MRS. B. F. NESBIT PASSES AWAY, THURSDAY, FEB. 6
Mary Floranna Thompson was born in Indiana, Pennsylvania, on March 28, 1870. She was the youngest member of the family of Archibald and Mary Owens Thompson, and was the last surviving member of this family.
She grew to young womanhood in Indiana, and was there united in marriage to Frank Nesbit on August 9, 1892, and to this union was born two sons, Henry and James.
In 1904 the family moved to Idaho, settling at Troy, where they made their home until 1925, at which time they moved to Juliaetta, and in 1927 to Kendrick. Mr. Nesbit purchased the Red Cross Pharmacy here — for a total residence in Latah county of 43 years.
Mr. and Mrs. Nesbit observed their 54th wedding anniversary on August 9, 1946.
Mrs. Nesbit passed away at her home in Kendrick, Thursday, February 6, at the age of 76 years, 10 months and nine days, following a lingering illness. Left to mourn her passing are her husband, Frank Nesbit of Kendrick, Idaho; two sons, Henry P. Nesbit of Thief River Falls, Minnesota, and James S. Nesbit of Moscow, Idaho. Two grandsons and one great-granddaughter also survive.
Funeral services were held Monday, February 10, at 1:30 p. m. at the Community church, Kendrick, with the Rev. Ronald Lemmex of the Christian Church, Moscow, bringing the message. Interment was in the Moscow cemetery. Pallbearers were Wade T. Keene, Edgar Long, William A. Watts, L. J. Herbes, Archie A. May and E. A. Deobald, all old-time friends of the family.
Music was furnished by Mrs. D. A. Christensen and Mr. and Mrs. Roy Ramey, who sang "The Old Rugged Cross," and "The Lord Is My Shepherd," accompanied at the organ by Mrs. H. C. Schupfer.
The well-filled church and the profusion of floral offerings testified to the high esteem in which Mrs. Nesbit was held, many friends coming from Troy, Juliaetta and Moscow to pay their final respects.
Mrs. Nesbit always had a smile and a friendly word for everyone, and numbered her friends by her acquaintances. Her passing leaves a vacant space in the community that can never quite be filled.
Members of the immediate family present for the services from out of town were their sons, Henry, of Thief River Falls, Minn., James S. and wife and son Robert of Moscow, and Mr. Nesbit's brother, James Nesbit, Avon, Idaho.

INTERESTING NEWS ITEMS FROM KENDRICK SCHOOLS

About School Consolidation
Many patrons of Kendrick High school and surrounding communities have been quite disturbed regarding a recent newspaper article in the Lewiston Tribune which urged the Legislature to act quickly and kill House Bill 59. The propagandists would have us believe that the passage of this bill will shut down approximately 80 high schools in Idaho which have less than 100 in average daily attendance. This would include Kendrick and several other schools in Latah county. Such a statement is entirely untrue.

Representative Mills from Latah County recently sent us a copy of H. B. 59 to the Kendrick School office. When read closely it will be noted that a clause has been included which explains the true intent of the measure. There is certainly no cause for alarm. Instead of closing Kendrick High school it will tend to improve it and make it larger, with greater opportunity for growth than it has enjoyed in many years.

For the benefit of the people of this community we have set forth below the paragraph in H. B. 59 which affects Kendrick High school, and it is hoped there will be no misunderstanding of the purpose of the bill and that the alarmists will go unheard.

"(3) To receive, review and make alterations in proposals initiated and submitted to the County Committee by the Board of Trustees of a presently organized district that maintains a four-year high school with an average daily attendance of one hundred or more pupils in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, and/or by the Board of Trustees of two or more adjacent districts in the service area of a school having a high school with one hundred or more pupils in average daily attendance. Provided, however, that if there are not in the county and contiguous territory in another county, or counties, sufficient high school pupils in a natural high school service area, to provide a high school with an average daily attendance of one hundred or more high school pupils, the County Committee, with the approval of the State Committee, may organize a Class "B" school district about school systems having high schools of fewer than one hundred high school pupils if, in their discretion and under their powers and duties as prescribed in this act, such an organization appears best to serve the interests of the pupils of the county or counties involved."
