



Finke Brothers Sue IWA-CIO

Boise, Aug. 30 - Damages of \$17,100 from the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) were ask-FRIDAY, SATURDAY, SEPT. 5-6 ed in a suit filed Thursday (Aug. 28) in federal district court against the union by Carl and George Finke. Shey are operators of a logging camp near Southwick, Idaho.

It was the first Idaho court action under the labor-management act of 1947; commonly called the Taft-Hartley labor law.

The Finkes contend that their logging business has been damaged by he current strike of local 10-358 of he woodworkers union against Potlatch Forests, Inc.

Their action asserted that "during August 1947, union agents appeared on several occasions at the logging 15c camp and encouraged employees by persuasion and coercion to engage in concerted refusal to manufacture, transport or otherwise handle or work on logs objective being to force plaintiffs (Finkes) from doing business with Potlatch.'
