MARCH OF DIMES DRIVE BEGINS IN IDAHO TODAY

The 1948 March of Dimes campaign opened today in the state of Idaho, and those in charge said their goal would be a contribution from every citizen in the state.

Ben Johnson of Preston, the state campaign director, predicted "the greatest response in history from the living public" as the result of Idaho's new-found understanding of the humanitarian policies of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in the aftermath of the Idaho polio epidemic of 1947.

While no "dollar goal" has been set in the drive this year, Johnson said "rather we are hoping for 100 percent response from the state's entire population."

Johnson stressed, however, that "we must think in terms of dollars rather than times this year, inasmuch as the Idaho polio outbreak has taught us it takes dollars and many of them to fight this terrible affliction."

To date Idaho has received advances totaling \$200,000 from the National Foundation in order to finance care, hospitalization and treatment of the many polio victims. Idaho statistics show care in the average case to cost upwards of \$1,500, and in some cases costs have ranged as high as \$175 per day.

The March of Dimes constitutes the only fund raising medium of the National Foundation and the local units within the state. The National foundation receives 50 percent of all money raised, while the remainder stays within the local area in which it is contributed. National Foundation money is expended for polio research, education and for emergency aid such as that extended to Idaho this past year.

A number of the state's leading citizens have already come forward in public support of the drive. Gov. C. A. Robins, the state's chief executive and a physician in private life, issued a proclamation setting the dates of the drive for Jan. 15 to 30, and in an accompanying statement declared he was hoping for a "vigorous participation" in the drive.

The governor, who established the Idaho State Polio Advisory Committee to administer the funds made available by the National Foundation further expressed the view: "We have just come through a widespread epidemic of polio, and much of the credit for the fine manner in which we met that emergency is due the National Foundation. Actually, the last year we saw all our dimes of past drives come marching back to Idaho in the form of dollars as the National Foundation advanced us money to meet the care and hospitalization of our many victims."

Dr. F. B. Jeppesen, president-elect of the Idaho Medical association also gave his whole-hearted support to the drive when he declared "The March of Dimes is an effort worthy of the support of the people of Idaho."

Following are the local county campaign directors on Johnson's state-wide staff who will direct the drive in this area: Robert W. Peterson, Latah county; Tom V. Dean, Nez Perce county.

Jasper Nutting is again the local March of Dimes chairman.

Advances Bird Lack Theory

John Soumar, Myrtle, was a Friday business visitor in Kendrick, and while he was in the Gazette office, and being well aware of his familiarity with the great outdoors, an wild life, we asked him for his idea on what had become of our Chinks, Grouse, ducks, etc.

Mr. Soumar was not the least bit hesitant in laying the blame for the bird and duck demise (locally) on raccoons, which in the past few years have become very numerous.

Mr. Soumar stated that he had found undisputed evidence of the raiding of chink, duck and hungarian nests by coons — and also found plenty of evidence of the destruction of mink and muskrats by these same animals.

Mr. Soumar said the great increase in coons was due to the fish and game department classifying these pests as fur bearing animals, rather than predators — and thus protecting them against all but licensed trappers — and no licensed trapper will take coons for a prime hide only brings about 50c — and they are one of the hardest of skins to properly prepare for market.

In speaking of the great increase in covotes Mr. Soumar laid that to the stopping of bounty payments — for a prime coyote hide isn't worth removing and caring for — bringing only from \$1.00 to \$3.00.

We believe Mr. Soumar's theories could well stand investigation by our state fish and game department — that is, if we are going to have any game in the future for that "department" to wrestle over. The more we dig into the fish and game situation the more we think it time for somebody to wake up!
