Sign Electric Power Contract

Pierce and Headquarters, Idaho, will soon be using electric service provided by the Washington Water Power company, according to terms of contracts approved recently, it is announced by J. E. E. Royer, vice president and general manager of the power company.

Under terms of the contracts, the Washington Water Power company will construct 39 miles of transmis-sion lines from Orofino to the two towns which are to be served. Power will be sold at Pierce to the Pierce Light & Power company for distri-bution to consumers over its lines and will be served directly to resi-dents and the Potlatch Forests at Headquarters by the Water Power company. Headquarters is the cen-ter of logging activities of Potlatch Forests, Inc.

Both towns were previously served by diesel generating plants, that at Headquarters being operated by the lumber company, and that at Pierce by the Pierce Power & Light Co.

Surveys for the transmission lines will begin at once, and construction will begin in August, if materials are available. Weather and materials permitting, the towns will be receiving power in the late fall.

Galen Burghardt, manager of the Pierce Power & Light Co. said: "It gives us great pleasure to announce this new service to the people of Pierce. Under the new arrangements we will be able to provide more dependable service, and since our cost of power will be lowered through purchase from the Washington Water Power company, we in turn are planning a reduction in our rates so that people can use the service more liberally. Power will come to Pierce at 80,000 volts, and will go on to Headquarters at 13,000 volts."

"Although this new transmission line will be difficult to build," said Mr. Royer, "it will be completed if humanly possible before bad weather comes this fall. This extension of our service is part of the company's policy of providing electric service to as many families as possible in the Inland Empire."

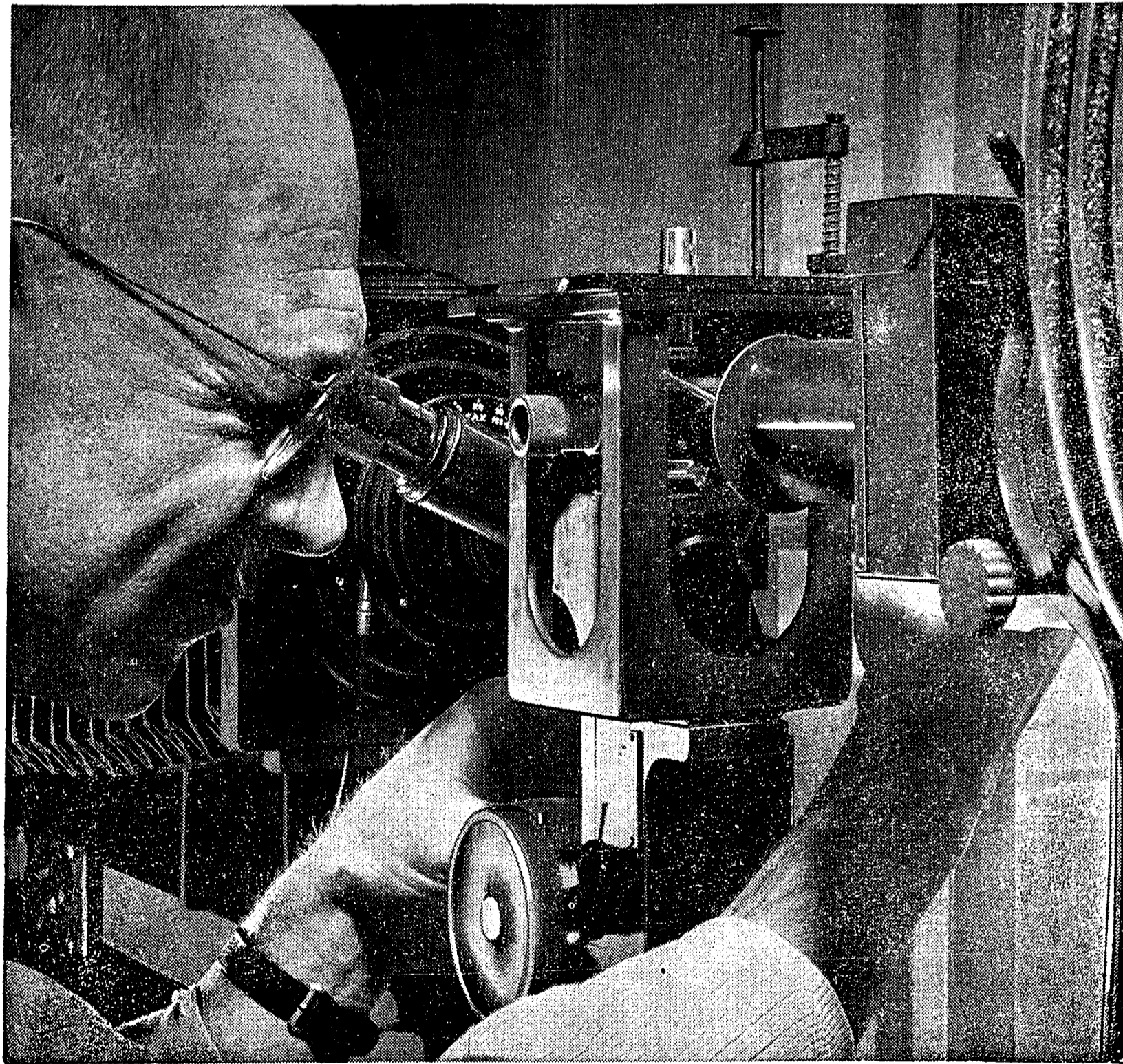

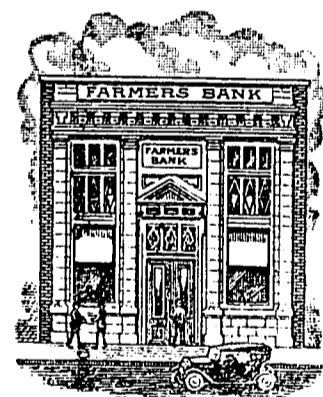

Prices Mounting Steadily
 Harvey Guertin, district director of the OPA, Spokane, today drew attention to the following rules:

Manufacturers of small electric appliances, such as toasters, warming pads and small space heaters have been granted a wage-price increase amounting to 8.5 per cent. The new increase will come through to consumers "dollar-wise" and will result in an increase of from four to five percent over existing retail ceiling prices. All retail prices are to be computed by manufacturers and the articles pre-ticketed.

Price ceilings have been suspended on envelopes at all levels of distribution, including retail. Control had been removed previously over stamped and paperette envelopes, envelopes sold with greeting cards and envelopes printed by commercial printers.

High Cost Of Highway Use

The history of the gasoline tax parallels that of every tax imposed in this country. The start is always made with a puny impost to which, as the sponsors sanctimoniously point out, no "right thinking" person would possibly object. Then the old tune of "taxing all the traffic will bear" is played interminably and soon everyone is paying through the nose.

Motorists are the chief source of all state tax revenue. They pay 37 per cent of all the tax revenue collected annually by the 48 states and the District of Columbia. In addition they pay over \$500,000,000 in automotive taxes annually to the federal government. Since its inauguration 27 years ago, more than \$16,000,000,000 have been paid in by motorists in gasoline taxes ostensibly for use on highways, often times not. Some \$1,500,000,000 will be collected from this source alone during 1946.

As the price of gasoline has gone down over the years, taxes have gone up. In 1921, for example, the average price of gasoline was approximately 30 cents a gallon. By 1923 the retail price had fallen to 21 cents and by 1932 to 13½ cents. The present average is approximately 14½ cents per gallon.

But the trend in gasoline taxation tells a different story. In 1923 the average tax on gasoline was actually less than 1 cent a gallon. In 1932 it was 4½c. By 1941, with an increase of 50 per cent in the federal levy and several so-called depression born "emergency" state tax increases, the average tax on gasoline had risen to six cents a gallon. Today, with an average tax of more than 6 cents on each gallon of motor fuel, the motorist is required to pay approximately 42 cents on each dollar's worth of gasoline, on an amount equivalent to a 42 per cent sales tax. While average retail prices have declined 52 per cent, the states have absorbed 20 per cent of this saving to motorists through increased taxes.

The really alarming part of the picture is that there seems to be no halting point to this continual increase in the tax load of the American motorist. Agitation to increase gasoline taxes — in some cases serious enough to crystallize in the 1947 legislative sessions, is already apparent in several states and no doubt others will seize the first available opportunity to join the cry for higher taxes at the expense, of course, of all motor vehicle operators.

The idea of all taxing units, federal, state and sometime local, seems to be that the automobile still belongs on the luxury list, whereas it long ago moved out of that class.

Perhaps the high taxes would not be so bad if all were used for highway purposes — but in many cases these taxes move into the so-called "general fund."

Trout Season Now Open

General trout season throughout Idaho began May 21. Thousands of men and women were out on the streams and lakes for the first day even though the water is high in most creeks. The spring run-off has been heavy, and there are indications that fishing will continue only fair except in streams that have reached their normal flow, for some time.

Bag and possession limit is 10 pounds and one fish, but not more than 20 fish. Number limit is the same as it was a year ago. The poundage limit has been reduced from 15 pounds as a conservation measure. A record number of fishermen and hunters — 162,000, kept streams and lakes whipped to a froth last summer, and an even greater number is expected this year.

Conservation officers suggest that some lure other than dry flies would be most likely to produce results during the early part of the season. Worms and spinners will be used extensively, with trolling the most popular method of taking fish in lakes.

The legal length limit for trout is still six inches. Five trout under six inches long may be taken in one day or kept in possession.

If success in Fend d'Oreille lake since May 1 is a criterion of the season, Idaho fishermen have a banner year in store. Many Kamloop rainbow running as large as 20 pounds have been caught. The northern lakes opened early, as did much of the Clearwater river.

All persons who fish must have a license. The resident license is \$2; non-resident \$5 for the season, \$2.00 for 10-days. Citizens of the United States who have resided in Idaho six months just before buying their license are entitled to the resident license. Servicemen stationed in Idaho may obtain resident licenses. Idaho residents at home on leave or furlough may obtain free permits from conservation officers for the time of their furlough.

Fishing regulations in handy pamphlet form may be obtained from license vendors and from the game department. In it closed waters are also listed by counties.

One of the notable changes this year is the fact that salmon eggs are again legal bait, but they, as well as other bait, must be attached to a hook. Chumming is prohibited. All fishing must be by hook and line only. Spearing or snagging of any fish is against the law.

also discovered that feed medicated with sodium fluoride expelled worms from many hundreds of pigs — cheaply and easily.

Department experts have also been doing plenty of work in the campaign against the codling moth, which is the bane of apple growers.

DDT continues to show marked superiority over lead arsenate and other standard materials. In many cases a half pound of DDT to 100 gallons of water was more effective than 3 pounds of lead arsenate. But here's something every user should certainly keep in mind. When DDT is used it is often followed by serious out-breaks of orchard mites unless steps are taken to control them. What's more, DDT is definitely poisonous to warm-blooded animals and so far there is no effective way to remove DDT residue. So friend, make haste slowly with DDT, and use it only on a limited acreage or experimental basis until the entomologists learn more about it.
