KENDRICK DROPS OPENING GAME IN BASEBALL PLAY

Orofino, May 14 — Kooskia Mountaineers and the Orofino Maniacs won opening round games of the class B second district baseball tournament here today. Kooskia edged Kendrick 4 to 3 and Orofino punted Gifford 6-0. Not a run was earned in the morning game where Kooskia shaded Kendrick 4-3. Pitchers J. Mohr of Kooskia and E. Hanks of Kendrick pitched good ball, but were handicapped by loose support afield. Kooskia had seven errors and Kendrick eight. Mohr fanned 10 and walked two, while Hanks whiffed 14 and walked two.

Kooskia had a 3-2 lead in the top half of the seventh when Kilroy was safe on an error, stole second and came home on two passed balls. This proved to be the winning run of the game. D. Millard for Kendrick was hit, stole second, went to third on a passed ball and scored on Christensen's single. Christensen was left stranded and Kooskia won 4-3.

Orofino, May 15 — Orofino high school won the class B baseball championship of the second district by downing Kooskia 12-1 in five innings here this afternoon. Kendrick trounced Gifford 9-0, also in five innings, to take third place.

Rules of the Idaho State High School Athletic association provide that tournament games shall be called in the fifth inning if one team has a lead of five or more runs.

Orofino and Lewiston will represent the second district in the north Idaho regional tournament on Friday and Saturday. Lewiston is the defending regional and state champion.

Herb Millard pitched no-hit, no-run ball and his mates gave errorless support as Kendrick dropped Gifford 9-0 for third place in the district tournament in the opening game.

Millard fanned nine Gifford batters and walked two. Grant got one strikeout and walked five Kendrick batters.

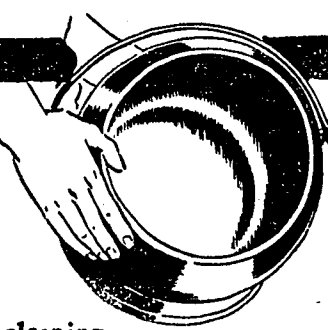

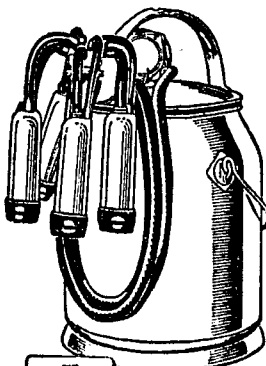

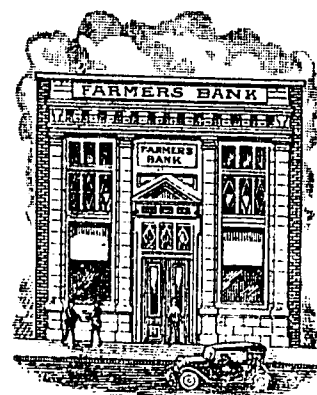
