## MRS. JOHN REID, PIONEER, PASSED AWAY FEBRUARY 1

Addie Gray Reid was born in North Carolina on November 29, 1880, and in which state she grew to young womanhood. She was united in marriage to Mynard Blackburn, in North Carolina, and to this union three children were born: Nellie and Ellie, twins; and Ethel. Ellie preceded her in death.

The family came west and took up a homestead at Teakcan, Idaho, and, following the death of Mr. Blackburn, she moved to Kendrick. She was married to John Reid in 1909, and to this union five children were born: Kathryn, Hazel, Ralph, Fred and Dick, all except Ralph, now reside in Tacoma, Wash., Ralph making his home at Kendrick.

After Mr. Reid's death she moved to Tacoma to be near her children, she having lived there for the past six years.

Mrs. Reid had been in failing health for the past year, and following an operation some two weeks ago, passed away Saturday morning, February 1, 1947, at Tacoma.

Her body was returned here for burial in the Kendrick cemetery at her own request, for Kendrick and vicinity had been her home for 43 years.

As a young girl Mrs. Reid was a member of the Baptist church, but after moving to Kendrick became a member of the Methodist church here.

Services were held here Tuesday afternoon at 1:00 o'clock from the church of her faith, with the Rev. Dr. J. H. Coulter bringing the message, "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Abide With Me" were sung by Mrs. J. H. Coulter and Mrs. Roy Ramey, accompanied at the organ by Mrs. Herman Schupfer. Pallbearers were old-time friends of the family: Nora Callison, Ernest Roerts, Wade T. Keene, W. A. Waits, Dave Gentry and Paul Lind. Interment was in the Kendrick cemetery with Short's Chapel, Moscow, in charge.

She leaves to mourn their loss three sons, Fred and Dick Reid of Tacoma and Ralph Reid, Kendrick; four daughters, Mrs. W. A. Moore and Mrs. James Dyer of Tacoma; Nellie Blackburn, of Portland and Ethel Blackburn of Los Angeles; two brothers and three sisters in North Carolina, as well as a number of other relatives and a host of friends.

## KENDRICK BUSINESS FIRMS MAKING IMPROVEMENTS

**New Step-in Box At Long's**  
Edgar Long and Emmet Lien are busy these days and have been step-in cooler and frozen foods display at the N. B. Long & Sons store. This new "box" will be equipped with the latest type of dry-air blower refrigeration. At one end of the box will be a quick freeze unit to care for newly cut meat or game. In the middle will be the regular "step-in box" temperature for the preservation of vegetables, meat, etc.

At the front end of the box will be a glassed-in compartment for the display and merchandising of frozen fruits, vegetables, etc. These glass doors will open from the outside of the box.

**Creamery Installs New Churn**  
The Kendrick Co-operative Creamery's big new churn arrived in town Saturday, and Sunday Walter Brocke and his helpers and Robert South and Joe Langdon of the creamery, put it into place in the building. This operation necessitated the removal of one of the big plate glass windows in the front.

This new churn handles 300 gallons of cream at a time and produces approximately 1,200 pounds of butter at a filling. It is powered with a 7½-h. p. motor and carries a 2-speed transmission. The high speed is used until the butter is made, and the lower for "working out" the butter.

The new machine is of the "no roll" type, which means that there are no paddles inside, the rapid churning action being produced by "fans" on the interior which produce the same result as "rolls."

Mr. South states that the new churn will be much easier to clean than the old type, as there are no hidden crevices in which bacteria might form. Too, it takes no longer to churn this larger amount of butter than with the old-type, small churn.

The new machine weighed 3,500 pounds, so skidding it from the truck and into place on the floor was no easy job.

**Installing Locker Boxes**  
Walter Sparber, Orville Sparber and Clarence Perryman are busy these days deepening the basement on the east side of the Blewett Building, cleaning out the old ice house, and otherwise getting ready for the installation of 218 modern lockers by Blewett's Grocery Market.

These lockers will be of the latest type, with removable aluminum "catch trays" in the bottom of each. The refrigeration system for these new lockers is to be installed in the basement. It is of the "forced-air" non-ammonia type, which is said to be highly efficient, as well as quiet in operation.

**Installs New Store Fixtures**  
Floyd Millard, who has been steadily replacing old-style store fixtures with the newest types, last week added a new cookie and cracker rack to his equipment. This new rack, matching in style and color the others in the store, is mounted on small, concealed wheels, which permits its shifting about the store as space or display requirements may dictate.

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


