round shaft, about five feet long and weighing somewhere in the neighborhood of 300 pounds, which was carried as "ball" rolled across the bed, throwing the pickup sideways. Naturally, Teddy threw the wheel the other way, and the shaft was then thrown to the other side. The machine left the road, went down over the rocky road-side and landed up-side-down in Potlatch creek, about six or seven feet from shore, with the cab top resting on a large boulder, surrounded by water from six to eight feet in depth, with just about six inches of tires showing from the road, and the whole bottom of the machine being awash.

As the machine descended the embankment Dale was thrown forward and suffered a severe bruise across his forehead and across the bridge of his nose, evidently knocking him unconscious. Teddy was able to extricate himself and get atop the bottom of the pickup, where he made every effort possible to reach his companion, but was unable to do so. About this time, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Emmett, on their way home, came upon the scene. Roy, being unable to aid Teddy, returned to town for help. Sgt. Kenneth Long, of Julietta was the first to again reach the scene, and by wading in up to his armpits, was able to reach forward and touch the pickup. In his condition he assisted Teddy to shore, where by this time was suffering severely from cold and shock, and then made an effort to reach Dale, but was unable to do so. By this time Charles Deobald and Lloyd Israel were on the scene, and between the three young men got Dale ashore and applied artificial respiration, working in relays until the arrival of Dr. D. A. Christensen, but to no avail.

It is felt that had Dale not received the blow which knocked him unconscious he would have been able to extricate himself despite the deep, swift water, since he was a powerful swimmer.

Donald Dale Miller was born in Kendrick, Idaho, March 9, 1924. He attended school here during all his school years, graduating with the class of 1942. At the conclusion of his senior year he enlisted in the reserves, and in August of that year was enrolled in the C. A. A., transferring from that organization into the regular army in September of 1943, serving with the Air Corps as a skilled sheet metal worker. He was discharged from the service on Friday, March 8, at Camp Beale, Calif., and arrived home March 11. During his army duty he served at Muroc Army Air Base, Muroc, Calif., Chute Field, Ill., Hammer Field, Calif., and Stockton, Field, Calif.

Immediate survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Donald A. Miller, one brother, Delos Miller; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Crocker; two uncles, L. D. Crocker, Kendrick and Wallace Brammer, Marlin, Wn. Three cousins and other more distant relatives also survive.

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon, March 26, at 2:00 o'clock from the Kendrick Community church, with Chaplain E. Bishop delivering the message.

Music was furnished by a quartette composed of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ramey, Mrs. D. A. Christensen and W. A. Watts, who sang "In The Garden," "Beautiful Isle of Somewhere" and "Rock of Ages," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. H. C. Schupfer.

The numerous and beautiful floral offerings and the filled church bore mute testimony to the high esteem in which Dale was held by all. Active pallbearers were Teddy Deobald, Charles Deobald, Thomas Brown, Sidney Johnson, Allan Johnson and Eugene Lind. Honorary: Lloyd Israel, Robert Watts, Wm. A. Deobald, Arthur Fraser, Donald Fry, Joe Langdon and Donald Fraser. Services were in charge of Brower-Wann Chapel, Lewiston. Interment was in the Kendrick cemetery.

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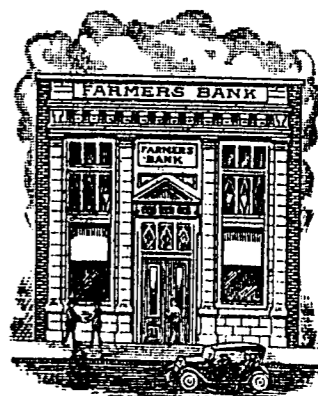

Farmers who are veterans can get help through priorities in obtaining housing materials. Part of the total production of most building materials is reserved for veterans — this includes brick, clay sewer pipe, structural tile, gypsum board and lath, cast iron soil pipe, bathtubs, lumber and millwork.

All building materials are under OPA price ceilings — so that prices should be uniform.

Applications for priorities on all building materials should be made to the nearest Federal Housing Administration.
