Kendrick Defeats Grangeville
The Kendrick Tigers advanced a step nearer the second district football title with a 32-6 victory over the Grangeville Bulldogs here last Friday afternoon.

After a scoreless first quarter Junior Brocke plunged for a touchdown and Gordon Cook swept right end for another to give the Tigers a 12-0 lead at the half. Both conversions attempts failed.

In the third quarter Boyd Thornon plunged for a touchdown and added the conversion on a line plunge. Clinton Smith went over right tackle in the fourth quarter for a touchdown and then passed for the extra point.

Smith then intercepted a pass to run 30 yards for the final Tiger tally in the fourth quarter.

Ed. Grant spun through the center of the line for a 60-yard run and a Grangeville tally late in the fourth quarter.

Coach Ross Armitage said that the Kendrick blocking and tackling was the best the team had displayed during this season. He paid tribute to the deceptive attack displayed by the Grangeville Bulldogs.

If Kendrick should win this game it will mean that the Kendrick Tigers are the Valley League champions, and will add another trophy to the school trophy case.

CHARLES S. WESTENDAHL, KENDRICK PIONEER, PASSES

Charles S. Westendahl, for 70 years a resident of Latah county, and 60 years a resident of the Kendrick vicinity, passed away at his home here Sunday morning, following a stroke suffered Wednesday of last week.

Charles S. Westendahl was born in Sweden, July 24, 1863, coming to America with his parents when but four years of age. They settled first in New York state, moving from there to Wisconsin, thence to Iowa, to North Dakota, to California, to Oregon, and from that state to the then small town of Seattle, Wash. From Seattle they came to Latah county, settling at Blaine in the year 1877, or 70 years ago. The family home at Blaine was then the stage way-station and horse changing place for through stages, and was, of course, the first postoffice in that section. Mr. Westendahl at that time being 14 years old.

On January 24, 1894, he was united in marriage to Petra Paulson, and to this union four children were born, all of whom survive: Albert, of Kendrick; Viola Ross of Moscow; Muriel Oylear, Moscow, and Ben Westendahl, Kendrick. Twelve grandchildren and one great-grandchild also survive.

About 60 years ago, or 1887, Mr. Westendahl moved from the Blaine section to Kendrick, where he took up a homestead on the Little Bear ridge bench, building a home and "proving up" on his ground. In 1895 Mr. and Mrs. Westendahl and their family settled on their homesteaded bench. At that time there were but few roads, and their home could be reached only by horseback or on foot. As the years passed roads came, and with them other improvements, and Mr. and Mrs. Westendahl welcomed them, for pioneer life was hard at best.

Mr. Westendahl always enjoyed life, and was fond of telling of the early days in Latah county, when Indian dangers were real, and not just fancied. He told of walking a sentry beat many a night with an old army musket over his shoulder—but then, such was pioneer life.

Services were conducted Wednesday at 2:00 from the Community church with Dr. J. H. Coulter and Rev. W. L. Karns bringing the message. Burial was in the Kendrick cemetery, with Short's Funeral Chapel in charge.

The well-filled church and profusion of floral offerings testified to the many friends that Mr. Westendahl had made in his long journey through life — and it is with real regret that we see him leave our community.

Pall bearers were Harry Baker, Fred Stedman, Hiram Galloway, Kenneth Brocke, C. E. Harris and Don Miller.

Music was furnished by Mrs. D. A. Christensen and Mrs. E. M. White, who sang "In The Garden" and "We Shall Gather at the River," accompanied by Mrs. H. C. Schupfer.

Dr. Dwight Ingle, Honored

Dr. Dwight J. Ingle, son of Mrs. D. J. Ingle, Kendrick, has received an award of \$500.00 for outstanding research in endocrinology.

As the first recipient of the newly instituted Roche-Organan award, Dr. Ingle was given a scroll and the \$500.00 prize at the Laurentine Hormone conference at Ste. Adèle, Quebec, Canada. The conference was attended by Canadian and American biochemists, physiologists and clinical endocrinologists active in hormone work.

Dr. Ingle was cited for "recent outstanding research in the field of endocrinologic laboratory experimentation." The work in which he is engaged consists of the study of secretions of the endocrine glands.

Dr. Ingle was born at the home of his parents north of Kendrick and attended the Kendrick schools. After graduation from high school he entered the University of Idaho where he was awarded a master of science degree in 1933.

He continued his graduate work on a fellowship at the University of Minnesota. After further work at the Mayo clinic and the Cox Institute of Pennsylvania, he joined the staff of the Unjohn Co., research laboratories at Kalamazoo, Mich., in 1941.

Dr. Ingle is the author or co-author of more than 120 scientific articles. Recently he was appointed to the editorial board of the magazine "Physiological Reviews" for three years.

At the conference when the award was announced he was designated as an outstanding research worker in the field of physiology of the adrenal glands. — Lewiston Tribune.

Pall bearers were Ben Hoffman, Gordon Peters, Oney Walker, Walter Cook, Marvin Vincent and Charles Hoffman, all old time neighbors and friends of the deceased. The well-filled church and beautiful floral offerings attested to the high esteem in which Mrs. Johnson was held.

Mary Elizabeth Johnson was born February 2, 1870, in Bargistena, Sweden. She came to the United States at the age of 18 years. She lived for a time in Connecticut, and later with her sister and brothers came west, settling at Black Diamond, Washington.

In 1894 she was united in marriage to Chas. A. Johnson, at Black Diamond, and to this union was born five children, all of whom survive. They are: Edna Daugherty of Spokane, Wash.; Louise Siderius of Somers, Montana; Carl B. Johnson of Kellogg, Idaho, and Herman, Arlene Maynard, Leland. Mr. Johnson preceded her in death some ten years ago. Eleven grandchildren, four great-grandchildren, and a brother, Chas. Larson of Spokane, Wash., also survive.

Mrs. Johnson, apparently in splendid health, had gone to visit her daughter, Mrs. Pete Siderius at Somers, Montana, and passed away very suddenly, Saturday morning, October 18, at the age of 77 years, 9 months and 18 days. Mrs. Johnson was a confirmed member of the Swedish Lutheran church, having been confirmed while still in Sweden. She was a kind and loving mother, and numbered her friends by her acquaintances, and her passing from the Leland community, where she had resided with her family since May of 1906, will leave a gap that will not soon be filled.

Interment was in the Leland cemetery by the side of her husband. Arrangements were in charge of Brower-Wann.
