**NEWS FROM LOCAL MEN IN THE ARMED FORCES**

F/Sgt. Harry E. Newman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Newman, Cameron, arrived home Monday evening from Fort Douglas, Utah, bringing with him his honorable discharge papers — which he was awarded at Fort Douglas, June 1, after serving 23 months in the army, having entered the service June 30, 1944 — and of this time 18 months were spent overseas.

Harry landed at Glasgow, Scotland, January 5, 1945, making the crossing on the Queen Mary. His unit spent just three days in the British Isles, and landed at LeHarve, France, January 8, 1945, as replacements for the 358th infantry, 90th Division.

Immediately following their assignments to company, they left Le Harve and went into front-line combat on January 14, just on the edge of Bastogne, entering the lines as the battle for Bastogne was ending. Following this major battle his unit went through Luxembourg, and crossing the Our river on the ice, began another major battle as the fight for the Sigfried line got under way. After the successful breakthrough of that line, they crossed the Moselle river in assault boats and fought through the Eiffel hills to the Rhine river. Here they turned up river to the city of Mainz. After taking this city they crossed the Rhine river on March 24, 1945. Following this scrap they crossed the Main river to Darmstadt. By that time the Germans were in full retreat, and Harry said they began riding tanks.

After a bit of scouting about the country on "tank back" his unit took the Merkers Salt Mines, where Germany had hidden its gold reserve. Harry says that the "M-P's" were generally comfortable in the rear, but in this case were very much in evidence almost the instant word of the finding of the gold leaked out — and so it wasn't a case "of finders, keepers," as the M-P's mounted guard and the G. T's were "unable to fill their pockets."

From Merkers they took a "joy ride" to the town of Hoff, on the Czech border, where they were supposed to meet the "Ruskies," but the Russians weren't there yet, so they turned south along the Czech border — with one platoon of his company, the first ever to completely cross Germany, thus cutting it in two.

When the war ended his regiment was southeast of Pilsen, and on May 15 — one week after V-E day, the last Germans in that area surrendered — and that same day they met the Russians at Nepomuk, and when that happened Harry says there was a celebration royal — one he will never forget.

After remaining at Nepomuk a week his unit was pulled back to Nuremberg, where they closed off the Czech border, and where, besides doing police and clean-up duty, they began training for the P. T. O.

However, V-J Day coming before this training was completed, his outfit was broken up in October, the majority of them sailing for home. In the shuffle Harry was assigned to an engineering unit and a month later transferred to the 1258th Engineers at Nuremberg. Here they rebuilt the badly damaged Palace of Justice and the Grand Hotel in preparation for the great war trials which are now going on.

Harry said that he was able to attend these trials for one day — and saw the 20 German criminals considered responsible for a great many of the war's atrocities as well as for the war itself. He said that to see these 20 men sitting in a box about 25 by 35 feet in size, it was hard to imagine the cruelty and suffering and death for which they were responsible and on trial.

Shortly after this his unit was transferred to Bamberg, where they rebuilt an airfield for police duty. On completion of this project they were transferred to Bayreuth, where they began work on the G. I. housing communities (for families of G. I's) — and Harry advises all to think twice before leaving the states and attempting to make a home in these make-shift camps.

While working here the "powers-that-be" decided he had been in the service long enough, so started him homeward, Harry sailing from Bremerhaven, Germany on May 19 — and landed in New York on May 27. After 24 hours at Camp Kilmer, N. J., he left for Fort Douglas, where he drew his honorable discharge papers June 1st.

Harry looks the picture of health and says he feels that way, but is dog-gone glad to get home again — and feels that the "civilian life" which seemed to worry the army, isn't going to worry him a minute.

He wears three bronze Battle Stars: "Battle of the Bulge," "The Rhineland" and "Central Europe," also the Combat Infantryman's badge and the Good Conduct.

Brought home with him as souvenirs was a P-38 pistol, some binoculars, a couple of wrist watches, German and French coins, and other odds and ends.

Harry, who was a machine gunner, says that part of the fun of getting home is lost when he considers that out of his company alone 104 men were killed, and the full strength of the company was 164.

He wishes to thank all concerned for the paper, received more or less regularly during his period of service. But when it did come, it was a mighty welcome message from home.

M., San Francisco, Calif.

Archie writes some pretty encouraging letters about his new post, which is Okinawa, and I am so happy for him that he likes it there, as well as the Army Air Corps. Perhaps, since I worked for the army as a civil service employee in Puerto Rico and the Canal Zone prior to our marriage, I am not as dubious about life in the peace-time army and life overseas as some army wives who have never left the states. From my experience I saw that the army did everything possible to make its families comfortable. Quarters were modern and rent cheap. Food was plentiful in the commissary and about half price. Recreation facilities were abundant in the way of tennis courts, swimming, golf courses, clubs, jeep rides, rifle ranges, etc. Also, there were churches, libraries and educational facilities. Archie writes of similar projects getting under way in Okinawa.

He is particularly interested in the educational program. In his last letter he wrote of studying radio, electricity and Japanese.

Until I receive my travel authorization, I am working for the State of Washington.
