IDAHO'S BOUNDARIES STILL CAUSE FOR WONDERMENT

People are still wondering why Idaho has such a peculiar shape, Earl W. Murphy, secretary of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, said this week. Recently, Murphy said, he had received both letters and telephone calls asking how Idaho got its peculiar shape, especially the narrow northern "panhandle." He asked his staff to do a little research, and this is what they found: Idaho, or what is now Idaho, was originally a part of Oregon Territory, which comprised all the land west of the continental divide and north of Utah and Nevada. When the Washington Territory was carved out, Idaho was a part of it. Later, when Washington became a state, the present western boundary of Idaho was determined. It was generally believed that the Territory of Idaho would include all the land between the western boundary as then established, and the continental divide on the east, which would have taken in a part of western Wyoming and a part of western Montana. Just where or why the surveyors went wrong may never be known, but the story prevails that a group of shrewd Helena business men decided that the new Idaho Territory should not include Butte, "the richest hill on earth," Anaconda, and other land known to contain rich ores. Had the continental divide been followed the lush and fertile farms of the Bitter Root valley, the city of Missoula, the Flathead lake territory and most of what is now Glacier National Park would have been in Idaho.

The Helena men are said to have met with others in Butte and decided to get acquainted with the surveyors. The program was worked out, and the surveyors were greeted with the utmost hospitality. The Montana group accompanied the surveyors from the point where Montana, Idaho and Wyoming join. For a time the surveyors followed the continental divide, but when they came to Gibbon's Pass, in Lemhi county, they took off along the Bitterroot range. The result is that by following the Bitterroots, the panhandle of Idaho was narrowed until it would have come to a point had not the surveyors suddenly started north for the Canadian border. "Perhaps," says Murphy, "Idaho got cheated. But that's the way the boundaries were set."

Walks With Broken Ankle
Ernest McGuire, well known farmer and hunter in the Cavendish district performed the almost herculean feat of walking from the bottom of Louse Creek canyon to the highway, a distance of about four miles, with a broken right ankle Thursday of last week.

Mr. McGuire was hunting coyotes and was alone in the bottom of the canyon when he slipped on a smooth rock and fell, fracturing the ankle. Realizing that he would not be missed for some hours, he sat down, laced his boot tightly, unloaded his rifle, and using it as a crutch, began the painful trek to the canyon rim. After getting part way up he reached a fence, and tore off a part of a brace, which he whittled into a longer and more substantial crutch than his rifle, crawled through the fence, and hobbled across the fields to the edge of the road, where he was picked up and brought to town by Ernest Reece.

Dr. Christensen reduced the fracture, which was a severe one — and Mr. McGuire will be "wearing a crutch for some weeks."

Who Isn't On The Spot?

Wash., D. C. — The cold, cruel facts are that consumer prices have advanced within the past year 25 percent. Food prices have jumped 40 percent; clothing 18 percent. Businessmen large and small have struggled under increasing costs of wages and materials. The latter having shot up wholesale quotations 40 percent in less than a year and a half. There is no denying the fact, as much as we hate to admit it, that there is a lot of inflation in a lot of places.

There is plenty of employment in the country, as shown by the fact that 60,000,000 persons are employed.

Nevertheless, high wages and plenty of industrial activity has boosted the nation to higher levels. Maybe this is a poor illustration, but wise statisticians tell us that meat consumption formerly leveled off at 125 pounds per capita per year, but now it is 155 pounds — at double the price that it was in the "good old days."

But you can't measure national inflation or prosperity by the old yardstick. But we do know that an increasingly large number of steady workers and wage earners, as well as small businessmen, are wondering how they are going to continue to keep up the old habits.

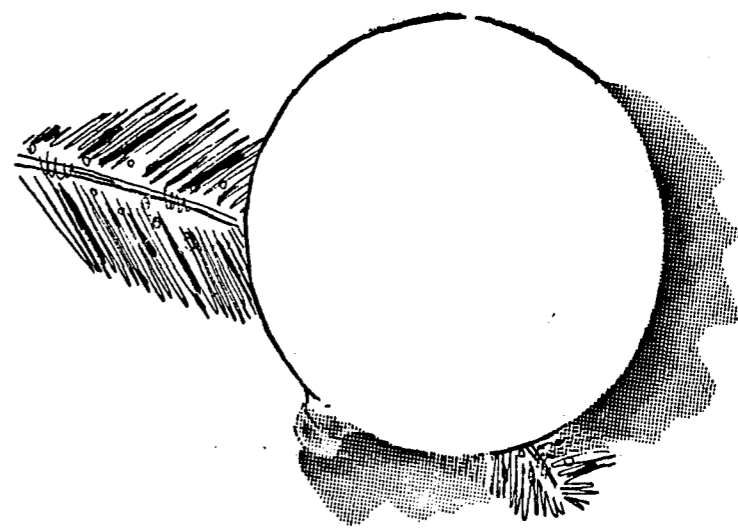

Watch Out For 2,4-D
Just a trace of 2,4-D in the soil, as little as a fifth of a pound spread over an acre, is enough to seriously restrict germination, limit growth, and practically stop the formation of root nodules on the bean, pea, red clover and alfalfa plants that do develop.
This evidence, which suggests careful handling of the potent weed killer around legumes, is contained in a research report from the University of Idaho experiment station in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Society of Agronomy. Conducting the research were R. E. Carlyle, assistant bacteriologist, and John D. Thorpe of Twin Falls.
So, in using 2,4-D be careful that your formula is not excessive if you wish to use the ground for legumes the following season.

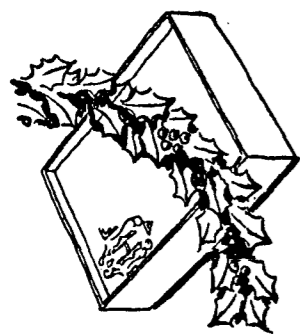
