Receive Big Tax Payment
 The Washington Water Power company paid \$12,524.77 in property taxes to Latah county on Monday, Dec. 16, according to J. H. Lucas, district manager for the electric service company.

Tax collector Edna M. Theriault received the check which was payment of the first half of the company's 1946 property taxes in Latah county.

Eight other counties, Benewah, Clearwater, Idaho, Kootenai, Lewis, Nez Perce, Shoshone and Bonner also received tax payment checks on Monday. The total amount of these taxes was \$145,631.19.

The Washington Water Power company's total property taxes to the nine Idaho counties for the entire year of 1946 will be \$294,052.72, an increase of \$15,693.25 over the previous year.

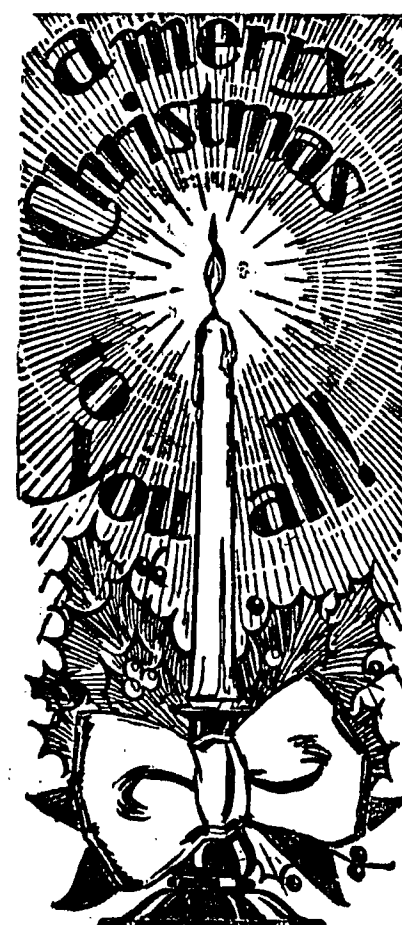
