May, June Arrests Large

The fish and game department reported today the arrest of 124 persons during April and May. James O. Beck, director, said the total was unusually high. A year ago there were 80 arrests during the two spring months. Increases in court cases was attributed to two things: An unprecedented number of fishermen and the expansion of the field officer force since the war.

Sixty arrests were made in April; 64 in May. Fishing without license or with improper license was the most common offense. Conservation officers charged 53 persons with that violation. Forty-two were arrested for fishing closed waters. Many of these defendants were persons who did not wait until the general trout season began May 21.

Other arrests were for these charges: Carrying uncased gun in the field without a license, nine; killing deer out of season, exceeding the bag limit for trout, and fishing with more than one line, three each; killing ducks out of season, illegal possesion of trout, illegal possesion of beaver fur, and illegal possession of game birds, two each; illegal hunting of deer, illegal possession of bullfrogs and shooting from a highway, one each. Deadly - But Grass Grows Visitors to various city parks, suburbs and rural sections throughout the country have wondered at the spruced-up appearance of many lawns this year. Responsible is a new war-born chemical hormone known as 2-4-D, recently converted to postwar use for killing noxious weeks in lawns, parks and golf fair-

ways.
So the old back-breaking, hand-pulling method of spot-weeding is on the way out, now that entire areas are being weeded merely by spraying. The age-old laments of lawn tenders are undoubtedly being replaced with "What a difference a spray makes," since approximately 1,600 square feet of lawn can be treated for \$1.00 in a matter of minutes.

Experiments conducted by scientists during their development have proved that although the new lethalliquid kills most weeds, it won't harm common lawn grasses. Permanent destruction of perennials has also been accomplished through the method. Sections of large dandelion fields treated with the chemical in 1945 were not only freed of all dandelions for the season, but were devoid of any signs of them this spring, al-though the usual dense growth of the perennial reappeared on all sides. Explanation for this is that the chemical travels to the very roots, thus preventing re-growth.

The new chemical will also kill

ragweed, responsible for about 90 percent of the nation's hayfever. In using this preparation on lawns it should be remembered, however,
