At the school election here last Friday Dr. G. W. McKeever was elected as trustee to succeed himself. We understand a total of 89 votes were cast.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST GRAIN MARKETS SHOW ADVANCE

The principal grain markets in the Pacific Northwest were more stable, showing only moderate advances during the past week, according to reports received by the Production and Marketing Administration from the U. S. D. A. Cash wheat prices in the Pacific Northwest on the ordinary export classes of wheat averaged about 4c per bushel higher as compared with the previous week, while futures on the Chicago Board of Trade showed a net gain of only 3c per bushel for the period. Despite the higher prices the situation in the local markets in this area was characterized by hesitant action, particularly as a result of a slow and indifferent demand from all classes of the trade, and also on account of the telephone strike which prevented terminal grain dealers and millers from making daily contacts with sellers. The volume of business handled during the week at the terminal markets was reported to have been very small as compared with other recent weeks. According to the report of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics, as of April 1, the stocks of wheat on farms in the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho totaled 12,083,000 bushels, or 10 percent more than a year ago, but 14 percent less than the April 1, 10-year average. There was an unusually large disappearance of wheat from the farms of the Northwest during the last three months. The same reports show the winter wheat crop prospects in these three states point to a total of 99,104,000 bushels, which, if realized, will be 8 percent less than last year's large crop but 55 percent more than the 10-year (1936-45) average. Moisture is said to be short in some local wheat growing areas, but, as a whole, present conditions are quite favorable for the crop.

The cash wheat market at Portland was steady and firm during the past week, but trading was extremely light both in grain for immediate delivery and contracting new crop wheat for July and August shipment. Bid prices on export classes of wheat averaged about 4c per bushel higher, and the higher protein red winter wheats were up 2c, while the high protein hard white (Barr) wheats were up 6c, all per bushel higher than the close of the previous week. Midwestern buyers were in the market for Pacific Northwest wheat, and prices quoted appeared to be competitive but inquiry was for immediate shipment, which was difficult to guarantee, and greatly restricted the volume of trading. Shipments to the Pacific Northwest terminals have improved with 536 cars received at the Columbia river and 370 at the Puget Sound terminals, compared with 468 and 322 cars, respectively, for the previous week.

Bid prices at the Portland Grain Exchange were as follows: Soft white, soft white (no Rex), white club, western red and red hard winter (ordinary) all \$2.36, all per bushel basis, No. 1 bulk, 15-day shipment, coast delivery.

Wheat receipts at Ogden totaled 96 cars during the past week, with 40 cars diverted to eastern markets. No premiums were paid for the higher milling grades, with \$2.48 per bushel generally quoted for all classes of wheat, basis No. 1 bulk, f. o. b. Ogden, which represented an advance of 3c per bushel compared with prices quoted the previous week. Prices paid f. o. b. cars at country shipping points averaged 16 cents per bushel under Ogden.

The San Francisco wheat market was dull and averaged somewhat lower during the week. Offerings were small but met slow demand from practically all classes of trade and prices averaged about 2½c per 100 lower compared with a week ago. Bay region flour mills reported a slow demand for flour and were quite selective in their purchases. Offerings from other states were small and mostly at prices well above a shipping basis to central California. California No. 1 hard white and No. 1 soft white wheats were quoted at \$4.05 to \$4.07 per 100, sacked basis.

On the cash wheat market at Kansas City prices were down 1c to 4c per bushel on hard wheat and 3c to 5½c lower on soft red. The decline was attributed almost entirely to reduction of premiums on the higher milling grades. Buying of cash wheat was largely on a hand-to-mouth basis, only moderate quantities moving to mills, and outlets for poultry wheat were narrow. Receipts totaled 1,277 cars, or about in line with the previous week.

The demand for cash wheat in the Minneapolis market was less urgent during the week, and premiums were off 2c to 3c, which about offset the moderate gain in futures. Trading in cash wheat was small and it took only a slight change
