#### Bindlach, Germany April 24, 1946

Dear Mac: After a lapse of about five months the Gazette has caught up with me again. It is really a very, very welcome and newsy little paper.

My company has started construction of the G. I. military housing communities in Hof, Cobery and Bayreuth. Belive me, Mac, if I were a G. I. thinking of bringing a family over here to live in these houses I would really give the matter some and Mrs. Clarence Murch accompanserious considration before bringing them over here. These houses and the surroundings just don"t measure up to the standards to which most people back home are accustomed.

I hope to see all of you sometime around the last part of June — that is when I hope to receive my discharge from the army. Believe me, Mac, that's about all I can keep my mind on, getting back to civilian life once more.

I imagine quite a few fellows have tried their luck in Idaho's lakes and streams already this year. I went out last Sunday to a little creek close to Gossweinstein. I had to give a little German kid five cigarettes for a fishhook — but it was worth it.

Well, Mac, thanks a lot for all the news you've sent me since I've been in the service — and everyone else - my thanks to you, too. It has really been a swell gift.

Fewer Beans In Storage

Combined farm and commercial warehouse stocks of dry beans amounted to 626,000 bags on March 1 of this year, latest report date available. Dry pea stocks were 805,-000 bags.

Disappearance of both beans and peas from stocks has been moderately heavy during the past three months. The March 1 stocks of beans are 558,000 bags less than on December 1, and the stocks of peas decreased 436,000 bags during the same period. Stocks of beans on March 1, 1945, amounted to 630,000 bags and pea stocks were considerably higher than this year at 1,-390,000 bags.

As usual at this season in Idaho, farm stocks are low, but they are

also lower than last year. Dry peas on farm amounted to only 18,000 bags against 58,000 in 1945. On December 1, dry peas amounted to

94,000 bags. Commercial warehouse stocks of Great Northern beans, the state's most important variety, was 407,000 bags, seven thousands bags more than holdings a year earlier. Stocks of pinto and other varities were less than last year, while reds were higher. Other varities, chiefly garden seed, amounted to 116,000 bushels, 15.000 bushels less than last year. Heaviest increase in stocks of dry peas was in the edible types. Last March 1, stocks of wrinkled varities totaled 403,000 bags; current stocks are 333,000 bags.





This action was taken to enable the army, navy and other war service agencies to purchase butter at this time. No butter will be set aside for export shipment to foreign countries.

Military agencies expect to purchase about 45 million pounds of butter from U. S. supplies during 1946, and it is now planned to operate the set-aside program only during May and June, when production is seasonally largest.

On the basis of tentative estimates,

On the basis of tentative estimates, supplies of creamery butter for civilian use during May are considerably more than has been available during recent months.

Secretary of Agriculture Anderson says that our top job, now, will be to supply our share of the food for the hungry populations of the world. He adds: "All of us share in the responsibility — the farmers to produce and industry and individual families to save and share. We must not fail. Too much is at stake."

On their discharge from service they have been getting letters from GM, asking whether they are interested in work in a dealer's service department, thereby utilizing that wartime training, and whether GM can be of aid in placing them. More than 3,400 of them have taken the company up so far.
