## Receive Spokane Recognition

## CHAMBERS OF COMMERCE MEETING TUESDAY EVE.

The Latah County Chambers of Commerce met here Tuesday evening for their final meeting of the summer, with 47 present. L. S. Thurber, president of the local Commercial Club welcomed the visitors, and turned the meeting over to Mr. Johnson, Troy, president of the county organization, where, following the 6:30 dinner served by the ladies of the Community church, the business of the evening was taken up.

Mr. Johnson asked for a standing vote of thanks to the ladies of the Community church for the splendid dinner, and then introduced Lloyd Fenn, Kootenai, Idaho, a member of the Idaho State Tax Commission.

Mr. Fenn told briefly of the formation of this commission by constitutional amendment at the election some 30 months ago. He explained that it is composed of four men, two from each party — and that their duties are the adjustment and equalization of tax valuations over the state, working with the county assessors, rather than "upsetting their programs."

Mr. Fenn gave as an example of some of their problems, the equalization of values on different types of farm lands, pasture lands, marginal lands and range grazing lands, stating that lack of definite information on productive value was one of their greatest stumbling blocks. He emphasized that the county assessors were not to blame, as valuation of land and improvements was continually changing throughout the years.

He said that in many instances they had shifted large blocks of property from one district to another when they found that property belonging to an individual or company lying in different areas, had been assessed in one, when it actually belonged in another.

He stated that inflated construction costs were also adding to their burden through attempting to reach an equalized assessment.

Mr. Merrick of the Forestry Service spoke briefly on the coming spraying of timber in this area for Tussock moth control. He stated that the contract had been awarded to two different companies, who would co-operate in order to complete the job in the shortest possible time.

Mr. Merrick stated that the Princeton and Kendrick areas were slated as being among the first to receive this treatment.

Rudolph Nordby, county commissioner, spoke briefly on the coming school reorganization meetings — and recommended that each district have all reports up to date and a representative chosen to attend the coming county reorganization meeting at Moscow. At that time there will be chosen two men from each commissioner district to form the county board, who will plan the borders of the new districts.

Adjournment was then taken by the organization, which will not meet again until next September.

**Wilbur Owen Babcock Passes**  
Wilbur Owen Babcock, 70, a resident of the Kendrick community for many years, died Wednesday morning, May 7, at the Grifman Memorial hospital, Moscow. He was a retired farmer and belonged to the Seventh Day Adventist church.

**Forestry Service Men Here**  
Several workers in the U. S. Forestry Service are now stationed at Kendrick. Some are supervising the construction of the new air strip on the Clem Israel farm, and others surveying Tussock moth infestations, all preparatory to the spraying campaign which is expected to begin sometime between May 20 and 25, according to E. H. Myrick, Missoula, Mont., co-ordinator.

Myrick said the moth is hatching now and that it will soon begin to feed on the foliage.

In a statement at Moscow Monday State Forester Santon Ready said that all private landowners contacted so far have signified willingness to co-operate. Ready and his staff have been contacting the owners who are asked to pay 42 1/2¢ per acre for the spraying of their timber. They have signed contracts to pay their share of the cost. Ready estimated there are about 1,500 land owners in the area to be sprayed.

The federal government is paying one half the cost of the preventative program. The state, through a \$21,000 legislative program, is paying one-fourth and the land owners one-fourth.

## TRADING IN NORTHWEST MARKETS ONLY MODERATE

Trading in Pacific Northwest grain markets was only moderately active, with prices generally holding comparatively steady during the past week, according to reports to the Production and Marketing Administration by the U. S. D. A. Cash wheat prices in this area did not follow the full advance in eastern futures, as May wheat at Chicago was up 4 1/2¢ per bushel during the week, while the local wheat markets advanced only 2¢ per bushel, and at the close were the same as a week ago. Oats and barley prices were unchanged during the week. Demand for wheat was less aggressive than during other recent weeks with mills furnishing the principal outlet and buying was rather selective, with some mills interested only in wheat for export types of flour, while others appeared to be interested only in the higher milling grades. General interest in the grain trade appears to be centered more in the new crop than in cleaning up the dwindling supplies of the old crop, since the new crop wheat for July-August delivery is being quoted at around 40¢ to 45¢ per bushel lower than old crop wheat for quick delivery.

The cash market at Portland held fairly steady during the past week, with a rather slow demand and light trading. Variations in prices on the export classes of wheat were only 2¢ per bushel during the week, with the bid at the close of the period the same as the previous week's close. However, hard red winter wheat of a high milling grade advanced 4¢ per bushel. The flour mills appeared to be the only buyers in the market and purchases were generally limited to small quantities of special types of wheat for immediate needs. Reports indicate that the domestic flour business is generally quiet. Wheat continued to move to the terminal markets in large quantities during the week with 454 cars reported at the Columbia river terminals and 554 cars at Puget Sound terminals, compared with 415 and 583, respectively, for the previous week.

Bid prices at the Portland Grain Exchange on May 8, were as follows: Soft white, \$2.35, soft white (no red), white club, western red and hard red winter (ordinary) all \$2.76 per bushel, basis No. 1 bulk, 15-day shipment, coast delivery.

Following the supper the group enjoyed a social hour dancing to music provided by Walsh's Jazz band.


