## About Burning Stubble

Henry Jones, deputy state fire warden, Kendrick, said Tuesday morning that he had received many requests for permits to burn stubble, and that under certain favorable conditions such permits would now be issued on application to his office.

He warned, however, that a permit must be secured, and should conditions change such permits might be denied temporarily.

Mr. Jones also warned that heavy penalties are applicable for burning of any kind without first securing a permit.

So, if you want to burn, be sure the area is safe against fire spread before making application for the permit.

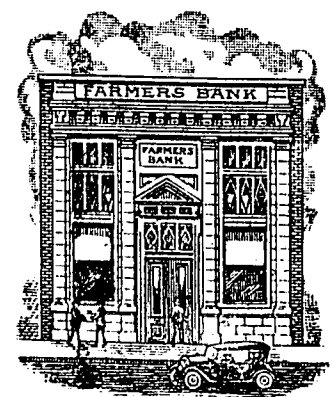



**Finke Brothers Sue IWA-CIO**  
Boise, Aug. 30 — Damages of \$17,100 from the International Woodworkers of America (IWA-CIO) were asked in a suit filed Thursday (Aug. 28) in federal district court against the union by Carl and George Finke. They are operators of a logging camp near Southwick, Idaho.

It was the first Idaho court action under the labor-management act of 1947, commonly called the Taft-Hartley labor law.

The Finkes contend that their logging business has been damaged by the current strike of local 10-358 of the woodworkers union against Potlatch Forests, Inc.

Their action asserted that "during August 1947, union agents appeared on several occasions at the logging camp and encouraged employees by persuasion and coercion to engage in a concerted refusal to manufacture, transport or otherwise handle or work on logs . . . objective being to force plaintiffs (Finkes) from doing business with Potlatch."

This suit will be watched locally with great interest, since the Finkes are well known locally.
