Paul Silflow Passes

Paul Silflow, a pioneer of the Potlatch ridge section, died last week at Somerville Home, Lewiston.

Paul Silflow was born in Germany on July 20th, 1869. At an early age he was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran faith.

Mr. Silflow came to America in the year 1889, and settled at Uniontown, Washington, for one year, and then came to Cameron, Idaho, where he spent the rest of his life.

He passed away on June 21, 1947, at the age of 77 years, 11 months and one day, death being due to the infirmities of old age.

Mr. Silflow retained a keen enjoyment of life until the very end — and one of his greatest pleasures was fishing, and despite his advanced age he always managed to "keep up with the bunch."

Relatives surviving are one sister-in-law, and several nephews and nieces. Funeral services were conducted on Monday, June 23rd, at 2:00 o'clock in the Emanuel Lutheran Church of Cameron, with the Rev. Theo Meske as officiant.

Hymns were sung by Miss Dorothy Meyer, accompanied by Mrs. Theo Meske at the organ.

Interment was in the Cameron cemetery with Vasser-Rowls Funeral Home, Lewiston, in charge.

About Local Roads

The new Brady Gulch road, under construction by the Osberg Construction Company of Seattle, is now making good progress, and the crushing and spreading of its gravel surface began Wednesday morning of this week. It is estimated that grading operations are 50 percent complete, and with the worst behind them, actual construction work should have no trouble keeping ahead of the gravel crushing and spreading.

The road between Kendrick and Juliaetta, is, of course, one of the sore spots of this area — and is "getting no better fast" under the heavy traffic it carries, especially with log hauling now in full swing.

The local highway crew cannot be blamed for its poor condition — it's simply worn out, and has been, for some two or three years. There is no gravel left for the crew to use in blading holes full of drainage ditches just run along the side of the road and drain nothing, for their sides are higher than the roadbed — filled in by preceding freshets.

As previously stated, we don't believe there is as poor a section of road in the state of Idaho connecting two towns of such population — and carrying the traffic this road bears. And, with the coming of harvest, this traffic will be heavier than ever before!

Weather Warming Up

Since the shower of last Thursday morning no rain has fallen in this section and the thermometer has shown a steady increase in daily temperature readings.

But then, according to the calendar, summer is here, and the temperature would indicate that such is really the case. The warm, dry weather is very welcome to the farmers and truck gardeners, since haying is now under way full tilt — and tomato and melon vines are showing excellent growth, for the first time in several weeks.

Locally the hay crop will be poorer in quality than for several years, since the damp weather forced postponement of cutting and rank growth developed.

ORDINANCE NO. 102
AN ORDINANCE LICENSING AND REGULATING ESTABLISHMENTS WHERE COIN-OPERATED AMUSEMENT DEVICES MAY BE OPERATED, AND LICENSING AND REGULATING THE OPERATION OF COIN-OPERATED AMUSEMENT DEVICES PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THE ORDINANCE, AND REPEALING ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WITH ANY PROVISIONS HEREOF.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF JULIAETTA:
Section 1. This ordinance shall be deemed an exercise of the police powers of the Village of Juliaetta for the protection of the welfare, public health, morals and safety of the city, and of its citizens and residents, and it is declared to be the policy of the mayor and council of the Village of Juliaetta to limit the operation of coin-operated amusement devices as defined under the provisions of House Bill No. 43, Idaho Session Laws of 1947, and to limit the places and establishments and premises within which the same may be operated, and to provide penalties for the violation of the provisions of this ordinance.
Section 2. Upon application duly made by any person, firm, partnership, corporation or association for a license for the operation of coin-operated amusement devices upon designated premises within the Village of Juliaetta, said application to be approved by the mayor and council, the clerk of the Village of Juliaetta is authorized to issue a license to such person, firm partnership, corporation or association as may be authorized and as defined under the provisions of House Bill No. 43, Idaho Session Laws for 1947.
Section 3. The application for a license shall contain a description of the premises where said business will be carried on, the number of coin-operated amusement devices it is expected the applicant will make application for, a sworn statement that no other person than the licen-

see will have any title or interest in any coin-operated amusement device operated upon the premises proposed to be licensed nor to receive any rental or remuneration from the operations of said device and shall contain such other matters as the City Clerk shall determine and as the Mayor and Council may from time to time require. Said application shall be accompanied by proof of ownership of said premises by the applicant or by proof that said premises are leased by the licensee.
Section 4. No applicant shall be approved except by the mayor and council after an investigation has been made to satisfy themselves that the laws of the State of Idaho have been and will be complied with; that the premises are so arranged that persons under twenty years of age will not have access thereto or to observe the operation of such devices or to permit the operation of such amusement coin devices in a public place where persons under twenty years of age would have access thereto.
Section 5. After a license has been issued authorizing the licensee to engage in the business of operating coin-operated amusement devices the City Clerk is authorized to issue a license to said licensee for the operation of coin-operated amusement devices upon said licensed premises. All applications for coin-operated amusement device licenses shall be upon a form to be prescribed by the City Clerk. The license shall be in the form of a stamp and a separate license must be procured for each coin-operated amusement device. Said license stamp shall immediately, upon issuance, be securely fixed to the coin-operated amusement device in a conspicuous place and be cancelled by cutting it cross-cross with a sharp instrument.
Section 6. The annual license fees for coin-operated amusement devices shall be as follows:
Devices into which five cents only may be inserted—\$500.00
Devices into which ten cents only may be inserted—\$500.00
Devices into which twenty-five cents only may be inserted—\$750.00
Devices into which any coin of the value of fifty cents or one dollar may be inserted—\$1,000.00
Multiple coin-operated amusement devices into which more than one coin may be inserted at the same operation the fee shall be a fee equal to the fees provided for individually operated devices of the same denomination, multiplied by the number of coins that may be played upon one operation.
Section 7. IT SHALL BE UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON:
(a) To operate or permit the operation of a coin-operated amusement device without being licensed or without having the license stamp affixed to it and cancelled as provided in this ordinance.
(b) To operate or permit the operation of any coin-operated amusement device on premises other than those described in the application thereof and in the license issued therefor.
(c) To make any false statement in the application for a license thereunder.
(d) To permit any person under the age of twenty years to play a coin-operated amusement device or to operate or permit the operation of such device in a place where persons under twenty years of age would have access thereto or to observe the operation thereof.
(e) To make any changes in the mechanism of such devices affecting the manufacturer's designated percentage of return to players, or to install or use in any coin-operated amusement device any plug, jumper, gimmick or other similar instrument or attachment, or to change designs, symbols or reels affecting the said manufacturer's designated percentage of return to players.
(f) To insert in any coin-operated amusement device slugs, tokens or any object other than pieces of money or objects purchased for the purpose of play from the owner of said devices.
Section 8. All licenses provided by this ordinance for coin-operated amusement devices shall be issued for the calendar year and shall expire on December 31st of each year. The license fee may be pro-rated as of the actual month of issue for the remainder of the licensed year.
Section 9. All persons violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
Section 10. In addition to the other penalties provided by law, the Mayor and Council may revoke any license issued under the provisions of this ordinance. At least three (3) days before revoking any license, notice of hearing shall be mailed to the holder of said license at his last known address, the notice stating the time and place of hearing concerning the revocation, at which time the licensee shall be entitled to be heard. A conviction of a violation of any provisions of this ordinance shall be prima facie evidence of facts sufficient to warrant revocation of the license held by said person. The action of the Mayor and Council relative to such revocation shall be final. In all cases of revocation the license shall be cancelled and shall immediately be surrendered to the City Clerk. Upon good cause, shown, the City Council may suspend any license issued under the provisions of this ordinance for a period of not less than ten (10) days or more than sixty (60) days; such suspension shall be by resolution of the City Council and shall be effective immediately. In all cases of suspension the license shall be delivered to the City Clerk, who shall retain the same during the period of suspension.
Section 11. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its approval and publication.

**Watch G. I. Insurance Date**  
Veterans who reinstate their National Service Life Insurance policies may allow them to lapse a second time through misunderstanding, the Veterans Administration cautions.

Upon submission of the reinstatement application with accompanying comparative health statement and two monthly premiums, the veteran assumes he has a month before another payment is due. Because the VA cannot change the original day of the month on which the policy was effective, a premium may be due within a week or two, or even a day after reinstatement payments are in the mail.

Thus, a veteran whose effective date is on the first of the month may reinstate on the 25th, and have only five days before another premium is due.

Some protection is offered by the 31-day grace period. However, if a veteran counts on that time, and in addition believes he has 30 days between payments, his policy will lapse.

Veterans who are not sure of the day of the month their policies are effective are advised by the VA to make all subsequent payments within a 30-day period as a safety measure.
