

Reporting on his observation of 67,000 breeding cows and 55,000 feeder cattle in herds in all parts of the state last year, Rinehart cited "tremendous improvement" in quality of beef cattle in the state during the 36 years he has been with the university's extension division. When Rinehart joined the staff in 1912 the state was just coming out of the "longhorn" cattle

Bull grading records from the 14 beef cattle associations in the state last year further reflect the quality achievement, he explained. He re-ported that bull grading committees, instructed to bar from the range any bull not meeting rigid quality standards, gave an "A" rating to 574 bulls and a "B" rating — not quite top, but still very good — to 783 bulls. Only 240 bulls were rejected in 1947

jected in 1947.

"Seventy-five to eighty percent of all the delay in getting registry certificates and transfers handled through the national breed association offices is due to error or oversight by the breeder who sends in the record," declared R. R. Miller of Spokane, livestock sales operator, formerly with one of the breed as-

Miller gave the breeders detailed information on what records are essential, how they should be kept, and how they should be handled to insure prompt attention by the breed

"Simplicity, permanence and practicability are the main objectives in any set of herd records," he de-

Watch That Salt And Water

Neglect of salt and water are the greatest sins of stockmen from coast o coast, said Dr. T. B. Keith, associate professor of animal husbandry at University of Idaho, at the first breeder-herdsman short course. Registration at the course totaled 90.

Salt requirements go up with the altitude and with the thermometer, he explained. Cattle on the higher ranges require more salt than those on lower pastures. Salt appetites rise during the summer heat.
