Kendrick Defeats Lewiston B's
Paced by swivel-hipped Junior Brocke, the Kendrick Tigers trounced the Lewiston high school B squad 37 to 6 here Thursday afternoon of last week.

The Tigers opened the game by receiving the kickoff and drove 86 yards in 8 plays to score when Ray Easterbrook swept right end for 12 yards. Smith plunged for the extra point.

Late in the second quarter, after intercepting a Kitten pass, the Tigers drove 51 yards to score. Smith, Tiger fullback, scored from the 2-yard line on a plunge over center. The conversion failed.

A blocked kick on the Lewiston 10-yard line bounded into the end zone to give another touchdown late in the second quarter. The conversion kick was blocked.

With seconds left to play in the first half, Jim Rowland, Lewiston right halfback, intercepted a Tiger pass and ran 95 yards to pay dirt.

In the second half Easterbrook, Gordon Cook and Brocke all reached pay dirt to build the mounting score. The Tigers met Lapwai on Friday, Oct. 10, in a league game at Kendrick, and Genesee on Saturday, October 18.

NOT HIGH COST OF LIVING; BUT COST OF LIVING HIGH

Twin Falls — It's not only the high cost of living, but the cost of living high that confronts the American people today, H. A. Elcock, president of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, stated this week, quoting from a statement he has received from Earl O. Shreve, president of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, Washington, D. C.

"Even here in Idaho we are living better than ever before," Elcock commented. "But we are still subject to many distortions and mal-adjustments."

Believing many people in Idaho would be interested in the views of President Shreve, Elcock quoted the following from Shreve's statement:

"Since pre-war we have tripled our money supply. Factory wage earnings have jumped from 63 cents an hour in 1939 to about \$1.25 an hour, or by 100 percent. Total wage and salary incomes have jumped from \$50,000,000,000 in 1939 to over \$125,000,000,000 this year.

"Today we have about 12,000,000 more mouths to feed than we had in 1939, yet the number of milk cows on our farms is up only 6 percent. The anticipated hog slaughter for this year is down about 1.5 percent. We are helping to feed much of the world. Normally we are a food importing nation.

"The only way in which we can bring prices down is either to produce more or consume less. The inflationary spirals grew out of our methods of war-financing, under which we multiplied the money supply, thereby making every dollar worth less. The upward pressure of wages, made possible by this excess money supply, has greatly increased costs; and at the same time the large wage and salary earnings have bid up prices. Thus, rising wage increases push up costs and they pull up prices in the consumer markets.

"Further wage increases will only cause the buyers all across the land to bid more fiercely for the scarce commodities.

"The solution can only come through a fiscal and monetary policy that will stop cheapening the dollar, and more and more production so that prices will adjust themselves to levels which all our people can pay."



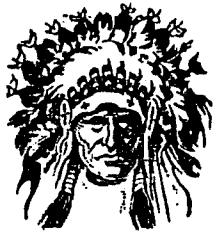
