Council of Churches meeting in Amsterdam, as presented by Wesley F. Rennie, associate general secretary of the International Y. M. C.A., before the Council of Churches and Christian Education at its monthly luncheon meeting last week at Se-

"Against a background of ancient splendor, the World Council of Churches convened in Amsterdam during the festivities honoring the fiftieth anniversary of the reign of Queen Wilhelmina. While we were attending receptions in that great city, honoring those in attendance at the Assembly, it was as though war had never happened to disturb the serenity and solidarity of the city until one talked with the people," stated Rennie.

"Then one realized that, despite the gala decorations and illuminations on all sides, life was hard for the majority of the majority of the majority of the majority of the series of

for the majority of the residents of the city and the inhabitants of that plucky little country. As one listened to the reports from those in attend-ance at the Assembly, concerning the needs of the people in the warstricken countries, it was to understand a little better the multitude of serious problems the war had left as an aftermath for the Churches to work out."

It was reported at the Assembly session that at least 15,000,000 people, the majority of them Protestants, have been rendered homeless and friendless in various European countries by the war.

"Giving assistance to these pecple is something the churches can-not sidestep," Rennie pointed out. "Nor do the churches desire to escape from this great responsibility. It presents a wonderful opportunity to them and their people to put Christian ethics into action."

What is equally important is that the churches are being brought closer together than ever before, finding that in "union there is strength" in the working out of

many affairs, "The Amsterdam meeting of hundreds of Church representatives from over the world was an impressive sight and a great step forward toward world unity and world peace," he added. "It will take many such meetings and time to do the great task of assisting in re-charting life for millions of war refugees through Church aid. They have already accomplished much in this direction." complished much in this direction. I would heartily recommend that every church member in this area read the documented minutes and happenings of the Amsterdam Assembly and study them well. In that way they will get an idea of the future plans of the World Council of Churches, in which in time the churches of Washington and northern Idaho will be asked to participate."

Europeans Interested In Idaho Boise - Europeans of all nationalities continue their interest in Idaho. Earl W. Murphy, secretary of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce said, pointing to the following letter from Charles H. Freuler of Zuerich, Switzerland:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS S. J. R. NO. 5

"Shall Section 6 of Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of "Shall Section 6 of Article XVIII of the Constitution of the State of Idaho be amended to read as follows:

"Section 6. County Officers.—The legislature by general and uniform laws shall, commencing with the general election in 1950, provide for the election biennially in each of the several counties of the state, of county commissioners, a sheriff, a county treasurer, who is ex-officio public administrator, a probate judge, a county assessor, a coroner and surveyor. All taxes shall be collected by the officer or officers designated by law. The clerk of the district court shall be ex-officio auditor and recorder. No other county offices shal be established, but the legislature by general and uniform laws shall provide for such township, precinct and municipal officers as public convenience may require, and shall prescribe their duties, and fix their terms of office. The legislature shall provide for the strict accountabality of county, township, precinct and municipal officers for all fees which may be collected by them, and for all public and municipal moneys which may be paid to them, or officially come into their possession. The county commissioners may employ counsel when necessary. The sheriff, county assessor, county treasurer, and ex-Officio tax collector, auditor and recorder and clerk of the district court shall be empowered by the county commissioners to appoint such deputies and clerical assistants as the business of their offices may require, said deputies and clerical assistants to receive such compensation as may be fixed by the county commissioners'."
