KENDRICK TIGERS WIN AGAIN; "TOWNERS" LOSE

Tigers Defeat Wildcats
The Kendrick Tigers added the Lapwai Wildcats to their list of victims, by defeating them 6 to 5 on the local field Friday. Lapwai started the scoring with one run in the first; three in the second, and their final score came across the plate in the seventh frame.

The Tigers came from behind twice, once in the fifth, to tie it up, and again in the seventh, to claim the victory.

The Tigers scored twice in the second, on an error, a walk, and Don Millard's single. Two more were added in the fifth frame on Ray Easterbrook's single, Bob Ware's two-bagger, and a single by Johnny Deobald. The final two scores came in the seventh inning on Junior Broke's single, which scored Herb Millard — Broke scored later on a sizzling drive by Frank Dammarell, that got by the Lapwai shortstop.

Wilson whiffed eight Tiger batters, while Herb Millard fanned nine Wildcats.

Hope To Improve Game

"A sound management and production program to assure adequate protection and maximum utilization of our wildlife resources is our policy," T. B. Murray, director of the Idaho Fish and Game department declared this week in his first statement since appointment to office on April 15th.

"To achieve this program," Murray said, "we must have the constructive co-operation of every individual, agency and organization in the state. There must be an aroused public appreciation for and observation of the rules of the stream, the forest and field. Together we can make the program work."

"The theme song of the commission and the department is constructive co-operation."

Murray was appointed by the fish and game commission to succeed James O. Beck, director for five years, who resigned last January. Murray was formerly affiliated with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Idaho for 20 years. During the war he was an officer in the navy, and has since been a biologist with the fish and wildlife service in Chicago.

He said he expected to spend a couple of weeks more in Boise becoming oriented on the fish and game work before starting on trips throughout the state to meet with field personnel and organizations concerned with wildlife.

Andrew Dorendorf, Pioneer, Dead

Andrew Dorendorf was born in Germany in 1853, and came to America in 1881, settling first in Chicago, Ill., where he resided for four years, moving to Fairmont, Minn., in 1885.

He resided at Fairmont for a number of years, and was there united in marriage to Minnie Reinhardt in 1893. The couple continued to make their home at Fairmont until 1901, when they came west, settling in the Cedar creek section, where the family home was maintained even after the death of Mrs. Dorendorf, he having remained there until last year, and since that time had resided at Spangle, Wash., and Kellogg, Idaho, until his death on April 22nd, at the ripe old age of 93 years, nine months and six days.

There were 10 children born to the union. His wife and four children having preceded him in death, there remain to mourn their loss — Henry Dorendorf of Kellogg, Idaho; Walter Dorendorf of Kennewick, Wash.; Adeline Swanson of Southwick, Idaho; Anna Baker of Southwick, Idaho; Tillie Riley of Kendrick, and Martha Bleisner of Spangle, Wash., forty grandchildren and 22 great-grandchildren, besides a host of life-long friends.

Funeral services were held at Southwick on Friday, April 25 at 2:00 p. m., the Rev. Theo Meske of Cameron bringing the message. The pall bearers were friends of many years standing: Henry Looser, Charles Baack, Wm. Babb, Clem Israel, John Darby and Gil Erelweine. Interment was in the Southwick cemetery by the side of his wife.

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

Idaho Is Losing Best Lands

The "Hills of Idaho" as well as flat lands along streams and ditches, including some of the best land in the state, are being lost from erosion, the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce warned this week.

"There is a tremendous loss in all parts of the state," the chamber report said. "Idaho, on the average, is only 8 inches away from a sterile desert. Every time we lose an inch of top-soil we move that much nearer to a desert as barren as the Gobi or Sahara."

The report pointed to a story from St. Anthony which told of 6,497,000 pounds of topsoil going down the Peton river in a 24-hour period. Sometimes as much as an inch of soil is lost in a single day. Soil erosion has become a problem in the northern part of the state as well, the report said. Much of the erosion is on non-irrigated lands after summer-fallowing.

Idaho Has Big Phosphate Mine

The present rate of mining production at the Waterloo mine of the San Francisco Chemical company at Montpelier, Idaho, not only ranks it as the largest producer in the west, but present volume is twice that of all other western mines combined, says a dispatch.

Current 60,000 tons of phosphates are being shipped each month. This is an average of about 38 railroad cars a day. The mill is operating 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Mining is on a six-day a week, two-shift basis.
