## TWENTY-FOUR ATTEND COMMERCIAL CLUB MEETING

Twenty-four interested businessmen and farmers attended the Commercial Club dinner and meeting Monday evening.

Following a delicious steak dinner at Burt's Confectionery all adjourned to the City Hall for the business session. Following the reading and approval of the Minutes of the previous meeting, a card announcing a Latah County Chamber of Commerce meeting at Genesee was read, and it was decided to send a carload to the gathering.

Tom Long of the Highway committee reported that the Osberg Construction company had begun work on the Brady Gulch road last Thursday, a bulldozer and compressor now being at work, and a shovel expected this week.

Mr. Long reported highways as being very soft everywhere, as frost and moisture worked toward the top. After a round-table discussion the secretary was asked to write James Reed, Boise, inquiring as to the status of the Juliaetta-Kendrick road, as it is in deplorable condition.

A. O. Kanikkeberg, treasurer, reported the club finances in reasonable shape, with enough on hand to finance activities until next "drive time."

W. A. Watts, reporting for the Agricultural committee stated that some winter wheat had suffered damage from freezing, and certain areas might have to be reseeded. No accurate estimate as to the extent of the damage could yet be formed. Present freezing and thawing action was not helping the situation, either.

Tom Keene of the Entertainment committee reported he planned another "Ladies Night" soon.

Next came a discussion of the Area Living War Memorial Swimming Pool, with A. O. Kanikkeberg, drive chairman, reporting very little cash on hand but all bills paid to date.

Jack Kuykendall, construction foreman, stated that it was estimated that \$2,500 would be needed to finish this project. Of this sum, \$600.00 would be required for fencing and gates — the largest single remaining item of expense, and \$900 for other materials (cement, sand, etc.), and \$1,000 for labor. He said he believed the project could be completed by May 1st, if the money were available.

After a round-table discussion J. G. Travis was appointed to work with Mr. Kanikkeberg, and contact personally, many who have not yet given. Mr. Travis will begin this work at once.

After due discussion it was decided to hold the regular monthly meetings the second Wednesday of each month, rather than the first Monday after the first Tuesday. This transfer was felt necessary due to conflict with other activities.

Wade Keene then led a discussion of roads in general in this area, and suggested a closer co-operation with Troy in this matter, as the interests of the two towns are closely linked. Mr. Keene and Mr. Thurber, club president, will arrange a meeting with the Troy group in the near future.

Next came a discussion of the dreaded "Tussock Moth" and its invasion of the fine timber in this area, and L. S. Thurber volunteered to work with Henry Jones, local state fire warden, and Rev. Coulter, club secretary, in an effort to secure spraying by plane of the hillside adjoining town, and timber in this area as soon as possible.

There being no further business to come before the group, adjournment was taken.

**Kendrick Defeats Lapwai**  
The Kendrick Tigers defeated the Lapwai Wildcats 57 to 30 here last Friday evening in their final home game of the season, and for their eighth consecutive win in conference play.

Kendrick opened up the scoring by piling up 22 points in the first six minutes, holding Lapwai scoreless for the same length of time — and the first quarter ended 22 to 4 in favor of Kendrick.

The half-time score was 28 to 14, Kendrick; third quarter, 45 to 18; Kendrick and the final reading on the new score board was 57 to 30, Kendrick.

For some reason the Lapwai coach chose to play his first string substitutes, not even suiting up his main five. As a result, Coach Armitage gave the first-string five a bit of practice, and then used the A-squad substitutes. Kendrick fans were greatly disappointed at Lapwai's action as they are known to have a good team and came expecting to see a real game.

In the eye-opener of the evening the Kendrick B-squad defeated the Lapwai Bs 22 to 43.

Genesee upset Juliaetta 38 to 23 and Lapwai stopped Culesac 41 to 34 Monday night at Lapwai in the first round games of the Valley sub-district tournament.

Juliaetta showed fine strength and pushed the Genesee Bulldogs until the final quarter before bowing out 38 to 23. The loss of Johns, Juliaetta forward, who hit for 11 points to lead his team, was described as the turning point of the game by observers. He left via the foul route in the fourth quarter.

Don Lee paced the Genesee attack with 15 points which came from a deceptive fast-break that allowed him to make "lay-ins." Springer, of Genesee, guard, set up the Bulldog plays as well as scoring 8 points on offense. The quarter scores with Genesee leading throughout were: 9-2; 14-6; 19-18 and the final 38-23. Both teams used a man-to-man defense.

**Culesac Loses To Lapwai**  
Culesac battled Lapwai upon nearly even terms for the first half of the second game but dropped behind in the last half as the Wildcats turned on the steam. Lutes and Wilson were the sparkplugs of the Lapwai attack, getting 13 and 14 points respectively. Eichenberger was the driving power of the Culesac attack with 12 points.

Culesac relied upon the zone defense the entire game. The quarter scores with Lapwai leading three of them were: 9-9; 13-12; 33-23 and the final 41-34. Culesac battled all the way but was having tough luck on the short shots.

**Kendrick to Meet Genesee**  
Genesee shaded Lapwai 27 to 26 and Culesac eliminated Juliaetta 31 to 26 in second round games of the Valley sub-district tournament at Lapwai Tuesday evening — which means that Genesee meets Kendrick at 7:00 Thursday evening and Culesac battles Lapwai for the second time in the tournament at 8:00. The loser of the Culesac-Lapwai battle will be eliminated.

Genesee scored 12 points in the second quarter to post a lead that the Wildcats were never able to overcome although the score sawed during the closing minutes of the fourth quarter. With 30 seconds to play Springer broke a 26-26 tie with a free throw that proved to be the winning point for Genesee.

Culesac came from behind during the fourth quarter to eliminate a Juliaetta team that was rated the "surprise of the tournament" by all officials. Juliaetta used a tight zone defense to throttle the Culesac attack until the final minutes of play.

The Culesac team blocked and screened carefully to get set-up shots while Juliaetta was hitting long and medium distance shots with accuracy during the first three-quarters of the game. Quarter scores, with Juliaetta leading were: 14-7; 21-12; 23-21 and the final count 26 to 31 in favor of Culesac.

## FRANK FAIRFIELD HAS NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Frank (Dan) Fairfield had a very narrow escape from death or serious injury last Thursday night about midnight when the pickup truck he was driving towards his home on Big Bear ridge plunged into the swollen waters of Potlatch creek about 150 yards below the Deary-Orofino road junction on the state highway.

For some reason or another, apparently the result of air in the cab creating a buoyancy, the truck did not turn over when it hit the water, but was carried some 50 to 60 yards downstream by the swift current, and then lodged at a shallow place in the creek bottom, facing upstream and with the lights burning.

Harry Newman, on his way to his home at Cameron, saw the lights out in the middle of the stream, and promptly spread the alarm. It was not long before a good-sized group was on hand and rescue efforts underway. A boat was tried in an effort to get a rope across the stream, but the current was much too swift, and was abandoned in favor of the time-honored, rock and string, with a bigger rope being pulled across each time.

About the time the rope was stretched across, "Lum" Farrington and Kenneth Wolf reached the scene with their ex-G. I. transport truck, on the front of which was a built-in winch with cable. This cable was pulled across and anchored to a big pine tree on the opposite side of the stream. "Lum" then drove the truck down the road until the cable hung directly across the pick-up, but Mr. Fairfield, who had by this time occupied the cab, which was half-filled with icy water, for between three and four hours was unable to extricate himself, so a line-man's "kiddie-kar" was secured from the Potlatch Telephone company, and Jack Kuykendall and Henry Jones rode it out to the wreck.

They succeeded in getting a rope around Dan's body, got him out of the cab and onto the top, but so chilled was he that he was unable to hold himself in the seat, so Jack Kuykendall rode back with him to the bank, where Dr. Christensen, dry blankets and a car awaited.

He was taken immediately to the Herman Travis home nearby, and put to bed. In addition to the shock suffered from the wetting in the icy water, he suffered numerous bruises and a deep cut below one eye. At the present time he is recovering nicely.

Just what might have happened if the truck had turned over, or had its lights gone out, is a matter of conjecture, but results might have been much more disastrous. As it was, neither event happened, and Mr. Fairfield can count himself as being very lucky.

To attempt to name all that took part in the rescue work would be impossible — so we won't even try. But we do want to say that there were plenty of willing workers.

The truck was taken from the stream the following morning, and an examination disclosed but little damage to the body, but the underside suffered considerable damage from bouncing over the rocks as it was shifted by the current and by the tractor pulling it to shore.




