## Relief Materials Leave States

A 36,000-pound shipment of United Church Overseas Relief materials valued at \$30,800 sailed for Yokohama, Wednesday, March 31, from the port of Seattle aboard the Java Mail.

This contribution from Pacific Northwest church people is sufficient to clothe over 15,000 needy Japanese. It also includes basic food-stuffs such as dried milk. Other important contributions are 4,225 pairs of shoes, bedding, soap, candles, school supply kits, mending equipment and cooking utensils.

According to Rev. Chester S. Ramsey, director of the program, the continuance and expansion of the relief program to Japan is necessary to sustain the progress made to date and to encourage this group beggared by war devastation in the struggle for democracy.

This is part of the world-wide program of United Church Overseas Relief, which has shipped to date in 1948, a total of 2,360,396 pounds of relief and reconstruction materials to Europe and Asia as the Pacific Northwest unit of Church World Service. This represents about one-third of the supplies valued at \$3,400,000 sent overseas by the church people of America so far this year.

Pacific Northwest church people through United Church Overseas Relief have helped make possible this year 340 relief shipments sent to destitute people in 30 nations. Sixty-five percent went to European countries, chief of which were Austria, Germany, Holland, France, Finland, Hungary, Poland, Denmark and Yugoslavia. Thirty-five percent went to China, Japan, Korea, Pakistan, Okinawa and the Philippines. Chief items were 2,500,000 pounds of food and vitamins and a similar amount of clothing and shoes.

## Safety Test Required

With the coming of spring Idaho is dusting off and putting into effect its requirements for lights and other safety features on cars and trucks. Here are the requirements: Stop in at an official Light and Safety Station immediately for a test of headlights, tail and stop lights, brakes, horn, windshield wipers and windshields (for clearness) etc.

For trucks the above applies as well as — trucks must have gross weight painted on both sides so it is clearly visible; must also have rear view mirror and signal arm (the latter if flat bed, regardless of capacity); must carry flares and have the registration visible from the outside at all times.

An effort is being made to put one of these stations in Kendrick, but for the present Moscow or Lewiston is the closest.

## Building Retaining Wall

## NORRIS EUGENE WALKER, KENDRICK PIONEER, PASSES

Norris Eugene Walker, 63, Clarkston, a pioneer resident and business man of Kendrick, died Monday evening at 10:50 o'clock at St. Joseph's hospital, Lewiston, where he had been a patient for the last three months. Cause of death was diagnosed as cancer.

Mr. Walker was for many years a civic leader at Kendrick. He served a number of terms as mayor in the early 20's, was a highway commissioner for three terms, a member of the Kendrick school board and the Kendrick Commercial club.

He was born June 28, 1884, at Kearney, Nebraska, and came west, settling in the Peck, Idaho, area with his parents at the age of nine. He married Emma Jane Stephenson on Nov. 12, 1906, at Lewiston.

In 1910 Mr. and Mrs. Walker moved to Kendrick, residing here until 1945. On his arrival in Kendrick he was employed by the Lincoln-McCrea Hardware Co., later opening a harness shop and shoe repair business which he operated for many years. He disposed of this business to a brother and for two years, prior to moving to Clarkston in 1945, he was employed as a highway supervisor by the state.

In 1945 Mr. and Mrs. Walker moved to Clarkston, residing at 1120 8th Street, and Mr. Walker was employed by the Anderson Hardware company in that city. He retired because of ill health in August of 1947.

Mr. Walker was a long-time member of the I. O. O. F. lodge and a life-long communicant of the Methodist church, serving for many years on the church board.

Survivors include his wife, Emma; a daughter, Mrs. H. C. Schupfer, Kendrick; a brother, Floyd, Moscow; two sisters, Mrs. May Parks, Moscow, and Mrs. Nona West, Orofino, and two grandchildren, Beverly Ann and Marilyn Schupfer, both of Kendrick.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 2:30 from the Brower-Wann funeral chapel in Lewiston, with the Rev. David Erwin officiating, assisted by Rev. Erwin Ranton. Burial will be at Normal Hill cemetery.

## Receive Cancer Fund Money

The University of Idaho will use the \$18,000 allocated for cancer research by the Idaho Cancer Society for a study suggested by the success with certain amino acid derivatives used in hospital cancer research. It was announced this week by Dr. C. W. Hungerford, dean of the graduate school and chairman of the university's special cancer research committee.

At a special meeting in Moscow Gov. C. A. Robins, representing the Idaho society, announced the grant to the university. This money comes from the Damon Runyan Memorial Fund, collected by Walter Winchell, famous newspaper columnist, in memory of the famous sports writer. The fund was turned over to the American Cancer society and apportioned to the various states. Idaho was allotted \$20,000 — \$18,000 of which has been awarded to the university and \$2,000 to the radiology department of St. Luke's hospital in Boise.

## Weather Remains Like March

Local weather the past week has been like that of March, rather than April. A raw, chill wind has blown a good deal of the time, interspersed with rain and snow squalls of brief duration — and Monday night a nice white blanket made its appearance on most of the ridges surrounding Kendrick.

The early, wet fall caused a good deal of ground in this area to be left for spring plowing — and now farmers estimate that average spring work is about ten days behind time. This, plus the fact that about ten days of good weather will be required before spring work can really get under way indicates a late harvest.

## Brings In Huge Egg

Thursday of last week Alex Larson brought to the Gazette office what we believe to be the biggest hen egg that we have ever seen. The "fruit" measures eight by nine inches, and was perfectly formed, including the shell.

Mr. Larson says that the egg was laid by a White Leghorn, and he believes that the effort killed her, for he found one of their hens dead on the chickenhouse floor at the same time he found the egg.

We regret not being able to keep the "fruit" on display, but while examining it, someone dropped it and cracked the shell — and an ancient egg possesses no value except as a "throwing weapon."

## 1947 Successful Year

Idaho has just ended a highly successful year and is turning to 1948 with assurance that the general economy of the state will be sustained during the next 12 months. Earl W. Murphy, secretary of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce said this week.

In a brief summary of production statistics to be mailed to its membership throughout the state, the State Chamber pointed to the prominent place that agricultural production holds in the total economy of Idaho and stated that "there is no prospect of a reduction in demand or prices in the foreseeable and immediate future."

Similarly, in the mineral and forest industries, the Chamber said the demand for production will remain high with only a shortage of trained labor supply as a serious threat to output.

The state chamber's message to its membership contained a warning that "tax reduction is still in the conversation stage" and that while federal taxes conceivably may be reduced somewhat in 1948, only the "continued vigilance and keen supervision of local taxing programs in cities, counties and districts" will make it possible for Idaho citizens to maintain their present "take-home pay." This item of "take home pay" is just as important to a sound economy, the Chamber pointed out, in the case of the investor as in the case of the laborer, "since the tools of production must be furnished the working men and women from the profits their efforts make possible."

## CONSOLIDATION PLAN O. K'D BY MORE THAN FOUR TO ONE

The proposed consolidation of school districts Nos. 22, 43, 38, 91, 102, 58, part of 63, part of 34, part of 76, part of 32, part of 75, part of 66, part of 42, part of 70, part of 92, Joint No. 11 and Joint No. 24, all in Latah county; Nos. 8, 10, 15, 9, 61, part of 23 and Joint 11 in Nez Perce county and No. 15 in Clearwater county, was approved by a majority of more than four to one at the special election held Saturday afternoon, April 3.

How the districts voted (unofficial, but believed correct returns) are as follows:

Latah County — Kendrick, 125 for, 1 against; Juliaetta, 16 for, 35 against; American ridge, 9 for, 9 against; Pine Creek, 7 for, 0 against; Gold Hill, 20 for, 0 against; Steele, 18 for, 6 against; Taney, 25 for, 1 against; Fern Hill, 10 for, 0 against; Cedar Ridge, 10 for, 0 against; Grinolds, 3 for, 8 against; Elwood, No. 75, 5 for, 0 against; Golden Shield, 2 for, 0 against.

Nez Perce County — Fairview, 10 for, 0 against; Cameron, 29 for, 0 against; Southwick, 36 for, 5 against; Leland, 13 for, 12 against; Welker, 12 for, 3 against; Stony Point, unreported.

Clearwater County — Exact figures are not available but we are told it was 100 per cent in favor of the consolidation.

Thus, returns to date show 352 in favor of the proposal and 80 against.

As we understand, the vote will not be official until canvassed and approved by the various county commissioners, then official approval of the state board.

After the state board approval is received, directors from the various sub-districts will have to be appointed and the new district will then be "set up in business." These directors will hold office until a regularly constituted election can be held in September.

However, the job of the five new directors is certainly not to be taken lightly, for there will be bus routes to lay out, teachers to hire, plus other employees, and the new district to be set up in general. All-in-all, it will be a tremendous job.

Five elementary attendance areas and the Kendrick grade and high school, with a combined daily attendance of about 465 are included in the plan. Elementary schools will be at Southwick, Leland, Gold Hill, Juliaetta and Kendrick.

All districts are free from bonded indebtedness with the exception of Juliaetta, which owes \$2,030 and Kendrick \$4,950.00. A levy of one mill will be made on the new district for the purpose of bond retirement.

All property, real and personal, owned by the existing districts, will become the property of the new one. All assets will be distributed among new districts in the same proportion as assessed valuation. However, money raised in the tax year ending June 30 of this year will go to districts furnishing education for the children during the current school term.

One side-light of interest on this election was the establishment of a voting precinct in "Part of Golden Shield, No. 76," at the Walter May residence on American Ridge. Mr. and Mrs. May were the only ones to vote — and were also appointed as judges and clerks for the election — so Mr. May signed Mrs. May's papers; she signed his, and the poles were duly declared open. At the end of the voting the official report was — 2 in favor of consolidation, 0 against!

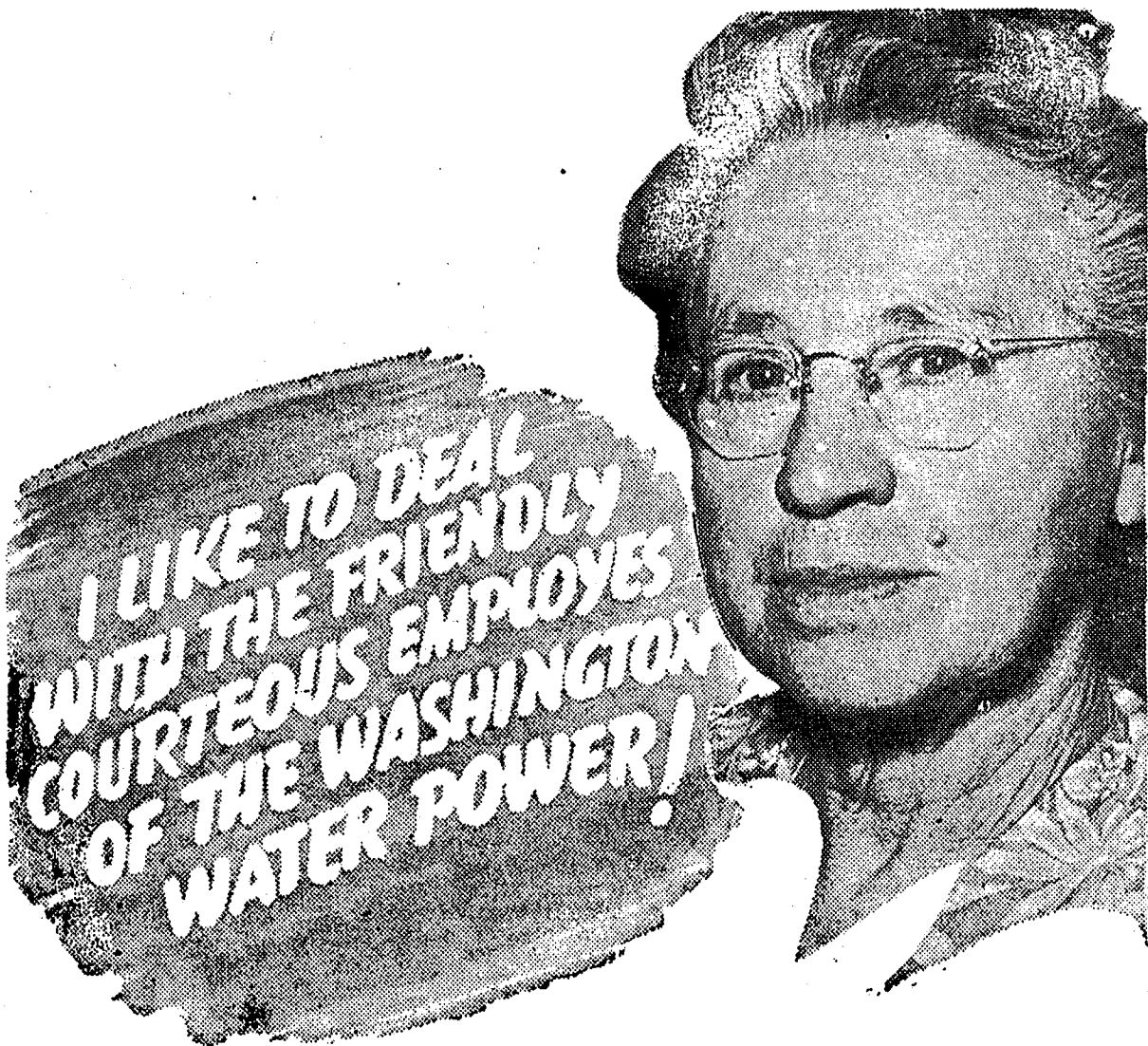

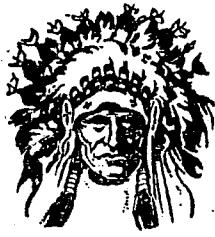
