GRAIN MARKETS STEADY WITH TRADING LIGHT

The grain markets of the Pacific Northwest held steady with light trading during the past week, ac-

cording to the Markets News Ser-vice of the Department of Agriculture. Wheat prices fluctuated within a narrow range compared with other recent weeks, with the ordinary export classes of wheat showing a net gain for the period of 1 cent per bushel. Oats were unchanged and barley advanced but 50c per ton. Trading was light as growers were holding their remaining stocks until after the first of the year on account of income tax adjustments. Trade reports indicate that a larger percentage of the wheat crop in the Pacific Northwest has passed out of the growers

hands than usual during the first half of the crop year. The Bureau of Agricultural Economics has given the wheat growers of this area an optimistic outlook for 1948, with their report,

based on December 1 conditions, of an indicated winter wheat crop for Oregon of 22,248,000 bushels; for Washington of 73,650,000 bushels, a total for the three states of 119,-142,000 bushels. Should the crop indicated by the December 1 reported a production 31 percent above 1947, and 87 percent above the 1936-1945 average.


